

These funds were also used for the new lighting and sound systems, and the new seats. The seats were picked by Mr. Goodall and Dr. Kasyan and are ensured to provide comfortable seating for future audience.

On October 18th, the ribbon was cut making the opening of the auditorium official which is now open for use.

Mr. Goodall, Principal of Manasquan High School, said, "The process went very smooth. No issues or problems at all going through with the process."

Manasquan High School-- Recently, Manasquan High chool students have found their lockers zip-tied when they go to collect their belongings. To some, this measure is a bit extreme, while to others, it is a perfectly fitting reaction.

Effective since Monday, October 2nd, lockers found without locks on them have been zip tied shut. Over three quarters of the lockers at Manasquan Highschool are left unlocked daily, with some of those lockers missing their locks completely.

School administrators reported that three hundred lockers on the first floor alone were left unlocked, which fueled the current zip-tie movement.

Seeing their lockers tied shut, students were confused as to why this reaction was necessary. Administration, however, feels that it is an appropriate consequence for not following school policy.

"You get a locker and lock for free," said Mr. White, a school security officer at Manasquan High School, implying that the students should make use of their privileges.

For their first offence, students will receive an official warning in Genesis, but after that detentions will be issued. Shep Cooper, one of the students who has had their locker ziptied, stated that he "got [his] locker zip tied because [he] didn't keep [his] lock on it." He was "annoyed because there was no reason for [administration] to do that." Shep, along with many other students, feels that him not locking his locker "doesn't affect anyone but [him.]" To get it off, he had to find Mr. Murin to cut it off.

Patrick Woodrow, a senior at Manasquan High School agrees with Shep, and claims that locking the lockers isn't that helpful. "I'm not good at unlocking lockers, and someone always locks it anyways," Pat said. "I'd be late to class if I locked it every day." Students that struggle to open their lockers find themselves rushing and claim that their lockers can cause them to be late for class. To students, making it to class on time is more important than locking their lockers.

Overall, students feel that the school could use other methods in response to their lockers being left unlocked. Assistant Principal Mr. Read said that he "hopes students will just keep their locks on their lockers," since it is much easier than giving a detention. It has been a week since the beginning of this new response, and lockers are still decorated with zip ties.

Moving forward, will students be able to finally follow the rules and lock their lockers, or will the extreme measures have to stay?

Former MHS Student Honored during New Jersey Run for the Fallen

Most weekday mornings, Broad St. is filled with traffic, as parents drop their children at school. Most Sunday mornings, Broad St. is much quieter, as an occasional car passes but not much else happens. On Sunday, September 24, the scene was much different.

A crowd of roughly thirty people gathered in front of Manasquan High School, near the flagpole, to remember former student Ron Kubik as he was honored by the New Jersey Run for the Fallen.

Amongst those who attended were Ron's mother, Mrs. Eileen Daly, and Ron's former teachers Mr. Harvey and Mr. Mawn. Also in attendance were volunteers from the MHS Marching Band, some seniors from Mr. Harvey's AP Literature class and various members of the Manasquan community.

The Run for the Fallen remembers the sacrifice of Americans who lost their lives while fighting in the Armed Forces. A graduate of MHS in 2006, Ron was an Army Ranger who was killed 1n 2010 while fighting in Afghanistan.

Over four days, the runners run from the northwest corner of New Jersey to Cape May, the farthest southern point in the state. Then they run up the coast, ending at the Vietnam

memorial in the PNC Arts in Holmdel. Along the way, they stop to honor New Jersey residents killed in Battle.

MHS was added to route in 2015, when Mrs. Daly requested her son's former school be the mile marker in his honor.

"Ronnie loved his time at Manasquan," she said. "I wanted that positive memory to be the place where he is honored," she added.

MHS English teacher Mr. Harvey took the lead in bringing the band to the event. "I like the idea of some energy at the event," he said. "The first few years it was quiet and somber, but with the band, it's much more energetic."

Despite the rainy morning, the band members came to play. "We played a patriotic song and an upbeat song," band director Mrs. Szakal said. "Our goal was to add a positive vibe to the ceremony."


Surfing Suffers Setback
