


McCormack Secures Department Head




Mr. Cary McCormack


This well-known teacher applied for this position and was notified by Dr. Thomas O'Rourke that he was selected. "It was my first step upwards and besides, I like being a leader."



National Honor Society Inducts 20

The National Honor Society requirements have been changed to allow an equal opportunity for everyone. "The old system wasn't clean cut enough to be fair," stated Mrs. Patricia Limpantsis, National Honor Society adviser.

The academic requirements were raised from a 4.2 to 4.5 average. Students must obtain points which are given for school and community activities, employment and volunteer work. Potential candidates have to fill out an activity sheet and have it signed by their adviser or employer.

"After the faculty sheets are accepted, the faculty votes on each student's character and leadership qualities," stressed Mrs. Limpantsis. Three negative votes eliminate a student from the selection.

The National Honor Society is offered to sophomores and juniors which enables them more time to work on their points. Sophomores must have twelve points and juniors, twenty points to be considered for the National Honor Society.

Awards Night has been changed from January to April 26. Last Wednesday a special induction was held for the seniors who missed the selection at the end of their junior year. This will only take place this year to make up for the difference in the changing of the Awards Night.

Because senior inductees were selected under the 4.2 academic requirements, this group of new members was allowed to seek membership under the old requirements.

"We are the Beta Omega Chapter of the National Honor Society which is sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The qualifications for membership are excellence in scholarship, service, leadership and character," stated the adviser.

The National Honor Society initiated a tutoring program for elementary and high school students and a student exchange program. The members also maintain an honor roll bulletin board, publish the student hand book and conduct the Academic Awards Night.


NEWS ITEM: PELE FINISHES IMPORTANT CAREER.

If your answers were true, true and b), it could be that you're one who shoots off his opinion without checking the facts, if you had any to begin with. If you chose false, false and c), you are ready to contribute to an useful and important Board-student relationship. Question one is a myth so old that Socrates would laugh. Many students use this "rule" as an excuse not to attend Board meetings. You are only hurting your chances of improving Manasquan High School by not voicing your opinions. This leads to question two which, if true, would be against the U.S. Constitution. When at Board meetings, feel free to ask questions about topics that you don't understand or present an opinion that you feel the Board should know to make the right decision. And contrary to popular belief, students' opinion banded together in petition form, can change a Board decision. The Board's decision to release Miss Linda Leitstein was reversed, by a good part, by student opinion. This is a great example of Student Rights.

One item which must be understood is that the Board of Education is only human. They do make mistakes, occasionally. But most people in Manasquan are far too critical of the Board's errors and not at all congratulatory when the group makes a good decision. If you are going to be someone that loves to pick apart Board members, at least be fair and tell the Board about a decision you approved of. In improving the Board and the apathy situation, good communications are essential. The Board usually comes through on their half of the bargain, by answering questions at Board meetings and providing two public forums for the public to express their opinion. The Board could go a little further by going out and getting the man-on-the-street's opinion so they wouldn't be so surprised at the audience's questions. On the other hand, Manasquan citizens could ask intelligent questions at the public forums and try to avoid "attacking" the Board on every move they make. The Board has to do a lot more good than bad otherwise the school would not be running as well under such inhumane environment such as double sessions.

The students should also understand just how much power that the Board has in running the school. They have all the power, which may not be such a good idea. No matter how young or old a Board member is, he can just not look at the school from a student's point of view, unless he think like a student. I don't know why people are afraid to do this. Always thinking, "How much money is it going to cost us?" is a shallow way of thinking of a student's education, the most important tool that anyone will go through life with. If the Board allowed a teacher's, student's, and parent's point of view before making a decision, they wouldn't have a hassle of arguement at a public meeting, which can be embarrassing for everyone.

I hope that the students start to appreciate the importance of themselves in a school system. We are the prime concern and we should have a say about how are education is handled.




It would be wrong for the public to have a say in the management aspect of sports. There are many phases of sports that the uninformed would misconstrue. This misinformation could be detrimental to the team.


5.) Right now there is so much confusion about where to park. I feel something should be done about getting the students a parking lot.

WETTE DIGHT STOP THE WOTELS


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Ratings have not been high in TV for comedians trying to do variety shows. But NBC is taking the odds and putting their money on the "Richard Pryor Show" to break this recent stereotype. Richard Pryor, master of the standup comedy act, has done a few specials before but has never had his own show. He said that he will try to reach many people with his show, people of all ages and that's why it airs at 8 p.m. on Tuesday. Known for his expertise in pantomine and clowning, he does a lot of skits in the show with kids. Most of these are really funny and keep the younger viewers happy. The format of this variety offering is different than others in its class; there is almost no music. It's comedy all the way through. Richard starts with his standup act and follows with skits. Frisbee has taken on new dimensions, other than the game of catch played on the beach. It has become a legitimate sport with a championship held in the Rose Bowl. However, it still has a long way to go to be a major sport such as football or baseball.

The most difficult of these are, "Do you wanna be abused?" and "Ha your mother." When using a Tullism, one must remember to use a nasal tone or all effect will be lost.



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
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

Warrior Defense (continued)


The Wall game, which seems a distant past, and almost anti-climatic after the big conference win over Rumson, was also won by the Warriors,

The Warriors scored less than five minutes later when Carl Mennie recovered a Wall fumble on the Knight 47. The offense drove the 47 yards in 7 plays with Bob Briant going over for the 1-yard touchdown plunge. The big play of the drive was a 34-yard run by quarterback Gary Bridges.

There was no scoring through the remainder of the game with the Warrior offense never getting on track and the defense styming Wall. The game was not very exciting because Squan was unable to move the ball on offense although the game was very competitive defensively. The first score came late in the first quarter when Rumson scored on a run from inside the 20 yard line, but the extra point failed so the score at the end of the first period stayed at 6-0.

The second quarter was much the same as the first with Squan's defense playing tough, but the offense was unable to move at all. Rumson looked very strong running all over Manasquan's defensive attack. Rumson again worked their way down the gridiron to pick up 6 more points and unfortunately the first half ended with a score of 14-0 in favor of Rumson.

In the winter Carl participates in the Manasquan weightlifting program and owns five school records; among these he holds the dead lift record of 450 pounds.


During track season Carl throws the shot put. Last year was his first season and he should see varsity action this spring.

After graduation Melinda plans to attend college and major in law.

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
