"Induction to the prestigious National Honors Society is a testimony to each student's dedication to the community and to academics," said English teacher Mr. Mawn.

Not only does each students' individual drive for success power their path to NHS, but also the hard work of Ms. Fenlon and Ms. Jaeger, English teachers and co-advisors of the NHS chapter here at MHS. Ms. Fenlon has been an advisor to NHS hopeful students for almost 10 years and is very complimentary of the students she works with.

"They all work very hard and their induction to the National Honors Society will give them many opportunities both academically and professionally." she said.

The National Honors Society is an international student organization that encourages students to maintain their academic strides as well as participate their communities. Members of the national honors society demonstrate scholarship, service, leadership, and character. These are the pillars upon which the organization selects students. In order to be considered for induction, a student must be in their junior or senior in high school, maintain an unweighted GPA of 93 (4.0 on the 4 point scale), and must fulfil a monthly quote for community service hours. Anyone who has attended high school can appreciate how difficult it is to balance the work load



with such a time commitment.

The requirements students work through to get in don't go unrewarded. The organization builds student's leadership and and time management skills as well offering insight into the college admission planning process. In addition to these benefits, there are also more tangible awards for these students. The top NHS members are candidates for exclusively NHS members.

In addition to this, all NHS students are privy to the NHS Scholar Dollars tool which allows students to search for scholarships and understand their options for paying for college. #### Be a Part of Manasquan's 10th Annual Blood Drive

The Academy of Health Careers proudly hosted their 10<sup>th</sup> annual blood drive on May 1<sup>st</sup> in the MHS gym. The event, spearheaded by Mrs. Kozic, is lead by the Dynamics of Health Care class and through the American Red Cross, who uses the blood for any accidents that happen in the state of New Jersey.

A total of eighty-one people signed up to donate, and overall, 53 units were collected (for various reasons, some people are not allowed to donate). To put that into perspective, each pint of blood col-

lected can save three lives, so potentially, Mrs. Kozic pointed out, 159 lives could be saved from the Academy of Health Career's effort. amazed at their maturity and respectfulness," Mrs. Kozic said.

The Red Cross awarded a \$250 scholarship to an Academy of Health Careers graduating senior, for their effort.

Manasquan has had great success over the past 10 years hosting the event with the Central Jersey Blood Bank. In 2017, the blood drive collected 76 pints of blood, and while this year was less, it was still a successful year.



With the change in the MHS schedule this year, the Art Show moved from January to May. As a result,


many more students were featured in this year's show. Mrs. Pagano explained that there's "art from throughout the full year, which means a lot more!"

mer student and MHS alumni who graduated in 2010 and joined the US Army Rangers. He fought three tours of duty, two in Iraq and one in Afghanistan, where he unfortunately lost his life fighting terrorists. Throughout his time at MHS Ron was known for his good attitude and overall charisma by all his classmates and even his teachers whom shared a certain affection for him as well.

Mr. Mawn, an English and Journalism teacher at MHS, had Ron for his Journalism class and had a close relationship with Ron. "Ron was always a great kid, a bit rough around the edges, but still a great kid," Mr. Mawn stated, "He always had so much energy and creativity, he was the kind of kid you'd want to be around."

After Ron graduated, he did what he said he was going to do and joined the Rangers, serving faithfully until April, 2010 when he

unfortunately gave the ultimate sacrifice. Ron gave up his life to save the lives of 5 Rangers, 5 Afghan soldiers, and 19 Afghani women and children, and was then awarded the Silver Star, the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest honor in the military, for his heroism in combat.

Improv For Ron was started when the Brick VFW came to MHS and offered to help pay for a scholarship in Ron's name. Our principal, Mr. Coppola, thought it best to let Mr. Mawn and Mr. Harvey decide how to handle the scholarship, being how they were so close to Ron even after he graduated. "We

decided to go with the improv



cited for show the begin, to but also nx-"I'm ious: nervous to have this be my last show," he responds.





## Alabama's New Law Causes Controversy

## Pro-Choice under threat as more states follow Alabama's lead

On Tuesday, May 13th Alabama's Senate passed a controversial bill that calls for an almost complete ban on abortion, making it almost impossible for women to obtain access to an abortion in the state of Alabama, even if their pregnancy was a result of rape or incest.

The new law is said to be enacted in six months. Upon being enforced the law will carry stiff penalties for those caught violating it. For example, doctors could face up to 99 years in prison for performing an abortion in the state.

The public reaction to Alabama's new law has been explosive, with many claiming they are disgusted and angered by the new law and feel it violates Roe v. Wade, a landmark decision made by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1973, in which the Court ruled that the U.S. Constitution provides (under the 14th amendment) a fundamental right to privacy that protects a pregnant woman's liberty to choose whether or not to have an abortion.

Moreover, many are convinced that Alabama's Senate passed the law to cause a stir that could potentially result in Roe V. Wade being reviewed and possibly overturned. While some don't believe the case is in danger of being revoked, others are not convinced. Those who fear the case being overturned think Roe V. Wade is in serious danger since the current Supreme Court is more conservative, with the recent additions of Supreme

Justices Neil Gorsuch and Brent Kavanaugh, which may potentially result in an overturn.

But, the likelihood of Roe V. Wade being repealed may not be as easy as some people believe, even with more conservative justices. In order for Roe V. Wade to be rescinded, a majority of justices would have to rule that the interpretation of the law set forth in Roe was incorrect and they'd have to offer a new interpretation of the Constitution and issue a new opinion. This is difficult since Roe is such a controversial case (with many citizens divided on how they feel about it), the court is well aware of the stigma that surrounds the case and may not want to take it. Even if the court did hear Roe again the chances of a complete repeal would be improbable; it's more likely the court would make changes to the case, rather than revoke it entirely.

However, even the thought of hypothetical changes to Roe. V Wade causes panic amongst many Americans. But why? Why are so many people concerned about Alabama and changes that may or may not happen? The answer to that is rather simple and here's why: a complete repeal or even a revision to Roe is oppressive and threatens a woman's right to personal freedom. It goes beyond more than just the right to an abortion: it's about ensuring that women are able to maintain their personal liberties without the fear of having those freedoms taken away or limited; and the threat of

having personal rights revoked is not something the public wants to submit to. Since the Alabama ban was made public, a number of groups and individuals have spoken out against it. Even government officials such as Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, New York's 14th congressional district representative, have publicly criticized the new ban saying: "Abortion bans aren't just about controlling women's bodies. They're about controlling women's sexuality [and] owning women."

The overwhelming opposition from the public, powerful individuals, and organizations have made it clear that not many support Alabama's ban and those who are anti-ban are willing to fight the ban not only to guarantee that abortion is more accessible but to ensure that women's rights are protected.



## University of South Carolina Student Killed After Mistaking Random Car for Uber

The body of a college student from New Jersey who attended the University of South Carolina was found in a field hours after she got into a vehicle she mistakenly thought was her Uber ride. She died from multiple sharp force injuries, the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division said.

Samantha Josephson, 21, called an Uber around 2 a.m. Friday in Columbia, and was last seen getting into a black Chevy Impala, said Columbia Police Chief W.H. Holbrook. Turkey hunters found her body 14 hours later in the field in Clarendon County, about 90 miles away.

Josephson's body had numerous wounds, including on her head, neck, face, upper body, leg and

ing an Impala that

matched the description of the vehicle seen in surveillance video. Police found Josephson's blood in the car's passenger side and trunk, authorities said. Her cell phone was found in the passenger compartment, police said.

Investigators found a container of liquid bleach, germicidal wipes and window cleaner in the car, Holbrook said.

Rowland was listed as being held in jail in Columbia. Arrest warrants listed his home as New Zion, an unincorporated community in Clarendon County.

# Anti-Vaccinators Have Unfortunate Impact on Others

People around the country have stopped vaccinating their children. They fear it will cause autism among other things. But what are the consequences? It is not just the health of the anti-vaccinator's own child, but the health of everyone else as well.

The number of measles outbreaks in the United States has been on the rise, continuing to increase every day. It was eradicated in 2000, but since then there has been 764 cases across 23 states – 60 of them being within the past week of May 8<sup>th</sup>.

But why do parents put their child at risk? Their answers vary. Some think their child would benefit from contracting the illness while others do not trust the government agencies and their close relationship with the big pharmaceutical companies.

In an ultra-Orthodox Jewish community residing in Monsey, New York, the Singer family is facing the repercussions from a group of people they've never met. There have been 41 measles outbreaks in just New York, 11 of them being in their county of Rockland. At the age of 2 months, their daughter, Malky, is unable to get vaccinated for another four months. The Singers are doing whatever they can to keep Malky from public places out of fear.

So, if they want to have a family outing to a park or to go to the mall, someone is forced to stay home and care for Malky. Malky's father, Shimon Singer, explain to CNN, "We've had to change the way we live because of a small minority of people. It's very inconvenient." But, it





is just not a minor inconvenience, it is an emotional burden as well. A parent always worries about the safety and health of their child and now that worry is at an all time high, especially with how horrible measles is.

Typically, children receive their first dosage between 12 to 15 months old and the second dose between four and six. Now, it is recommended that children in areas with outbreaks should receive the first dosage at six months.

Parents and community members are on high alert with these recent outbreaks. They are reaping the consequences of the minority. One woman told CNN, "It's one thing when someone makes a decision that only affects them. But when someone doesn't vaccinate their children, it's extremely selfish."

Although I understand where some of the anti-vaccinators are coming from, I could personally never not vaccinate my own future children. Mainly out of the fear of them contracting a horrible illness. And in all honesty, I would much rather them have autism than suffer through something else. It is important to not only keep the safety of not only your own children, but everyone else around you.

The Hawaiian-born Aquaman star, Jason Momoa, shaved off his infamous beard for one reason in mind: to bring awareness to a major issue, that plastic is killing our planet. "I'm shaving this beast off, it's time to make a change," wrote Momoa on his Instagram page. "A change for the better ... for my kids, your kids, the world. Let's make a positive change for the health of our planet."

According to greenmatters.com, "humans buy about one million plastic bottles per minute, and of those bottles, more than 90 percent are never recycled." These plastic bottles end up in the landfill and ocean, which negatively affects the ecosystem and marine life.

"Every square mile of ocean contains roughly 46,000

pieces of floating plastic," remarks the *United Nations Environmental Programme*. "By 2050, it's predicted that there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish." Momoa is one of the first celebrities to fight this dilemma and promote water in aluminum cans, rather than plastic bottles.

"There's only one thing that can real-

ly help our planet and save our planet, as long as we recycle, and that's aluminum," Momoa explains in a YouTube video. "75 percent of all aluminum is still in circulation, and an aluminum can that gets recycled can be back in circulation in 60 days." Aluminum can be reused and is easier to recycle, while plastic lives longer than humans and rarely gets recycled and reused.

"Please, please, there's a

change coming. It's aluminum. We gotta get rid of these plastic water bottles. Aquaman is trying to do the best he can — for my kids, for your kids, for the world. Clean up the oceans, clean up the land. Love you guys," Momoa insists at the end of the YouTube video. Momoa developed his own line of aluminum cans for water with Ball Corp,



## Flood Dethrones Hart as Several Manasquan Track and Field Athletes Push into Championship Season

On May 24th and 25th, the Manasquan Track Team made the two-hour journey down south to Delsea High School to compete in the Group II South Sectional Championship. Not affected by travel fatigue or the blazing-hot weather, the warriors made an impressive showing, with several athletes qualifying for the Group II Championship the following weekend.

The standout from the weekend is senior Colin Flood, who took first place in the 1600m and second place in the 3200m.

Other athletes that qualified for states include senior Antonio Wesley took fourth in the Triple Jump, senior Ryan McNamara who took fifth in the 800m, and sophomore Connor Walsh who took sixth in the High Jump. For the girl's side, junior Lindsey Field took sixth in the 1600m and 3200m. All five of these athletes will compete in the Group II Championship on May 31st and June 1st.

Going into the first day of the Group II South Sectional meet, everyone had Devin Hart as the favorite to win the 1600m race. For the past two years, Hart dominated the competition in Group II, winning the event by more than 4 seconds in 2017 and 2018. However, this year, Manasquan's Colin Flood dethroned the distance champion to win his first sectional title

with a time of 4:18.

The next morning, Flood returned to the track for the 3200m race where he once again faced off against Devin Hart. There, he took second place with a time of 9:22 to Hart's first place finish. Colin Flood holds the record for the boy's 1600m and 3200m at Manasquan High School and will run for Fordham University next year.

Manasquan junior Lindsey Field also qualified for both the 1600m and the 3200m, running 5:22 and 11:53 respectively.

Off the track, Manasquan had two athletes qualify for the Group II Championship. Senior Antonio Wesley had a season best triple jump of 43-3.5, which landed him in fourth place. Also, the youngest qualifier for the Manasquan team was sophomore Connor Walsh, who cleared the 5-10 high jump for sixth place.

On Friday May 31st and June 1st, Colin Flood ran the 1600m and 3200m race at the Group II Championship Meet. There, he ran a 4:17 mile to place third. In diong so, he once again broke his own school record. For the two mile the next morning, he tied his school record of 9:19 to place third.
