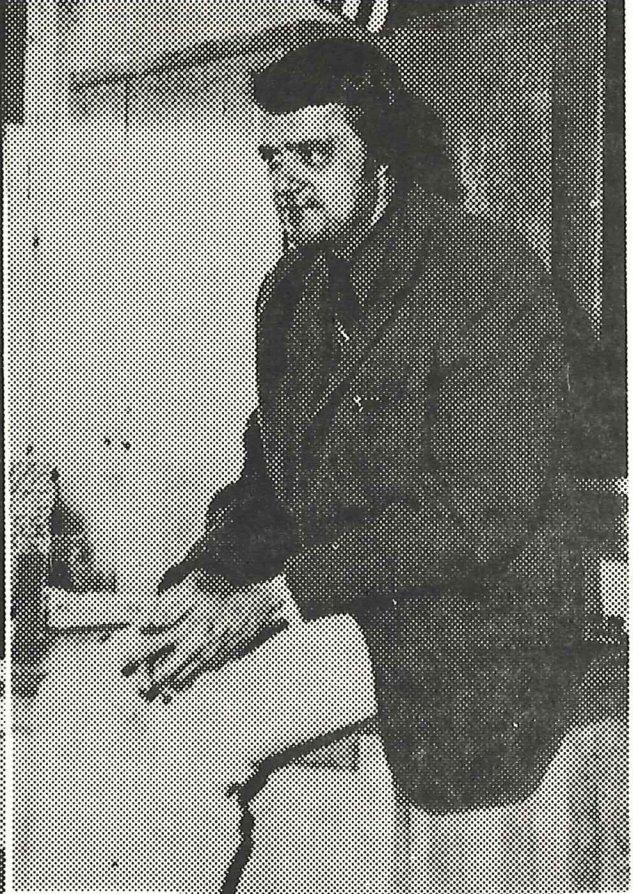
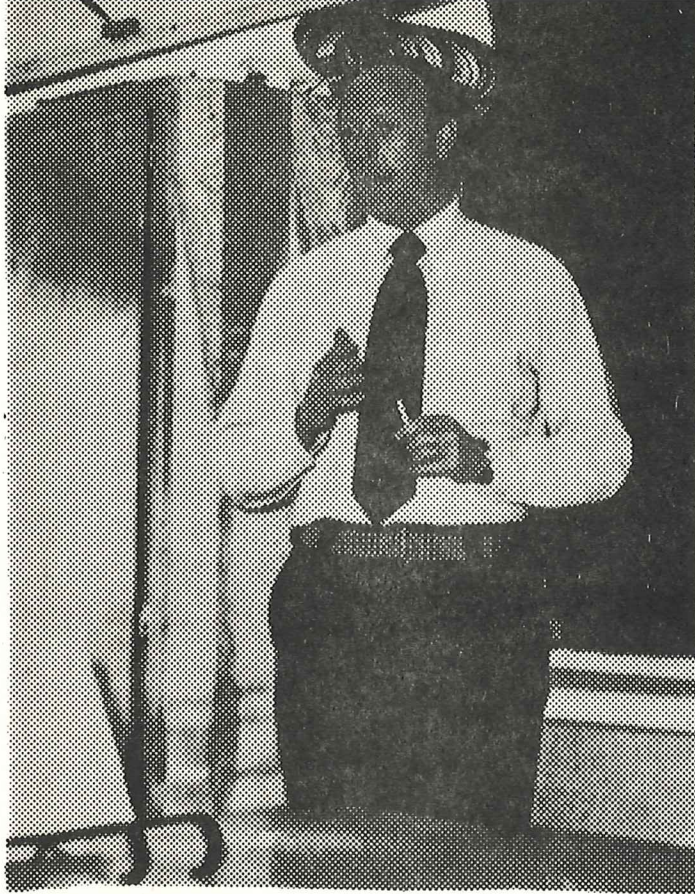

In other words, the Kennedy proposal increases the deficit, while the amount in the budget remains constant:

Kennedy Proposal	\$304 billion	\$290 billion	\$14 billion

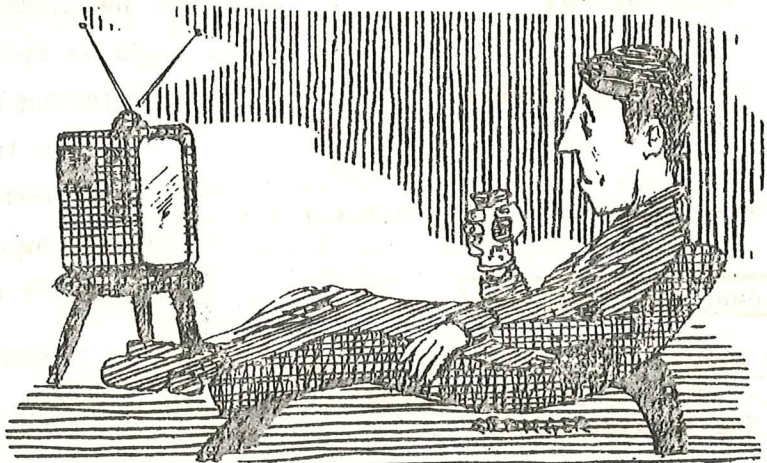
As you can see this doesn't cut the budget. It simply increases the deficit, while slicing taxes for a short period. Eventually, Americans will pay greater for this madness since the deficit is payed by borrowing (with high interest rates). It costs you nearly \$30 billion annually to pay the interest on the \$500 billion national debt.

Deficit spending causes inflation by increasing the money supply. When a government runs a deficit, the amount of money in it is put into circulation - bidding up prices. The money supply has increased from \$48 billion in 1933 to \$525 billion in 1972. Prices are gaining because the money supply is increasing. Prices decreased during the depression because the money supply was cut. The German government in 1923 increased the money supply until prices changed hourly. You had to bring a wheelbarrel full of money just to buy a loaf of bread.

Senator Kennedy isn't cutting taxes. Instead, he is sending us toward a depression with his brainstorms. Beware the con !

Four seniors at Manasquan High School have found out what the Army's delayed entry program is all about.

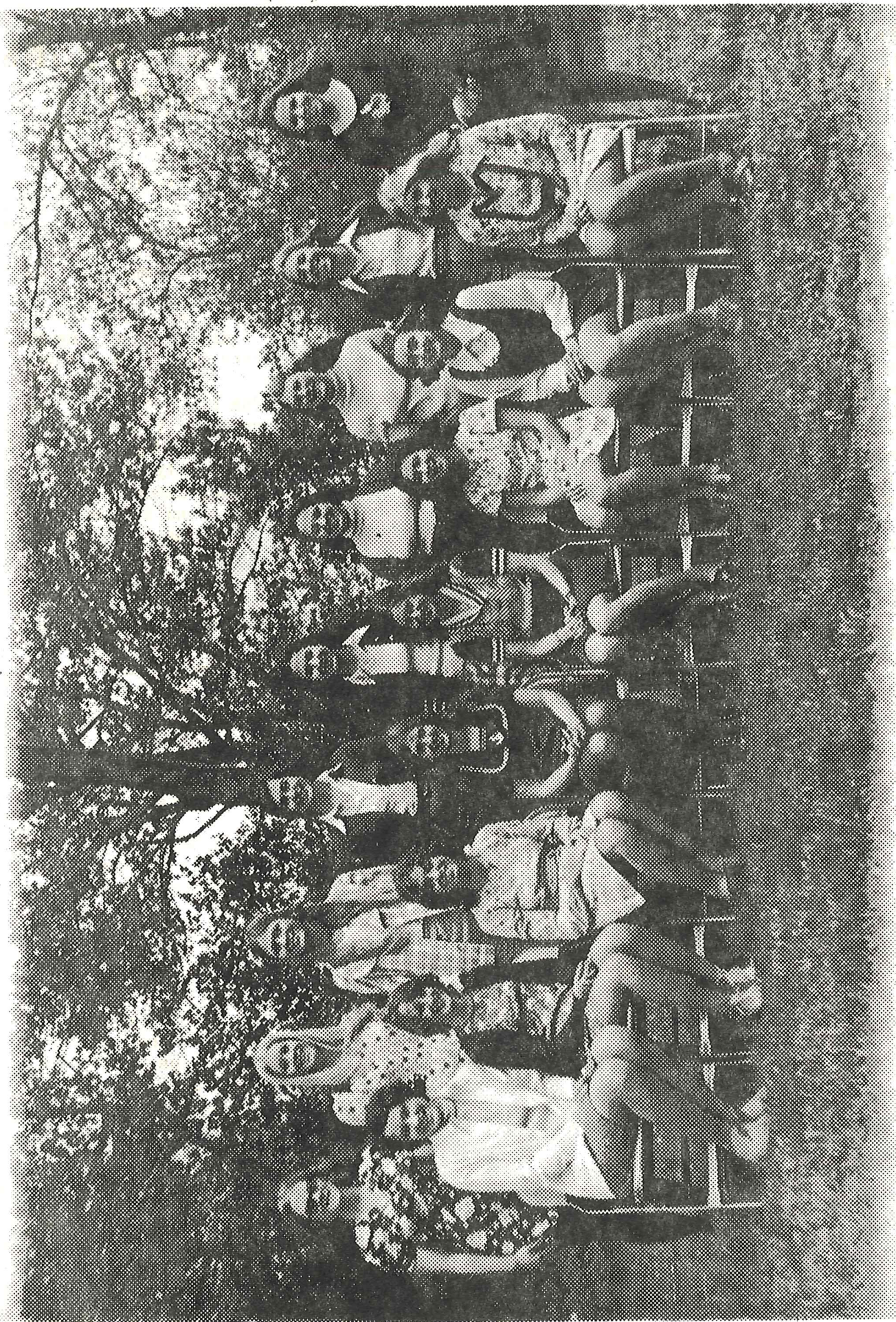

All four enlisted through the Neptune City Recruiting Station.

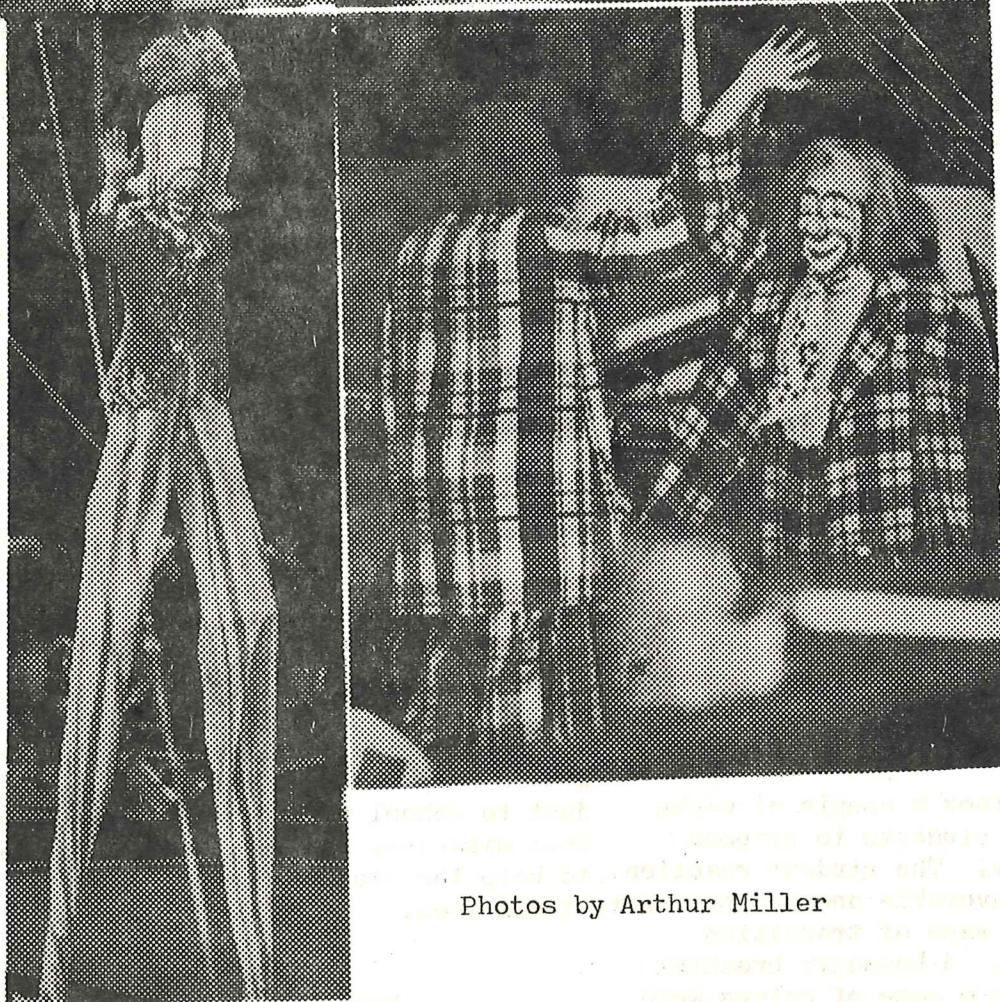

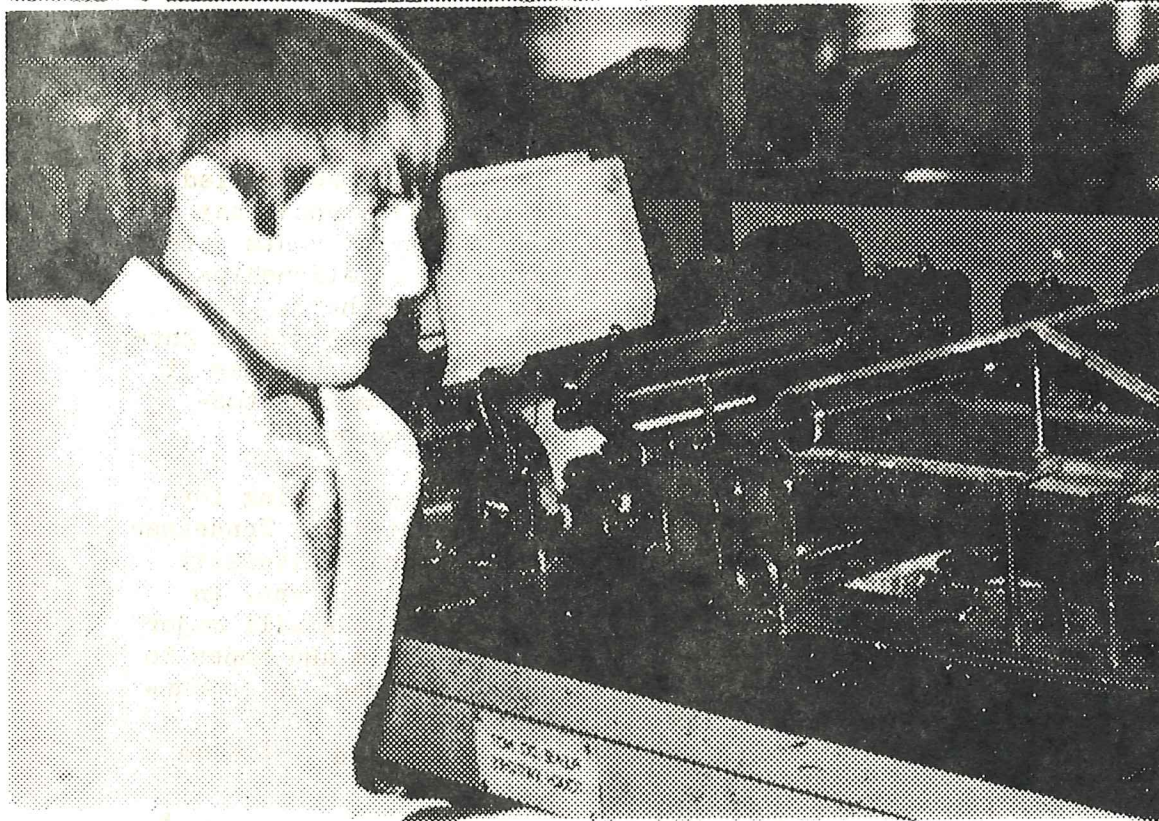

every inning.

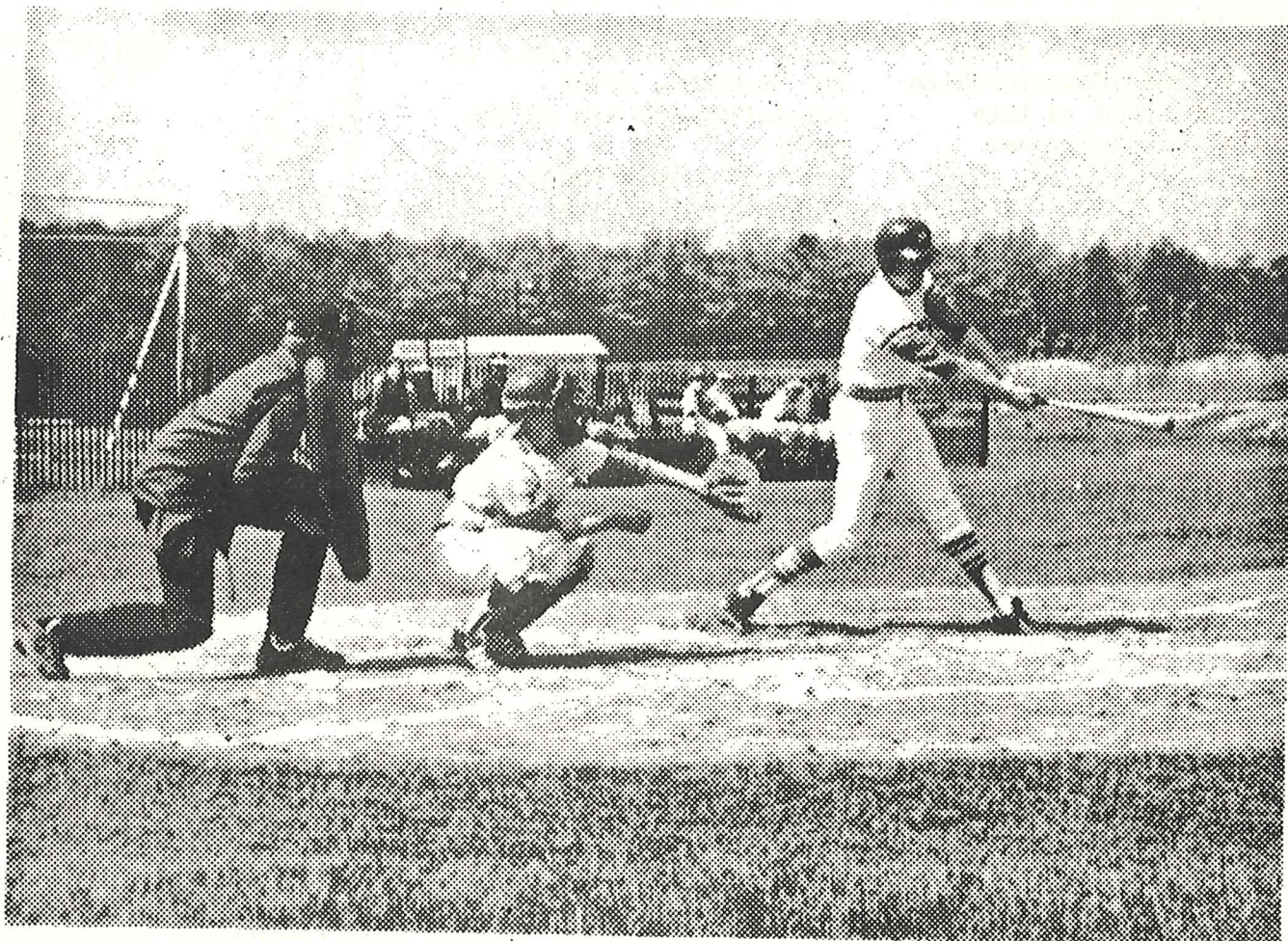

Squan is now 10-8 overall, and 5-7 in Class B.

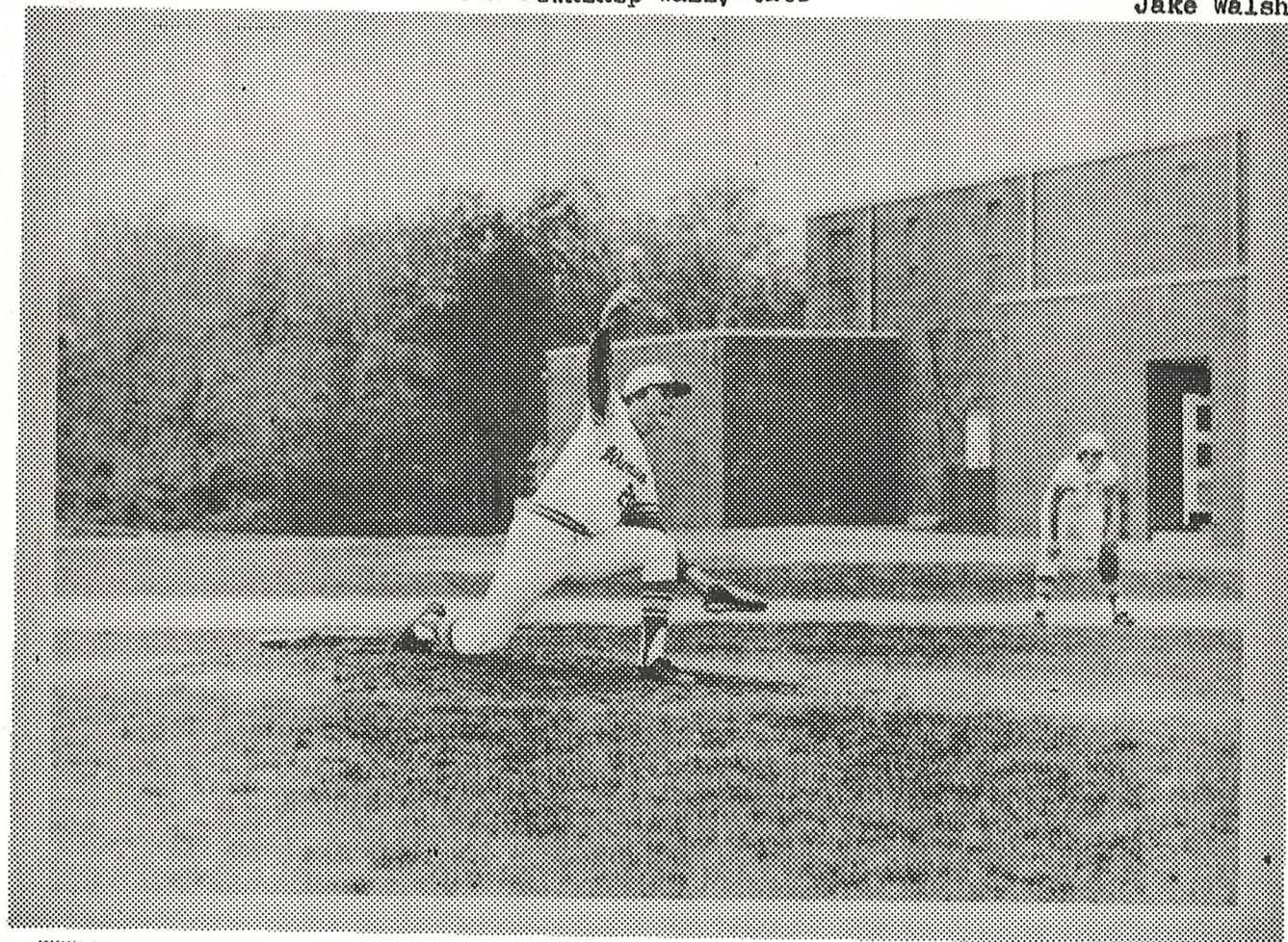
Today, Big Blue starts the State Tournament against Long Branch at their field. The winner of this game advances to the winner of the Ocean-Township-Wall, State

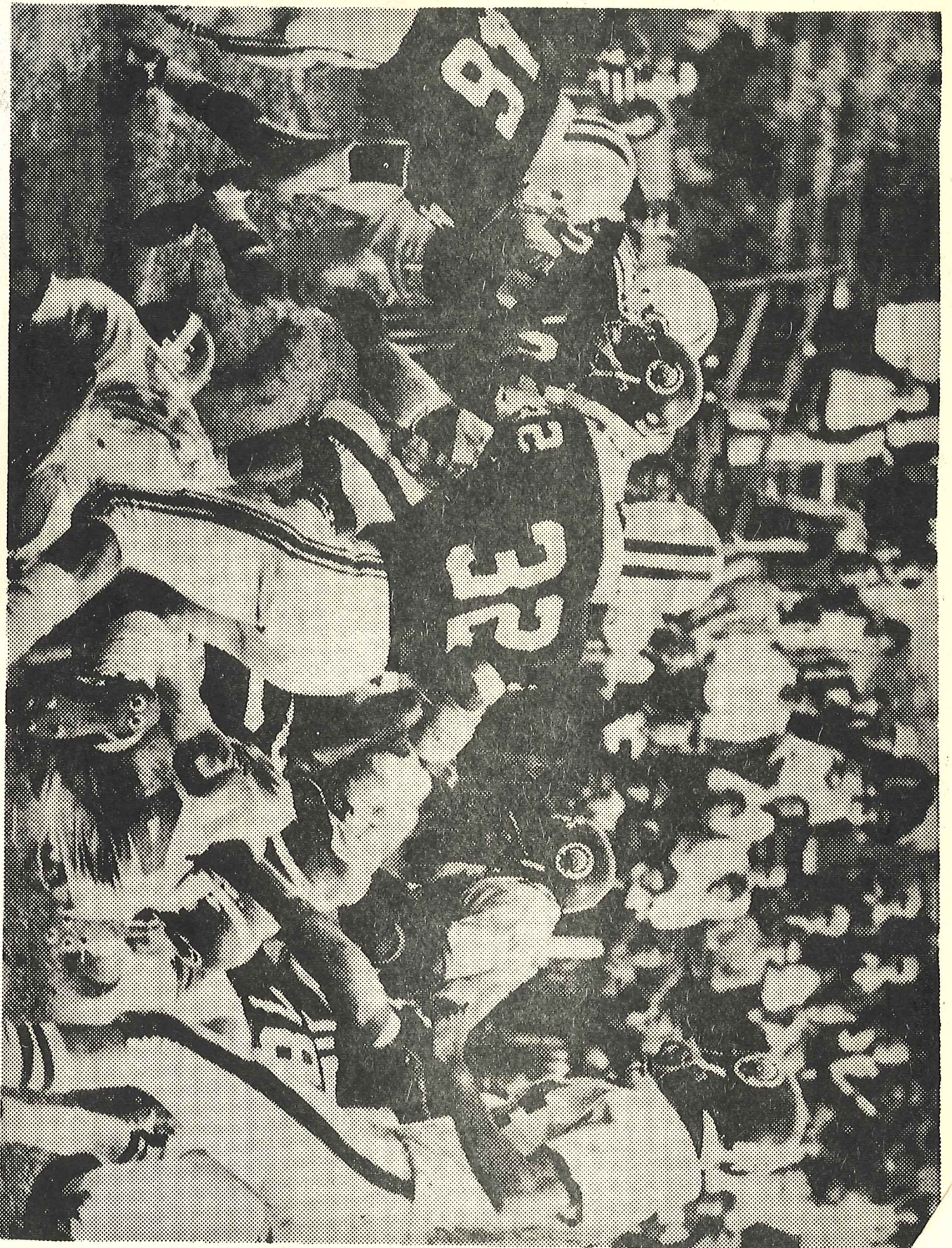
