



## Webster Wins Queen of Hearts

"It was really a surprise. I didn't expect it," said junior Debbie Webster upon winning the Queen of Hearts contest sponsored by the Heart Association.

Debbie raised \$2,802 for the Monmouth County Heart Association in a contest sponsored by the Manasquan Junior Women's Club. She competed against six other girls from Colts Neck, Red Bank, Middletown, Wall Township, Deal and Freehold and collected the most money. Altogether, the girls raised almost \$10,000 collectively.

Mike Lyons, who attended Manasquan, died last year of heart trouble, and Debbie felt that she wanted to do something to help others like him, so she entered the contest to raise money for heart research. Mrs. Lyons, Mike's mother and vice-president of the Heart Fund in Long Branch, helped Debbie collect money. Her main sponsor was Mrs. Charles Van Wickle, Wall Township, who helped her to organize affairs.

Debbie held cake sales, had a 50-50 contest, sold ads to local merchants for a Heart Fund book, and held a party at Mike Deolan's, Spring Lake Heights, where she raised her biggest donation of \$150. She also sent out letters for donation pledges.

The contest started with a briefing at Jersey Shore Medical Center to orient the girls with pertinent facts. Debbie also got



details from senior Lori Gregory, who ran in the contest last year. The contest lasted from March 1 to March 15.

Each girl won prizes for her participation. Among Debbie's prizes were a \$25 gift certificate from Steinbach's, Asbury Park, an AM-FM radio, a gown, desk lamp, jewelry, clothes, and a suitcase. She was crowned at the Coronation Ball at the Barclay in Belmar where she received a trophy.

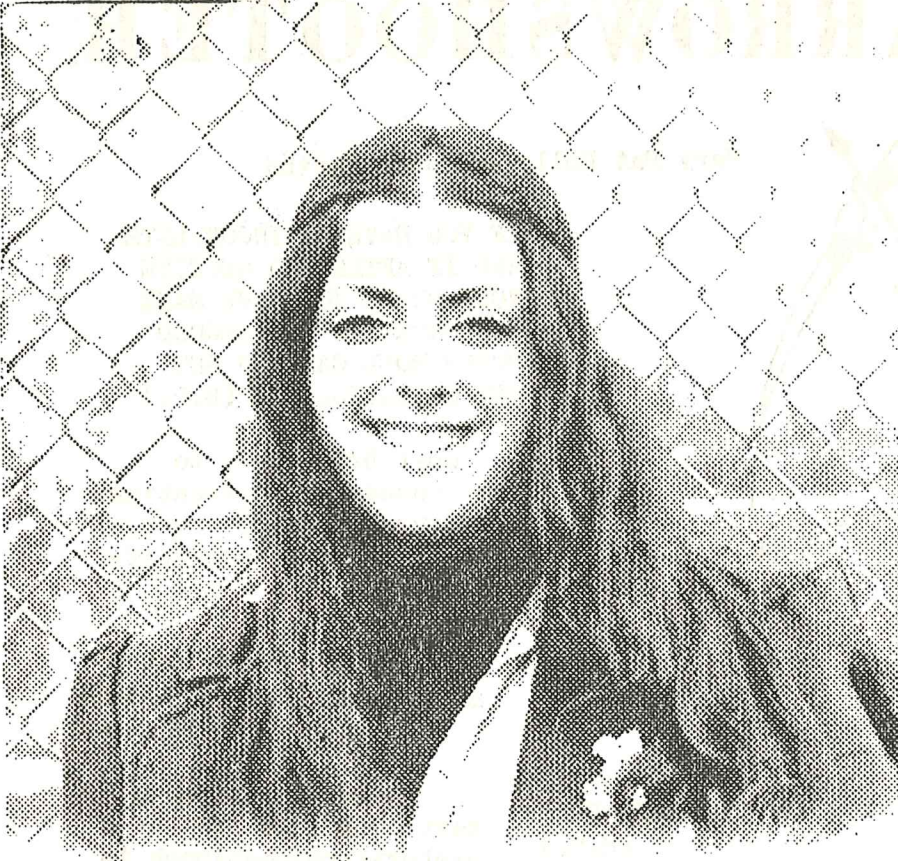

# Students Attend Government Day

Four Manasquan students got an inside look at the workings of county government last Wednesday, March 28 when they attended the 22nd annual Monmouth County Youth Government Day at Freehold. The program was sponsored by the county American Legion and the Board of Freeholders. About 150 Monmouth County juniors, representing 27 high schools, were present.

After a brief greeting, the students moved into assigned groups, heard lectures and toured various county departments in the Hall of Records. Jack Dalton attended the sheriff session, while Tom Abel participated in the county clerk session. Both toured the courthouse and county jail. Carolyn DeSantis attended the surrogate session and learned of the work in that department. Cathy Walker participated in the freeholder session in which each member of the Board of Freeholders described his individual position.

Freeholder Director Joseph C. Irwin explained the origin of freeholders, passed out certificates and closed the program after a luncheon for the group at the American Hotel.

Mrs. Elkins and Mrs. Howard accompanied the students to Freehold.

Following the group workshops, the students voted on the issues of legalized casino gambling, locating deepwater oil port off Long Branch, more state control over municipal planning, and amnesty for draft dodgers and deserters. These questions were then discussed at a mock freeholders' meeting.

## GYPSY MOTH CONTROL

The Gypsy Moth threat has returned once again to the Shore Area. In the caterpillar stage the Gypsy Moth destroys vast acreage of forests by eating the leaves of the trees.

Controlling this pest needs everyone's cooperation. Now is the perfect time to kill the egg masses located on the base or the sides of trees. The egg masses are oval in shape and have a chamois cloth color. By painting the egg masses with a solution of creosote and kerosene (1 to 1), thousands of the Gypsy Moth will be killed. Each egg mass has anywhere from 100 to 1,000 eggs.

For every Gypsy Moth that is killed there will be 500 less next year.



# Student Music Teacher Finds Band Enthusiastic

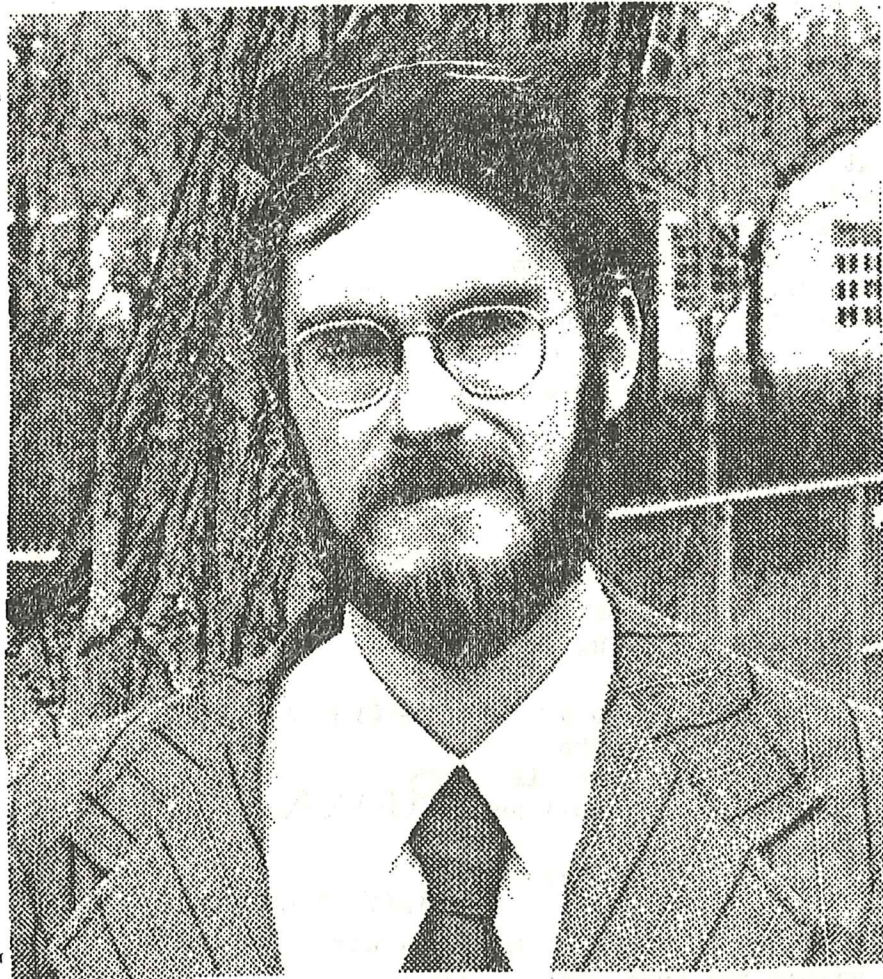

# Price Of Democracy: Vigilance

It was well said some 200 years ago that the price of Democracy is eternal and constant vigilance.

Our Republic and our state will continue, but what is bothersome in this age of increasing problems of environment, transportation and education, is the fact that so very few people will answer the call of political need. Politics is not a dirty word, yet the thermometer of apathetic coolness seems to plunge even lower.

Today, we have in our State House a Governor who has shown a strong inclination to deal with the major problems at hand, but we also have in large measure, an electorate which is ironically still not sufficiently aroused to participate on a broader basis in day-to-day political activities.

This is a concern which is apparent not only in our State, but in the nation as well. It is also not confined to the previously designated adult world, but seems to a certain extent to have been inherited by the newly enfranchised young people as well.

In the past presidential election of 1972, less than half of the 11 million 18 to 20 year olds eligible to vote went to the polls. Some have ascribed this to the lack of a candidate from either party with which the young people could readily identify. This opinion, however, does not ring true, for less than half of these potential voters even bothered to register. This would seem

to point the finger at apathy rather than a lack of a candidate with which to identify.

Three years ago I started a local radio program titled, "Politics is not a Dirty Word." It is an interview program designed to combat political apathy and stir the imagination of the listener. After more than 100 weekly broadcasts this program has found a steadily enlarging audience in the Central Jersey area.

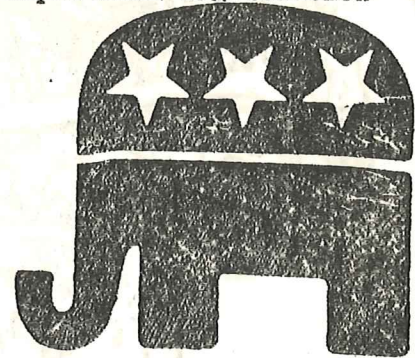
But, a single radio program is not enough. Other means must be explored to enlarge the base of political action and awareness and encourage people to join in the daily operation of their government.

Such means are at hand today in the form of municipal, county, and state political organizations. These groups are calling for help, and offer the opportunity for all individuals, young and old, to find a meaningful role in helping our State to move forward toward ever improving government. Not only is your vote required, but your physical help as well.

The liberalism of the mid-twentieth century has over-promised, and in many cases been in conflict with another strong American attitude ... the work ethic. On the other hand, negative reaction of hard conservatism does not supply the answers, but only the emotional responses. Only the progressivism of basic policies, grounded on the hard rock of environmentalism, can offer the true and proper route for New Jersey today.

Join in the crusade by offering your vote and your physical help for a better New Jersey. Politics is not a dirty word, and only by eternal and constant vigilance can liberty and Democracy be preserved.

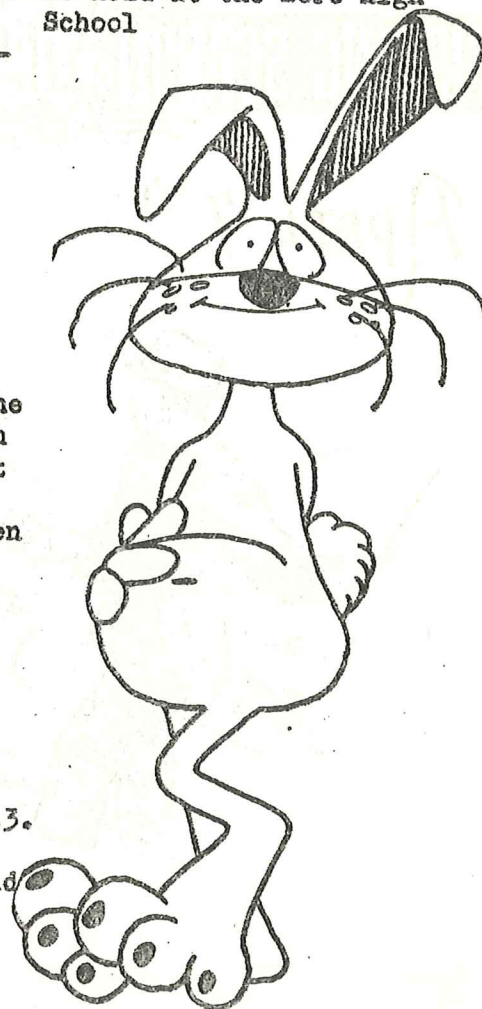

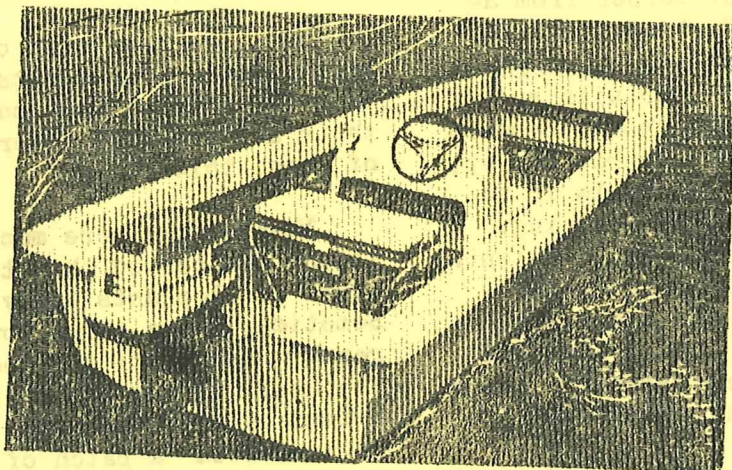

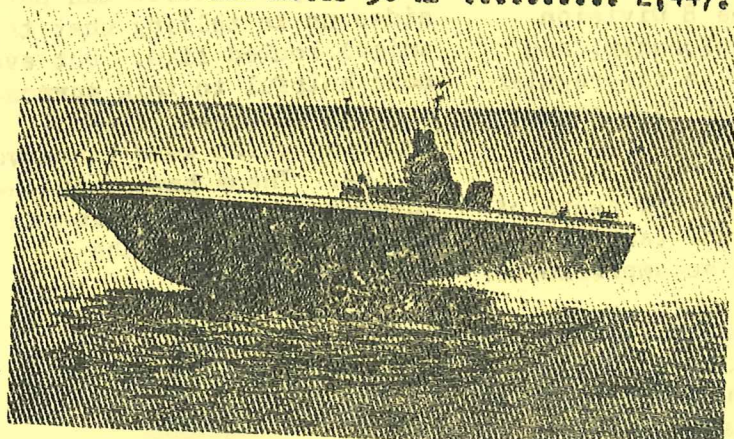
