Miss Marano feels many boys became interested in her class last year when they met at the Home Economics house for Psychology Seminars.

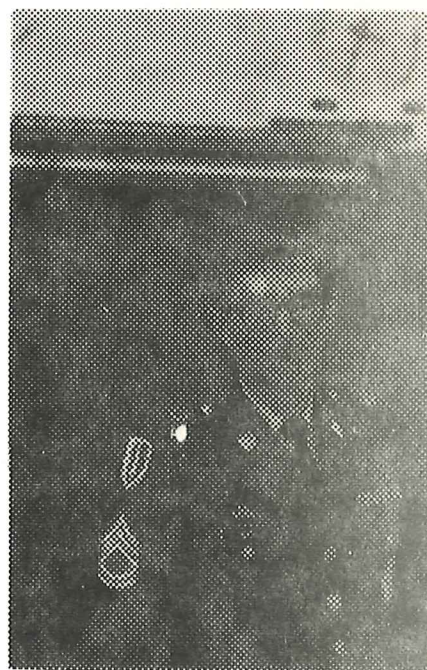
During the seminars delicious aromas attracted many of the boys to the kitchen, and on some occasions, Miss Marano invited them in to eat dinner or baked cookies.

TOUR CONTINENT

Manasquan teachers do travel! As evidenced by the recent trips abroad that three of our teachers, Mrs. Bates, Miss More, and Mr. Angersbach made. The three managed to cover quite a few European countries this summer. Although Mr. Angersbach took a different tour over to Germany, he did meet Mrs. Bates later in Paris with his wife.

Mrs. Bates traveled alone for three weeks on a Ural pass, which is a railroad pass that allowed her to see Italy, Austria, Germany, Denmark, the Arctic Circle, France, and Holland, before she finally met Miss More and six students in Madrid. Lesley Hall, David Dickson, Jeff Bryant, Mr. Wielert's daughter, and two students from another high school traveled with Mrs. Bates and Miss Miss More from July 7 to July 28.

The first week was spent in Madrid with day trips to Toledo, Segovia, and Escorial. An interesting portion of the trip was spent in Morocco. The students arrived in Tan-

giere by way of a ferry.

When asked if she enjoyed traveling with the students, Mrs. Bates replied, "Yes, I did. And since our group was so small, it was just like traveling with a family."

Mr. Angersbach left June 16 with twenty students from Ft. Boro High School for Germany. They spent time primarily in Munich, but also visited Salzburg and Innsbruck in Austria.

After completing this tour, Mr. Angersbach visited with his family in Kassel, Germany. He and his wife then set out on their own for Luxembourg, Paris, Switzerland, and Austria to look into hotels in preparation for summer tours. Mr. and Mrs. Angersbach drove back to Kassel and then to Salzburg, Austria again.

From Austria they traveled to Yugoslavia and around Albania along the Adriatic coast and south to the Greek border. They visited Athens for eight days and took in the Acropolis. They also spent two days on the northern coast of Greece.

In regards to Mr. Angersbach's first trip to Greece, he comments, "It was partly to take a vacation without groups and Greece was new to me, I'd never been there before. It's a tourist attraction where eventually I might run a tour. I always prefer to have been to the country previously."

This spring both Mrs. Bates and Mr. Angersbach will be busy guiding tours again. Mrs. Bates is scheduled to tour Spain while Mr. Angersbach will return once again to Germany.
