Kennedy Boosts Howard At Sea Girt Inn

"This is the most exciting day in the history of the Democratic party in the third district," Congressman James Howard (D-N.J.), said to a crowd of 1,000 in regard to the presence of Senator Ted Kennedy (D-Mass.) at a rally in support of Howard at the Sea Girt Inn. Sea Girt on Sept. 29.

Matt Lupsha and Dale Schnibbe, "Warrior" reporters, attended the \$10 a head event. Kennedy and Howard arrived 45 minutes late. Mr. Kennedy, delayed by rain and fog, found out that the Monmouth Airport had closed and had to touch down at the Lakewood Naval Base. Upon arrival at the Inn, Kennedy said, "A little fog makes me homesick

for Massachusetts."

Mr. Kennedy spoke of Democratic unity and in relation to Mr. Howard, stressed the importance of a strong county and state representation. He said Mr. Howard is interested in importance issues such as trying to stop the war in Vietnam and chairing a committee to hold hearings on pollution-free energy.

Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Howard spoke for about 15 minutes. Then they were wisked away by an array of secret service men.

Kennedy spoke about President Nixon's policies and threw jabs at the Republican administration, such as: "If President Nixon loses the election in November, he'll never let us in on his secret plan to end the war."

The crowd was curious, with everyone pushing and shoving to get a glimpse of the senator. As he left, a few people and tables were knocked down as people tried to get his autograph.

Mr. Kennedy displayed wit as he said, "I'm glad I have a famous brother-in-law or else I wouldn't be here." The speech concentrated mainly on important national issues such as the war, economy and welfare.

Support the Big Blue Boosters


