

This is Billie's second year as President of the Keyettes. The next election will be held sometime in the spring. Other officers include: Paula Sliney, Vice-President; Kathy Reddington, Secretary; and Debbie Bartels, Treasurer.

The club is self-sufficient, being sponsored by neither a national or international group, as is the Key Club.
"We fund our own enterprises completely by the money we make selling soap for the blind. The money is put into our treasury to be used expressly for our various activities," said Billie. Soap costs \$2.00 per box, with \$1.20 going to the blind and \$.80 going to the Keyettes.

Last year, the Keyettes and the Key Club
jointly sponsored a baser
ball marathon which
raised money for the cancer foundation. Although
not many participated
and weather was unfavorable, "those who did
participate really had
an enjoyable time,"
stated Billie. The two
groups also sponsored
a faculty picnic at the
Shark River County Park.

In January, a trip to New York to see a play and have dinner is planned. In March, the girls will entertain patients at McGuire Air Force Base Hospital at Wrightstown, N.J.

More fund-raising activities, including a Sadie Hawkins picnic in the spring, will take place at the end of the year.

Billie had high praise for the club's advisor, Mrs. Lynn Sieka. "Mrs. Sieka is an exceptional woman. She is always willing to help and offer her services in any way to make the club a meaningful experience for all involved. She is truly a great advisor!"

As for the future of the club, Billie foresees a wider range of activities and hopes for more enthusiasm and a greater interest in the Keyettes.





Club May Be Checkmated

It is believed that Chess was played in India as early as 500 Ab. Chess comes from the word"shah" in Pursian meaning king.

The first International Tournament took place in London in 1851. The title "World Championship" was not used until 1866.

"The basic ideas of chass are easily learned, but the strategy of the game is deeply involved", stated Mr. Robert Holly, advisor of the school Chass club.

The game is played by two persons, each having 16 pieces. The pieces include eight pawns, two rooks, two knights, two bishops, one king, and one queen.

The pawns are allowed to move forward one space at a time. while capturing an opponent's piece, they are permitted to move diagonally to the left or right, depending on where the piece to be aspaused is located.

Rooks can move for any distance in arptraight bine forward, backward, or side-ways.

The knights move in an L shape, to the left, right, forward or backward.

The bishops can move any distance, diagonally forward or diagonally back-ward.

The king is allowed only one space at a time in any direction. He has a privilege which no other piece has, that is castling.
The rook takes part in this

move, it can only be made

if the spaces between the rook and king are clear. Castling is compleated by moving either rook to the position of the king, and the king to the position of the rook. Castling is allowed only once during the game, and cannot be done if the king is in check.

The queen is the most powerful piece on the board. She can move for any distance, in any direction as long as the path is clear.

The aim of chess is to force surrender on the opponent's king. When a piece attacks the king, he is said to be in "check". If the king can not be defended, he is "checkmated" and the game is over. When neither player is able to "checkmate", the game is drawn.



One example of the value raise involved with stamps is the issuence of the MOON-WALK stamp. This stamp was issued in a Se-Tenat format; the two stamps of different design were printed in the same sheet. When issued they could be bought for face value, but when I went to the A.S.D.A. show, one dealer was offering to pay almost \$40 for a sheet, which was five times more than the original value.

Another popular kind of stamps that are worth saving are those with errors. Some of the more common errors are imperforates (stamps with no perforations around them), misplaced perforations, color changes, or the shifting of design.

When almost everyone around the world . was preparing to celebrate the oncoming New Year, four men were boarding an airplane that was to take them and emergency supplies to the Nicaraguan earthquake victims. The plane, however, never made it to Nicaragua, as it crashed in the waters off the coast of Puerto Rico, Killing all that was aboard.

One of the passenger on that plane was Roberto Clemente, a member of the 1971 World Series Champions Pittsburgh Pirates. Yes, Clemente was killed in the prime of his baseball career, at age 38.

Clemente was the third world reknowned Baseball player to die in 1972. Gil Hodges was the first, as he died on April 2. He managed the New York Mets, and had hopes of leading them to another World Series victory. Jaskie Robinson the first Black in professional basebal] died in late November.

All three men, were at one time in their life associated with the late Branch Rickey, the manager of the old Brooklyn og Dodgers. When Rickey was in power during the Dodgers "heyday," he had in his command both Hodges and Robinson. Before leaving Brooklyn, he had a young outfielde Jackson Jaguars in a 64-63 thriller last named Roberto Clevente, but Rickey was preparing to move his stell to Pittsburgh, scoring attack for the winners with 17 Once he was settled down in the "Steel City" he sent for Roberto, who has until the time of his death, made Pittsburgh and the Pirates his life

All of his baseball career with the Pirates has been very profitable. In 1966 he was voted the Lague's Most Valuable Player, he has played in 12 All-Star games and is one of only 11 players to get 3,000 hits in one season. Roberto was voted outstanding player in the '71 World Series.

Everyone is familar with ClementeAs heriocs on the field, but only the people of his native Puerto Rico can really say what he is like. During the off seasonClemente managed a Puerte Rican National baseball team. At the time of his death, Reberte was considering retiring to his homeland to help the youth,

Roberto Clemente will be inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame. The normal five years of waiting will be dropped to allow his admittance. The five years of waiting has only been lifted once before, this was to admit Lou Gerhig before he died.

Roberto Clemente will live on in the hearts of all his fans. People will long remember that New Bears Eve when life hit a grand slam that Clemente was unable to field.

Hockey Team Takes 2nd Place



In a message prepared in henor of the 197th Anniversary of the United States Marine Corps, the following statement was made. "There is no generation gap among Marines. Your officers and senior enlisted men, wise in experience, furnish the guidance and set the moral tone. Your young members accept their leadership with the knowledge that it is they who are the inheritors and the beneficiaries of the ideals which the Marine Corps has so successfully perpetuated throughout our nation's history." The message was signed, Richard M. Nixon, President of the United States.
