



# Architect's Blueprints - A Dream Become Reality



The picture on the left shows the final plans for the new addition if it passes. The addition will extend towards Broad Street within 25 feet. In the rear of the building, the cafeteria has been expanded with three extra classrooms added. To the right of the cafeteria is the media center and library. Towards the front, an auditorium as well as an entire music department will be added on.

Crossing over an enclosed bridge leads into another section. A new auxiliary gym, lab science rooms and classrooms have been drawn in.


Another enclosed ramp will lead to the new Industrial Arts Center and the existing Arts and Crafts building.

The second level, the picture on the right, has a business resource center, a faculty library, work area, more classrooms and science lab rooms.

Ramps have been drawn in place of stairways. They will prevent "traffic jams" and confusion.


The existing areas have been outlined on the pictures to show readers the size of the new addition.

The second level over the cafeteria has been used for extra rooms instead of being wasted.



The swimming pool, which has been drawn in the final plans is still not definite until it has been voted upon in a separate referendum by each sending district. The olympic size pool will be built in place of an auxiliary gym. It can be beneficial and used by outsiders to pay for the cost.

The gym or the pool will be extended towards the football field, but not on it. If the addition and or the pool is built, the outside facilities will have to be moved eventually to other sites located in the borough.

### Will It Pass This Time?

"We have converted all closets, nooks and cranies and there is no space left anywhere. I believe having classes, especially English, meeting four times a week, affects students' SAT scores," explained high school principal, Mrs. Carole Knopp.

"For the past 17 years, the people of the community have been talking about a new addition. They have been concerned but it always failed to pass," stated Manasquan superintendent, Dr. Thomas O'Rourke.

If you are still confused, I will explain. A meeting was held in the Manasquan elementary school on January 23 concerning final plans for a new school addition on the high school. Board members, students and other citizens from the seven sending districts attended in order to add their own viewpoints on the situation.

The most dramatic changed proposed will be the extension of the proposed building within 25 feet of Broad Street. In the rear of the gym, the building will be extended towards the football field to incorporate a new auxiliary gym. A new wing will be constructed in front of the existing industrial arts building.

The grand total project cost will be \$8,852,242. Over seven million of this amount is for basic construction of the new addition and updating all existing areas. The remainder of this is divided between the cost of the new equipment and fees.



If sending district citizens are as enthusiastic as architect Quentin E. Armstrong is concerning his blue prints, we may just have that proposed addition after all. Manasquan students, cross your fingers and pray, it's going to be a long fight.

# D.E.C.A. Takes 4 First Places

"I was really nervous and I didn't think I would win, but when they announced my name, Gayle LaVance said you could see my skirt shaking from the back of the auditorium," excitedly stated Nancy Oriscello.

Every year, a D.E.C.A. Central Region Mini Conference is held at Middlesex County College. This year there were 42 high schools from Carteret to Toms River South and as far west as Trenton who attended, averaging over 600 students.

Four buildings were occupied for different areas of testing. Each student was tested on one or more competencies depending on the field of study.

The winners, and their awards are Gayle LaVance, honorable mention; Dot Horner, first place all around; Jean Keil, second place; Nancy Oriscello, first place all around; Bruce Wissel, second place; Lisa "Monty" Montana, first place all around; Mark Lord, honorable mention; Tom White, first place all around; Mike Reddington, honorable mention; and Elliot Meyers, honorable mention.

There next step is to the states being held at Great Gorge in McAffee, New Jersey on March 13,14 and 15. Depending on these results, the winners will then move to the Nationals.

"It was really worthwhile and a great experience," said senior Jean Keil. "I can't wait until the states."

"I'm really proud of all the students. Out of seven first places, Manasquan D.E.C.A. took four of them. The students made a great showing and the high school should be very proud of them," concluded Mr. "Buffy" Silva.

Lastly to speak was Board President Mr. Robert Solt. The college graduate is employed by the Berry Metal Service


Division of the Berry Group. "I do not succumb to pressure groups and their tactics. When making a deci-

What else can be said about our country's "Fallen Warrior," Hubert Horatio Humphrey, who died two weeks ago? Since the senator's death, thousands of writers have come out of the woodwork to hail the champion of civil rights in our country. It makes me wonder why they didn't say anything before about a man who deserved more credit than he received during his lifetime. Ah, but this is always the way, to praise a man after he has passed away. Criticism never stopped Humphrey though, he kept right on voicing his ideas.

In the last two decades Hubert Humphrey's name had become synonomous with defeat. Nothing could be further from the truth. Though he lost two tries for the presidency, Mr. Humphrey, in the Senate, was the power that pushed for the Civil Rights Bill of 1964. Showing remarkable persuasion powers, he almost single-handedly convinced all of the Republican Senators to pass the bill. He risked his political career so that all people in the United States could enjoy their freedom. "Hubie" sponsored bills in the Senate that were designed to make jobs for people, to insure that they would have better health care, and he also made vital trips to foreign allies to; assure them of our support.

Well, one of my main wishes in the Christmas issue for the coming year has not come true. Losing "the conscience of our nation" as he was called by someone, has given us all a lesson on how to die. Though riddled with cancer, the man's optimism overcame his pain and doubts. Humphrey finished his Senate session last year despite his noticeable deterioration, and also pushed hard for the passage of President Carter's energy bill that looks like it may make it now. His advice was more often taken than anyone else's in the Senate. I might also add that no matter what political differences he had with his colleagues, he was a friend of everyone in that body.

Any man that had the heart to call Richard Nixon and wish him a happy birthday, after that man had dealt Humphrey the biggest defeat in his life in the presidential election of 1968, had to be special. Nixon attended the memorial services in Washington, a move that showed decency and respect for the former Vice President. For at least that day in Washington therewere no Republicans or Democrats or rivals in the Capitol; there were only people mourning the death of a great leader. The most valid statement at the memorial service was made by Jimmy Carter when he said "Hubert always wanted to be President but never quite made it. Perhaps he could have made a better one than anyone in this room." Hubert would have made a good one. In fact, maybe we wouldn't be in the trouble we are now if he had made it. Every Black, Hispanic, or other minority can thank Hubert Humphrey every time they go to a good school, drink from a water fountain, or graduate from a college. They can thank him for having the courage to fight for their rights.

NEWS ITEM: COWBOYS ARE SUPER.



When you venture out into the wild, you'll need more than just a camera with a normal lens.

The following is a checklist of the basic equipment needed for top quality work in the field.

- 1. Single-lens reflex camera body.
- Wide-angle and/or telephoto lens equipped with skylight filters and carrying cases.
- 3. Light meter if the camera dosen't have one built in.
  - 4. Tripod
  - 5. Cable release
  - 6.Plenty of film
  - 7. Camera bag or case


This is just a very basic list of equipment to take on trips because of portability, performance and weight.


Below: I thought I'd put this in just to make you fellow photographers drool. The camera is a 2 1/4 Hasselblad 500 EL/M. It has a built in motor drive for up to five frames per second capability. Using the 500mm Zeiss Tele-Tessar T\*lens with gunstock specially designed to shoot at speeds down to 1/125 of a second without a tripod. The Hasselblad has centerweighted meter prism viewfinder.

My next article will be entitled "Animals - Free and Captive" which will go into the "how to" and the "what not to do" of photographing animals around your home and those captive in the home and zoo.



Pink Floyd's original lead guitarist, Syd Barret, was the topic of a recent trivia question. To most people, Pink Floyd's lyrics make no sense. They don't realize that the songs are about Syd Barret and his insanity.

Pink Floyd's original album met critical acclaim when it was released in the mid 1960's. This album was so good that Pink Floyd was the first Rock group to receive a million dollar contract, beating out the Rolling Stones and even the Beatles.

"I like the idea of being viewed by people so they can see what a hard working organization we are. Also when spring comes around, we will be able to open the




doors and have a nice 76 degree breeze to enjoy," said Jay Moglia.



# 1978 NEW CAR REVIEW BY SCOTT BELIVEAU

The Fiesta, Ford's "gutsy little street fighter", seats four adult passengers comfortably and has EIA mileage ratings of 46 miles per gallon highway and 34 city. The Fiesta may look like the Volkswagen Rabbit, but it does the Rabbit and others in its class one better with a base sticker price of about \$4000.

The Fiesta comes with a 1.6 litre engine mounted transverse. This means that the engine is mounted pointing side to side instead of front to back. By using the transverse mounting, Ford has created a compact car with more front seat leg room than any other car of its dize. Accompanying this spunky little engine is a floor-mounted four-speed manual transmission.

Ford has dealt with the problems of steering and traction on snow and ice by equipping the Fiesta with front-wheel drive.

Standard interior features worth mentioning include front adjustable reclining bucket seats, a fold-down bench style rear seat, inside hood release, and a foot pedal operated windshield washer.

A standard exterior feature that adds to the sporty look is the Argent wheels with Michelin BSW steel belted radials. Two other features that not only add to the car's looks but also improve handling, are a front air dam and a rear roof spoiler.

Underneath, the car is equipped with rack and pinion steering, MacPherson front suspension, and front disc brakes.

The Fiesta, as all ford cars do, has excellent corrosion protection. Ford employs the use of galvanized and other precoated steels and vinyl sealers. In critical areas aluminized wax is used and a finish coat of enamel is applied.

4. Consider this a "guide" only. Clothes should be selected by what looks good on YOU. Study yourself and determine which styles/lines are best for you. Stay with them.


5. Strive for a versatile wardrobe. If necessary, you should be able to go from work to dinner with just a change in accessories.



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
Joe Hopp works to put his opponent on his back.


