John Rodriguez (Junior, Wrestling) for outstanding wrestling.

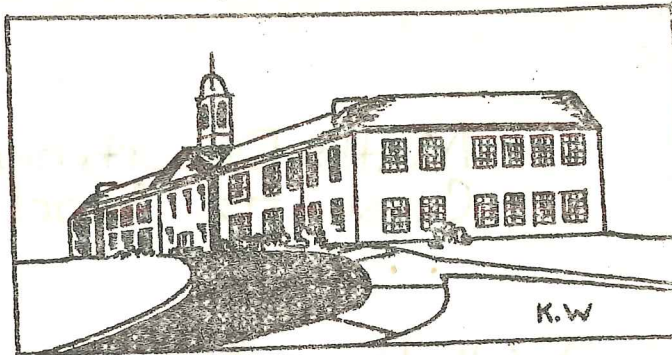

Judy Cesse, playing in the #1 spot, won her match against Ronnie Sanders of East Brunswick, in a long three set contest. Scores were 2-6, 6-0, 6-4.

Peggy Sheehan, playing in the #3 position, won her match 6-4, 7-5, and in the #2 Doubles Team of Mary Neilsen and Gayle Brown also won their match in two sets against Colleen Murphy and Gary Gilfillen scores were 6-2, 6-1.

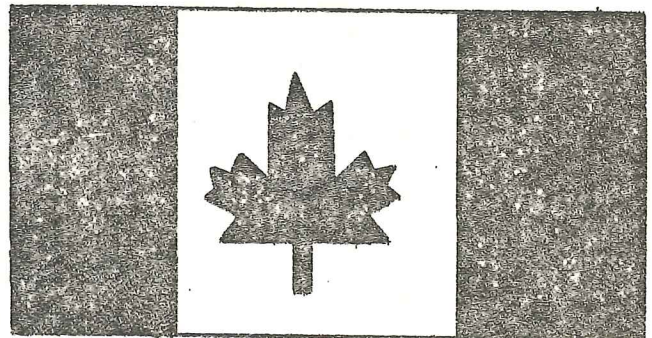

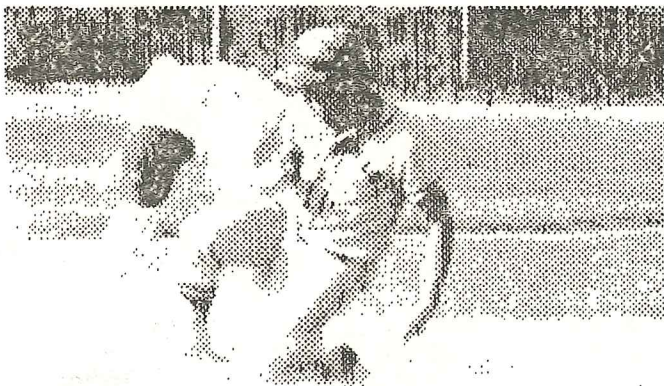


## Left On!

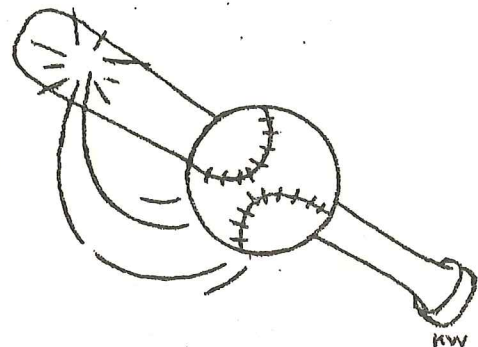


Senior Jim "Scruffy" Tamarro is safe on third on close play.
