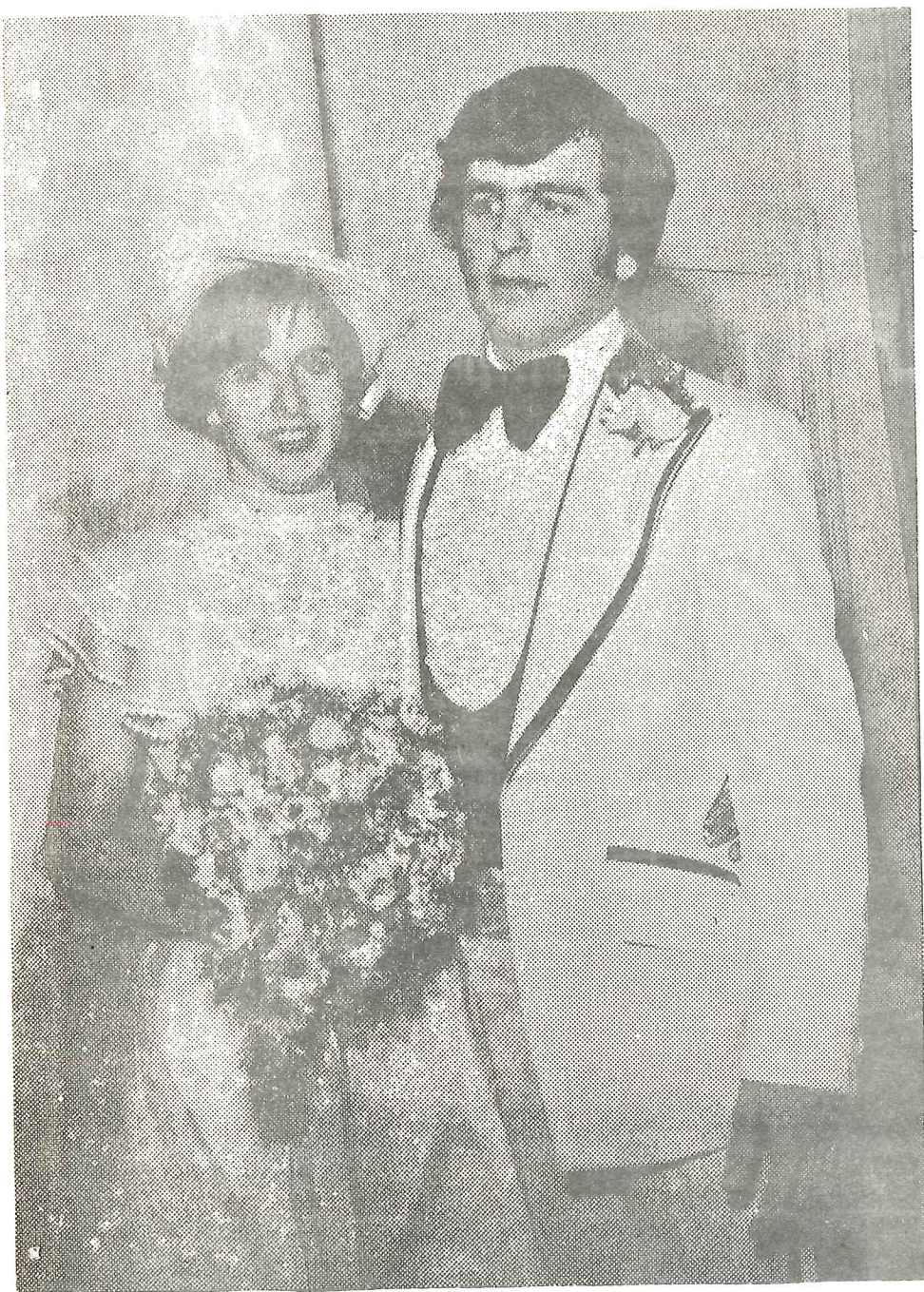

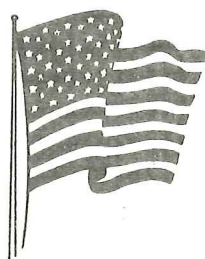

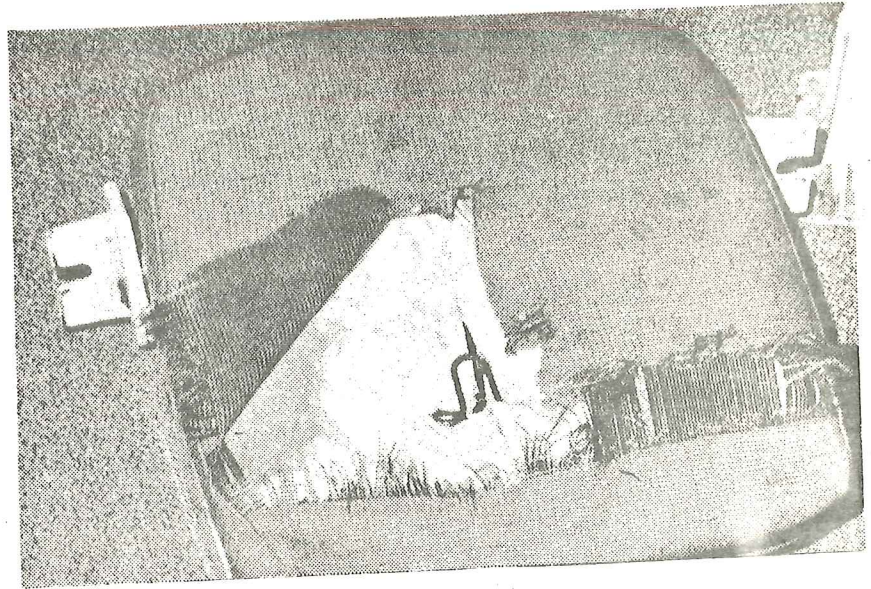
Lastly, the Doctor's familiar American flag lapel pin is worn with dignity and his students recognize it to be as much a part of his daily attire as his tie or his pants.

(Upper right) Cushioned seats aren't worth a cent when they are in this condition. This is surely an act of vandalism.



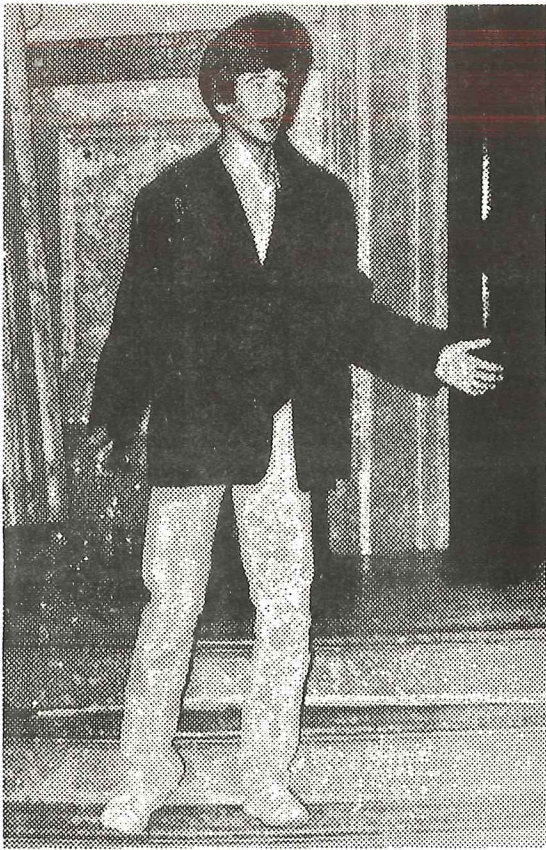

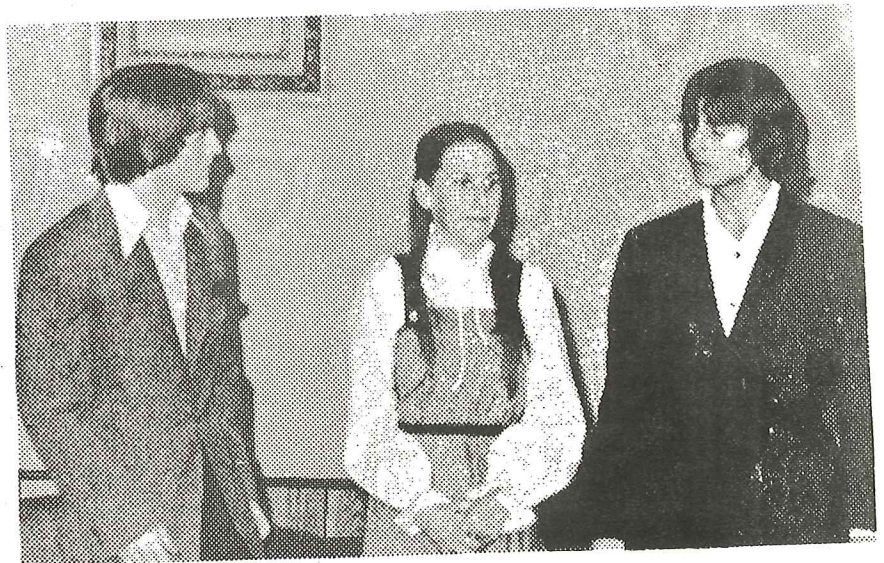

It's All in A Name

Energy Conservation Needed

Americans have adopted a lax attitude toward our energy problems. Everybody wants energy conservation legislation but nobody wants it for himself. The general public response has been, "Let the other guy handle it."

The Carter administration and Congress have worked months trying

to assemble a meaningful and effective energy program. President Carter has proposed slapping penalty taxes on people who buy big, gas-guzzling vehicles. The Senate and the House remain divided on how the big car issue should be handled.

The Senate has voted to place a \$10,000 tax, in 1980, on each new car that gets less than 16 m.p.g., which would have the same effect as banning production outright.

The House has passed a "watered down" version of the Carter proposal. The House plan would make the tax penalty much lower than the administration wants, and probably prove ineffective.

Detroit car makers and the public have expressed opposition to this tax. Americans continue to buy the large automobiles and ignore American-made, small, energy-efficient cars.

Carter wants to continue price controls on natural gas but allow for a moderate price rise.

Strong forces in Congress favor general deregulation in order to stimulate natural gas production and exploration.

Right now, we have no real shortage and yet we have a real crisis. At our present rate of energy consumption the day of the widespread natural gas shortages, of empty oil pipelines, and once again, of gasoline stations without gas is not far away. It may take a real hardship before some Americans realize that energy conservation is not for the other guy. Everyone must sacrifice to insure America of future energy sources.

The time is now. When the energy sources now available run out, there will not be anyone to blame.

New energy sources are not discovered every day. Americans must rely on what is available. If the wrongs are not righted, Americans might have to revert to energy sources of the early 1900's.

4. Manasquan's next superintendent should be a superhuman person, able to get along with the students, teachers, administrators, tax payers, and Board members.

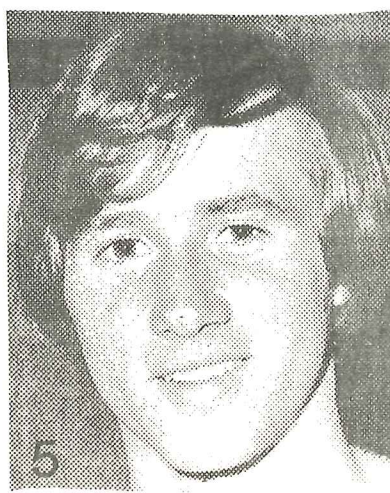
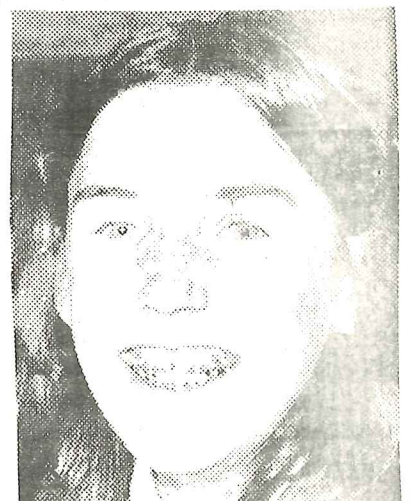
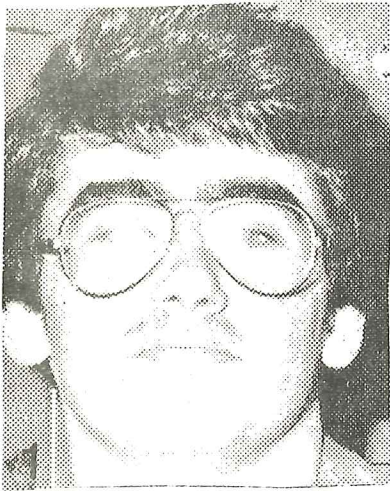

"I feel extremely sad about leaving the Manasquan school system. I love teaching physical education and health here, mostly because I have become attached to all of the students. Although the facilities are not ideal, our department works hard to provide students with a most effective program. I have also enjoyed assisting our talented Drama Club. I only pray that I shall be fortunate to find another teaching position which is as challenging and as satisfying as my experience at Manasquan," stated Miss Linda Leitstein, Girls' Varsity Softball coach.

Miss Leitstein attended Ocean Township High School where she was involved on the track and field team. She was a member of the cheerleading squad, a class officer, a Keyette, leaders' corps, and Drama Club member.

Coach Leitstein attended Montclair State College for two years. The fall semester of her junior year, she attended Portsmouth College in England. During her college years she was involved in cheerleading and intramurals. Her major was physical and health education with a concentration in speech and theatre arts. When asked if she had a masters degree, the coach replied, "No, I would like to work towards a degree in physical education."

After college Miss leitstein was a substitute teacher for Ocean Township schools. She acquired her job at Manasquan in January of 1976. As of May 12, 1978, the team's record stands at 8-3 overall, 8-2 in the conference, and the girls hold the number one spot in their division.

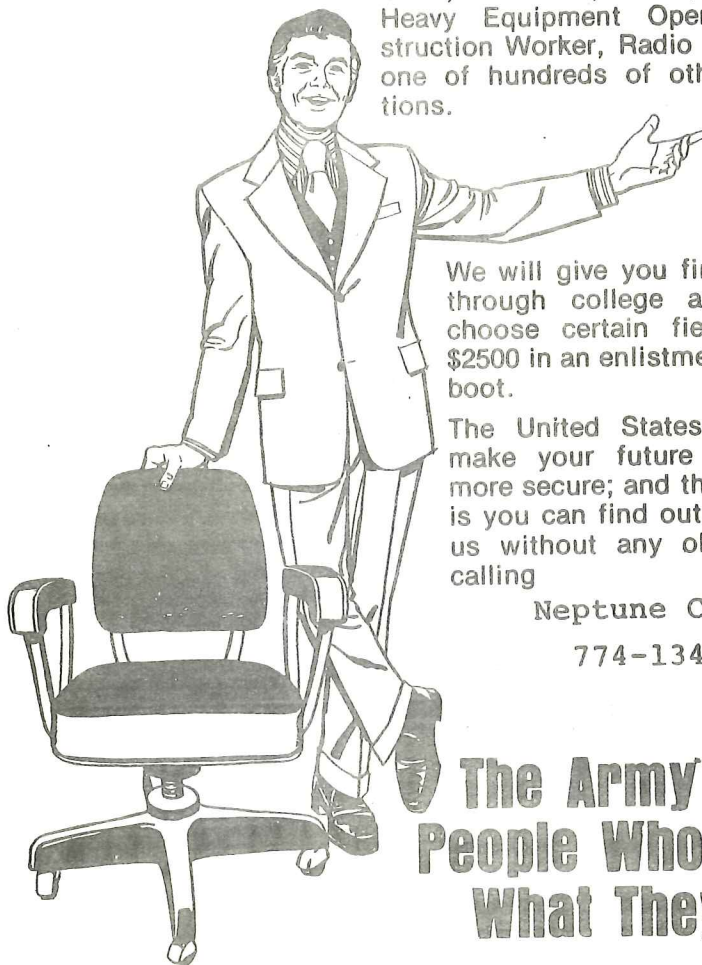

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Golf Team: George Bower's Best Ever?

It has been a busy two weeks for the linksmen and they have faired well increasing their record to 15-2 and 8-2 in conference. They also competed in two tournaments.

Last week the "Big Blue" won its biggest match of the year in an important class B clash with Point Boro and the "Press Athletes of the Week" Pike triplets. Manasquan downed Boro, winners of the Ocean County, Shore Conference, and the State District tournaments, by a score of 3-2. The necessary wins were posted by Charles Sweeney, Eugene Mathews and "Rupert Bonehead" Highley.

Two Mondays ago in the first annual Monmouth County Championship the golf team with the exception of Dave "The Rave" Garrett literally chopped shooting a team score of 352 for four players and placing them ninth out of 20 teams, which isn't bad but it is not up to Manasquan's capabilities. Garrett, who has been playing consistently well as of late, fired an 82 and finished in tie for ninth out of 100 players. Dave, at the fourth man position, has the best average on the team of 41.4 and sports a 10-3 record.

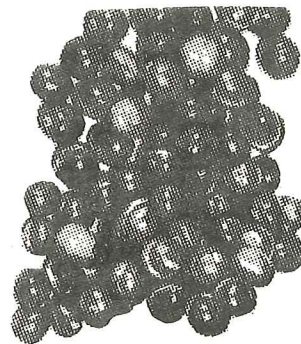

WARRIORS POUND PANTHERS

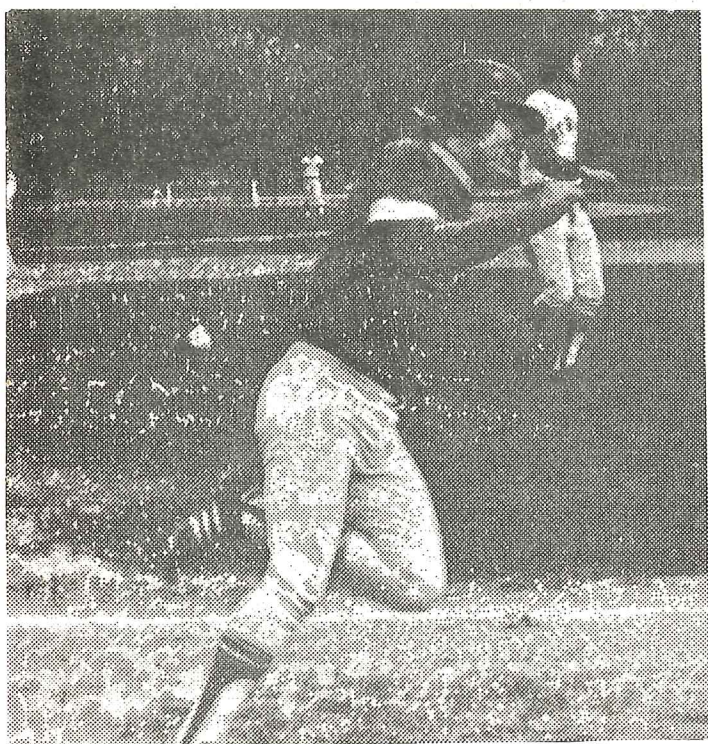

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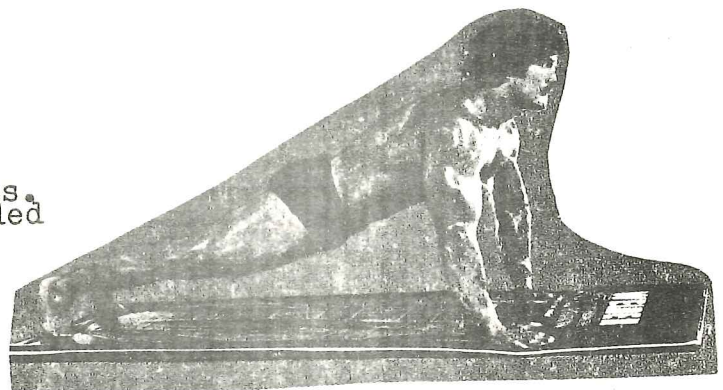
There are many people who would like to get bigger and stronger but are discouraged because they feel they have to go out and buy all sorts of weightlifting equipment such as benches, barbells, dumbbells, squat racks and so forth. Do not be discouraged. One does not need all sorts of weightlifting apparatus to make great gains. One can make do with what he has around the house and if he decides, later on he can buy a little bit of equipment at a time. This way you don't have to go out and buy everything at once and if you want, can buy your apparatus a little at a time when you have the money.

The following is a list of exercises you can do at home with no weightlifting equipment necessary. One of the best all time exercises is pushups. No equipment is necessary and if done properly and with enough drive, great gains can be made throughout the whole upper body. Dips or elevated pushups is another exercise which is great for the upper body. All one needs is three chairs. Place each hand on a chair and your feet on the third. You should be in an elevated pushup position. Perform the exercise like regular pushups and make sure you go all the way down and all the way up. Dips are much harder than regular pushups and super gains can be made. A great exercise for the shoulders, back and arms is the chin-up. Chin-up bars are inexpensive and can even be made. There are many different ways to do chin-ups such as the behind the neck chin, triangle chin and pull ups. The reverse pushup is an exercise intended for the triceps. Place the palms of your hands on one chair and your feet on the other. You should be in an outstretched sitting position. Bend your elbows and go all the way down until rear-end touches the floor then explode back up. Weight can be placed on your stomach to make the exercise harder.

Hard running, as opposed to long distance running, is great for building up leg size. If you compare a sprinter's legs to a long distance runner's legs, you will see that the sprinter's legs are bigger. This is because he is running intensely with everything he has for a short distance while a long distance runner saves his energy for the long trek. This is not to say that long distance running will not build up your legs, because it will, but not as good as hard running. Squat thrusts are also good for your legs as is sitting against the wall forming a human chair.

These are only several exercises you can do at home without weights. These exercises are great for making gains but if you really want to get involved in powerlifting or bodybuilding, then it would be wise to get a bench and some weights.

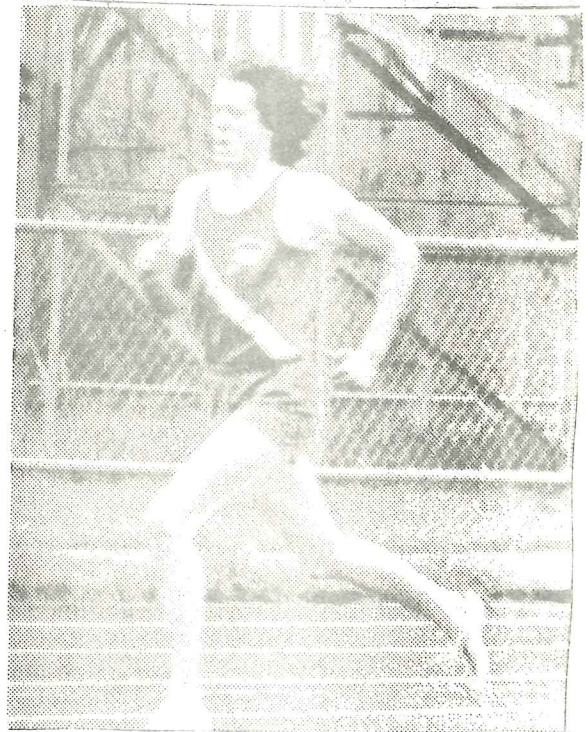
Pushups Roger Callard style.

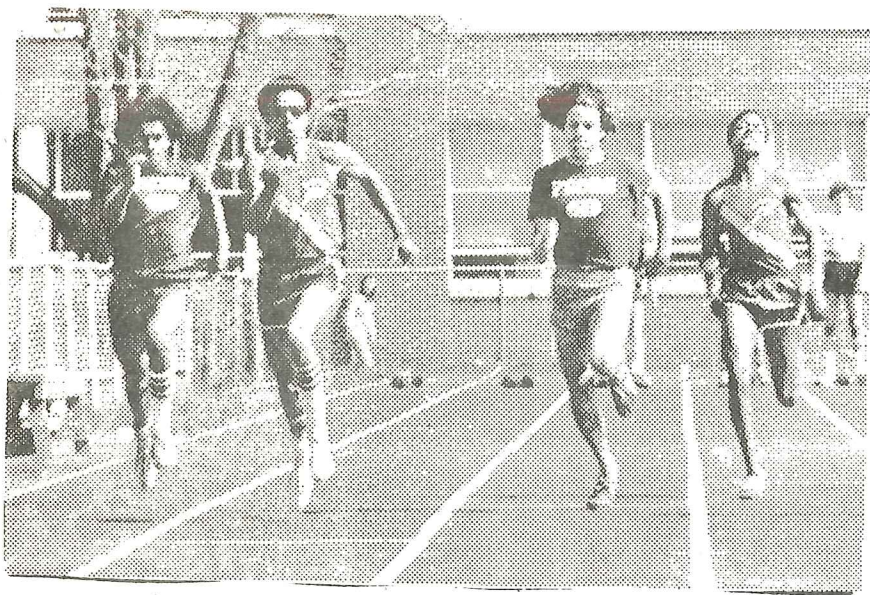


Manasquan's distancemen include (clockwise from above right) John Rogers, Pat Llewellyn, Pete Smith, and Mark Librizzi.



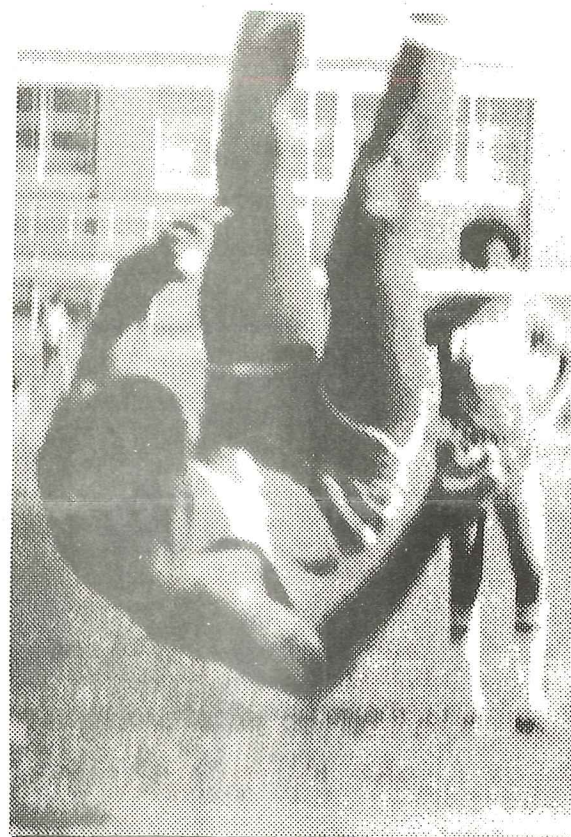

Manasquan's attack was stifled the remainder of the matchup while the Patriots were able to pick up two additional runs.

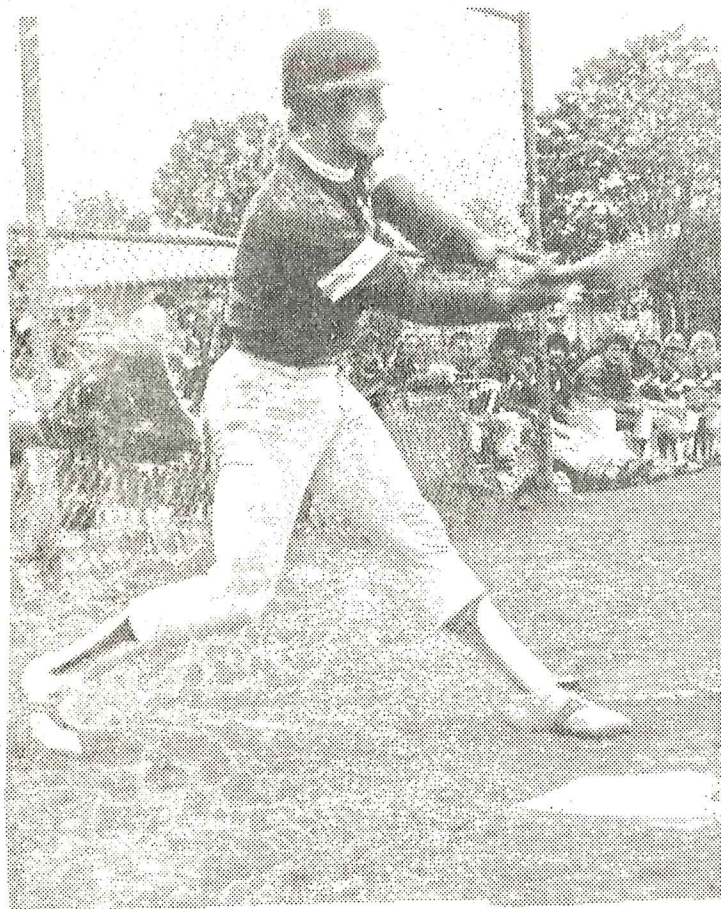

Athlete of the Week



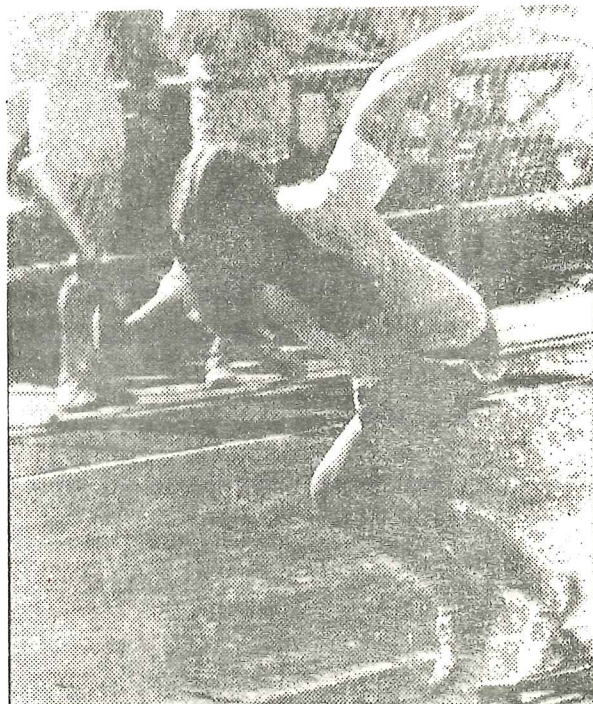
Herb Hinsel

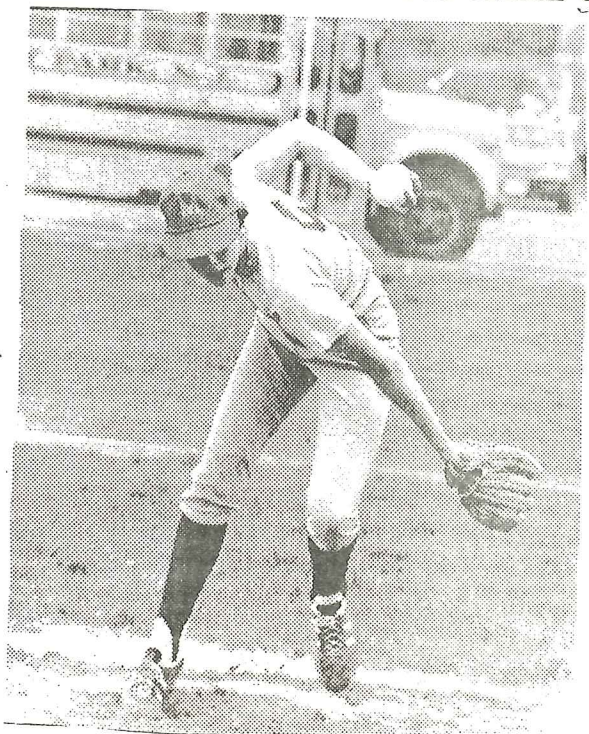
Squan dropped temporarily into a three way tie for first place when they lost to Asbury on May 10. The score of the home game was 10-6
