Science has Geology Area

"I would like to see more girls getting involved with science, especially physics," said Mr. Frank Bitsko, chairman of the Science Department. "Woman can compete with men in the science field."

"The basic goal in the Science Department is to get more students involved in science and with more students, additional science rooms are needed," stressed the Manasquan resident.

"The course offerings in the Science Department at Manasquan are good, varied courses, but without proper room in which to teach these classes it's hard on the students as well as the instructor," said Mr. Bitsko.

Split session causes many problems in the Science Department, because of less time given to students to do experiments.

In the last few years courses added to this department are Organic Chemistry in 1977 and Chemistry II to be a course in 1978.

A new geology room has been made for Mr. Webster's geology display in the Agriculture building.

It was Mr. Bitsko's idea to change a small

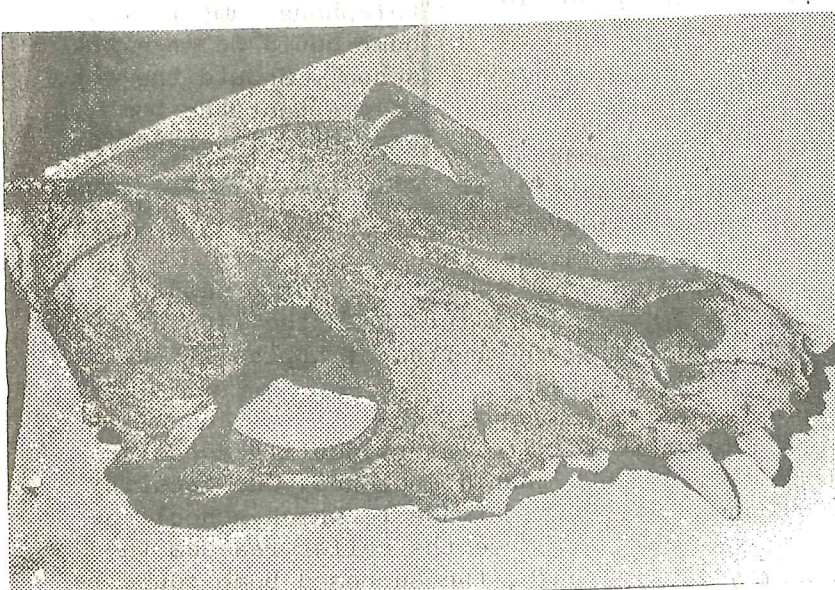
storage room into a geology room. With this room Mr. Webster can set up his experiment equipment. This lets the students in Earth Science classes learn more about geology.

"It gives more of an understanding of geology," said Mr. Webster. "It also gives the kids more lab experience and the opportunity to learn younger and to have a better understanding of Earth Science."

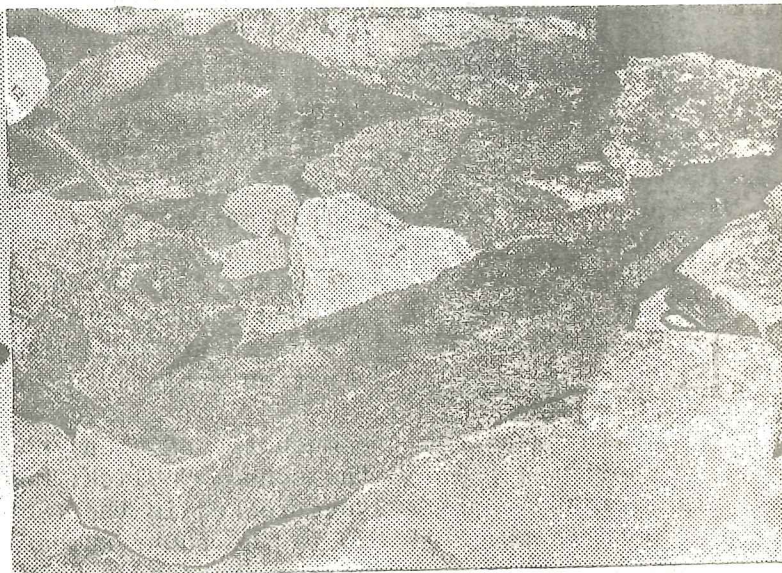
Students in the Earth Science classes have worked on soil samples of the football field as a result of having the new geology room.

Skull displayed in the new geology room.



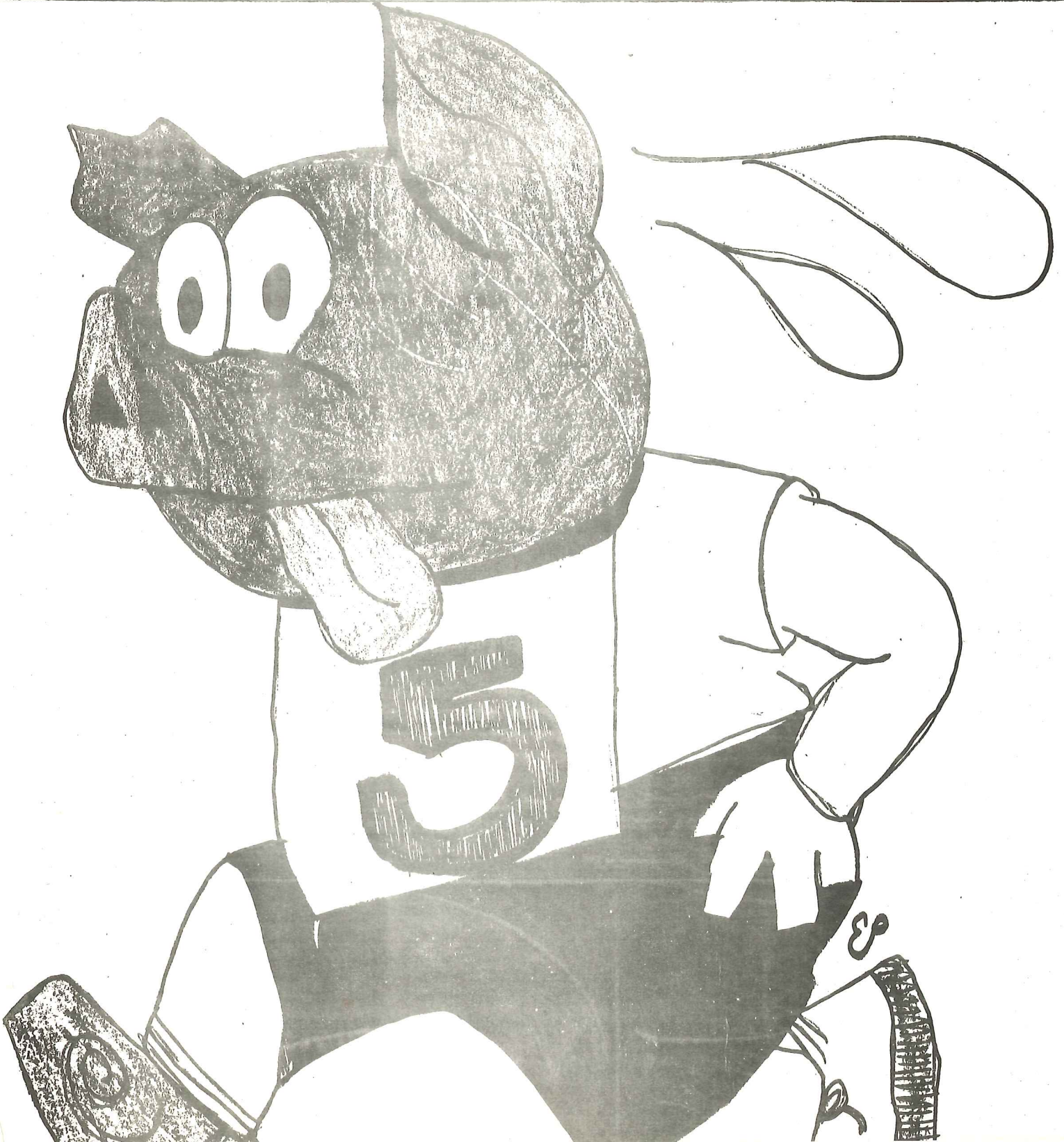
Rock specimen shown in Mr. Webster's geology room.

SANTANA

Devadip Carlos Santana's career has, at the least, given him ample time to create a large following. Even so, his many albums and guest appearances with friends have not been enough for widespread knowledge of his music. His fans in South America number many, but in the United States, he is not currently one of the better record sellers in the business.



As he acquired experience in music, Santana branched out into different areas of sound and style, always keeping the foundation in his South American roots. This album, 'Moonflower', is as interesting an album as entertaining. 'Moonflower' shows the many styles of Santana, and, with some help from his friends, he has accomplished an album containing many moods.

Some tracks on 'Moonflower' have been previously released, such as 'Dance Sister Dance' and 'Europa (Earth's Cry Heaven's Smile)', from 'Amigos', and 'Black Magic Woman', from the album 'Abraxas'. Audience cheering and applause is dubbed in on some tracks on side one, but a few other tunes were recorded live in Munich, Paris, and London. The remainder of the songs are new, and were recorded in a San Francisco studio.

Side one begins with 'Dawn', a progressive jazz tune similar to the style of Steely Dan. Santana utilizes his pro-phaser to give the song an unusually spacey sound. This changes to a basic reggae tune, and this trend continues into the second cut, 'Go Within'. Greg Walker's lead vocals stand out on 'Let the Children Play', as do Graham Lear's powerful drums. Driving guitar by Santana make this a standout song, which was written by Leon Patillo and Carlos Santana.

'Black Magic Woman' is still one of many American groups' favorite tunes to jam on in concert. Depending on the tempo and how it is played and sung, the song can have one or two meanings. 'Europa (Earth's Cry Heavens' Smile)' features excellent lead guitar by Santana, and Tom Coster's Fender Rhodes has a major influence on the song. 'I'll be Waiting', a jazz-funk tune, features good harmonizing and complicated guitar, as does 'She's Not There'. Raul Rekow's bongo solo is mediocre, but he makes up for it while laying down the rhythm on 'Savor'.

While the direction of rock music has changed drastically in these past few years, the music of Devadip Carlos Santana will continue to play on, beating out the Latin-American style.

When it comes time to rebuild the engine, knowing how to do so yourself will save you a lot of money. Most shops will charge a fortune to fix it.

Riding motocross, enduro and trail riding can be dangerous, but if you are careful, it can be a lot of fun. You must be in fairly good shape to ride motocross in order to hang on in those 45 minute motos.

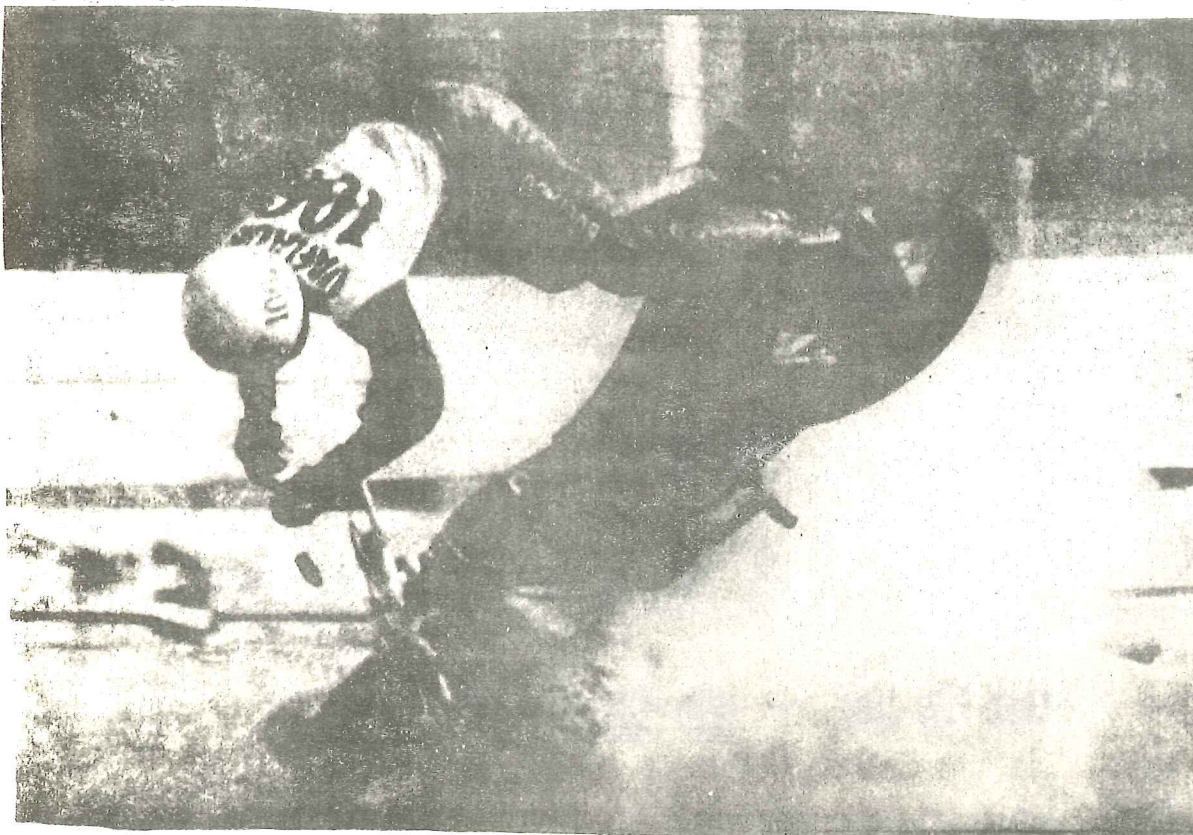

The sport of motorcycling is an expensive one. A quality bike will run you a thousand dollars if not more. Maintenance of your machine will also cost you.

You should have a good helmet and proper face protection. Boots are a must. A good pair will cost about \$90. Other equipment you might consider buying are leathers, knee pads, shoulder pads and a kidney belt.

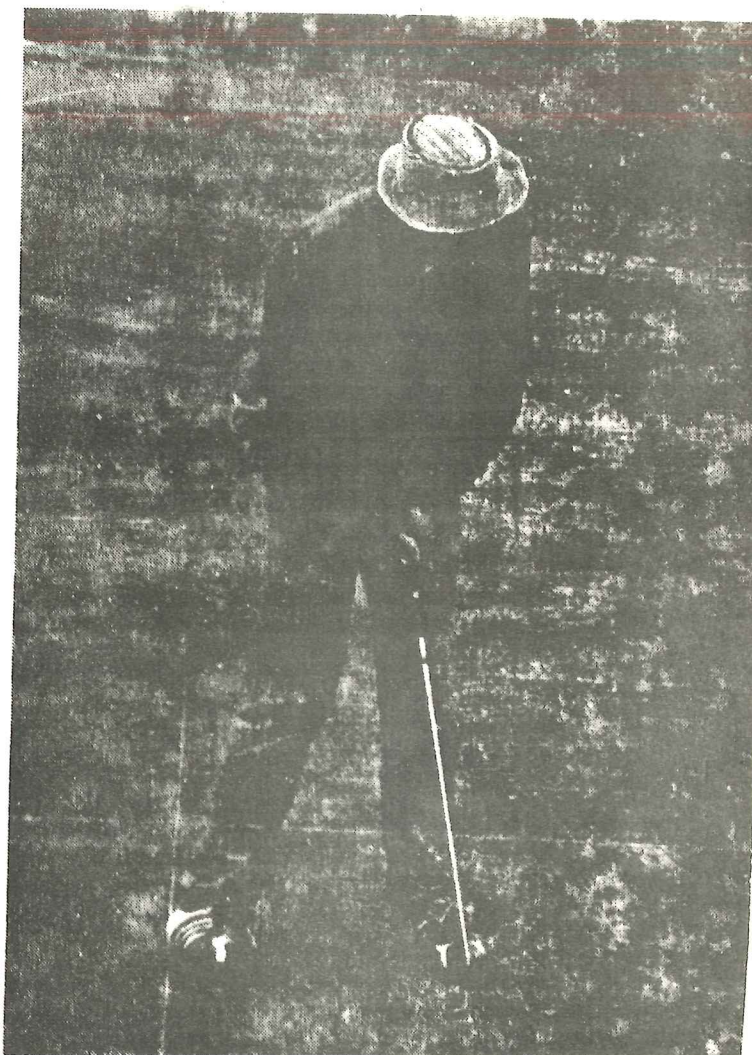

Three consecutive hits by Pete MacInerney, Devon Clouse, and a two bagger by Donnie Megill cleared the bases producing three more runs. "Sweet" Frank Petrulla walked and scored on Billy Reinhard's double. Redeker, batting for the second time in the inning, grounded back to the box to end the rally.

Reinhard came out smoking in the last half of the first inning striking out the side.

Squan picked up five more runs in the second inning boosting the score to 11-0. Wilson walked to lead off the rally and scored on Hayek's triple. Reinhard proved to be unstoppable striking out the side in the sixth inning and he ended the impressive victory with two more whiffs in the seventh.

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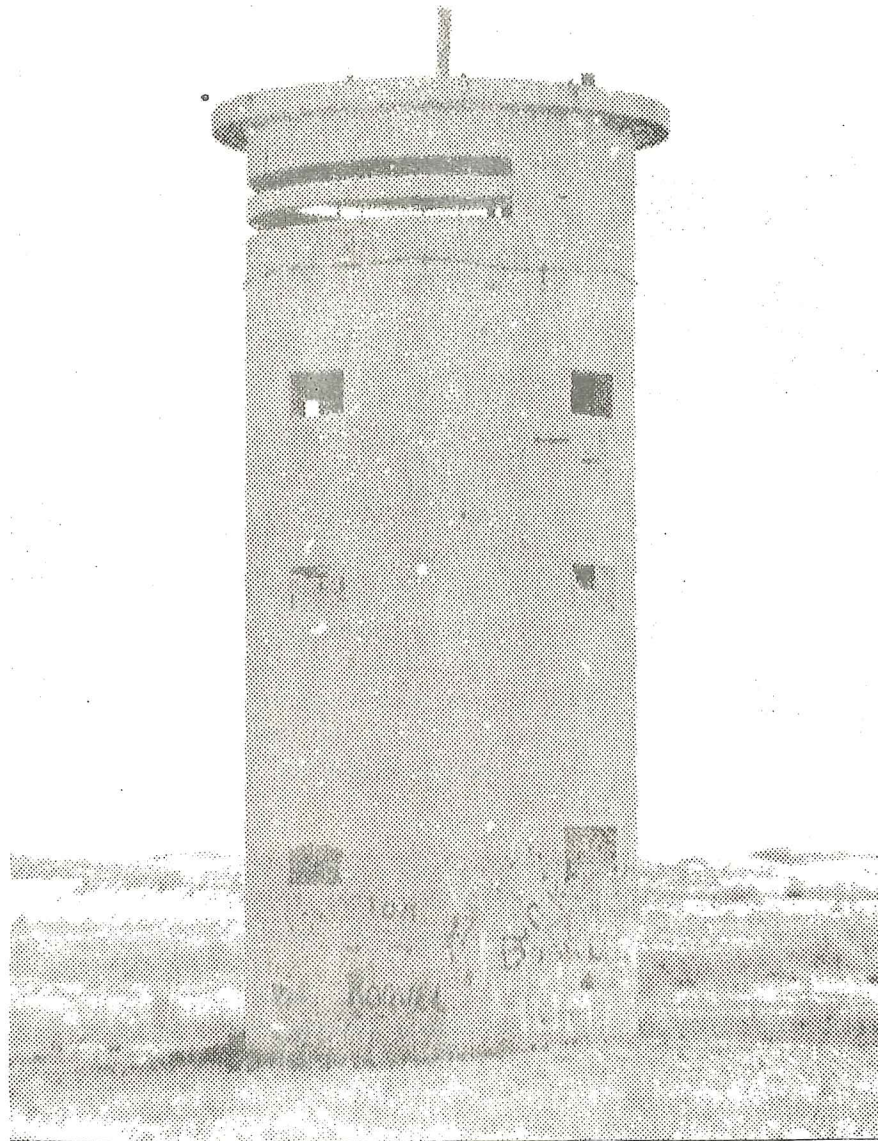
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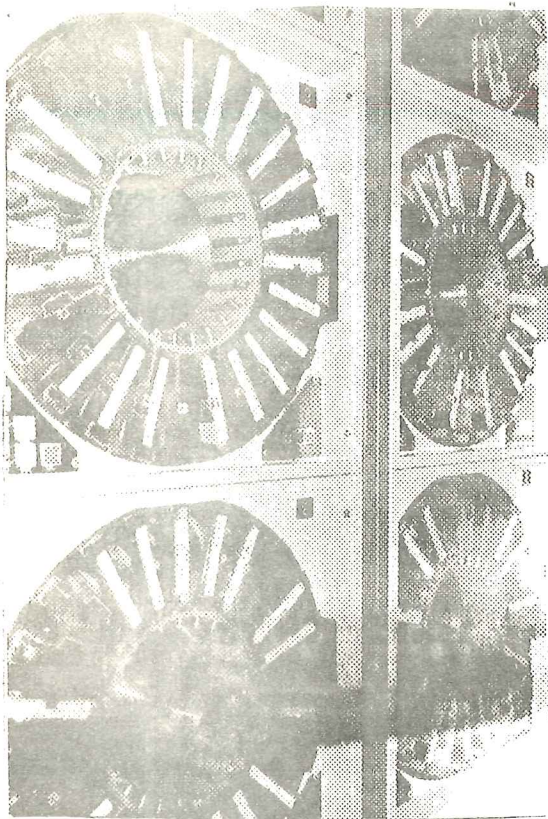

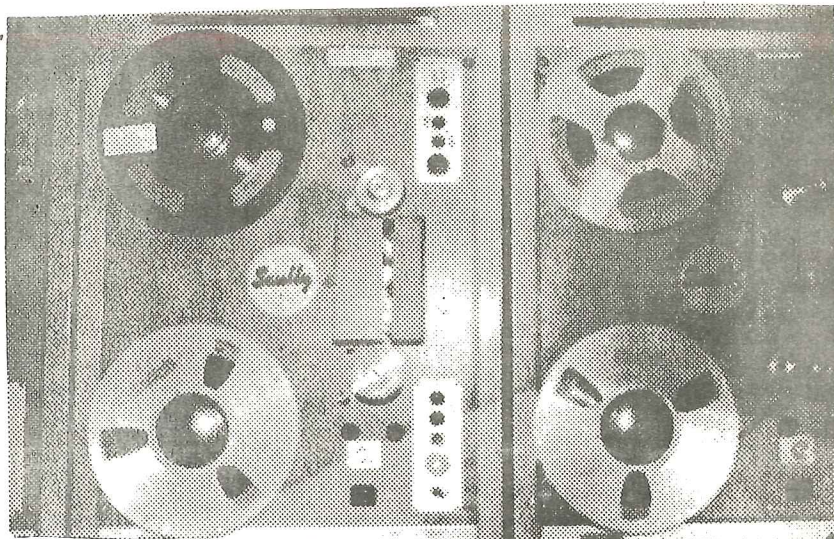

Photo 2 is one of the sets of music tapes that run automatically. After one song has been played on that set, another set of music reels begin.

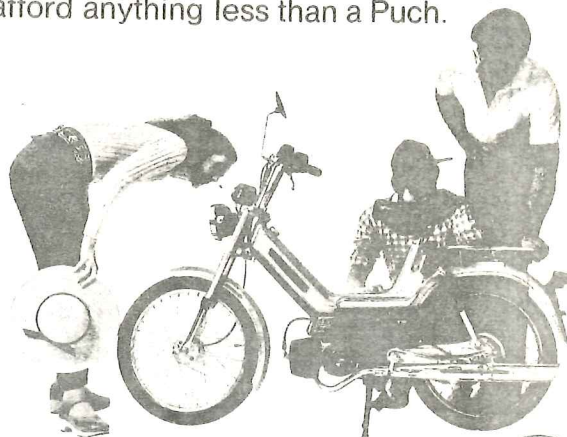
Photo 3 is one of the recording desks the announcers use to record the news, weather and sports.

Mr. Long attended Union College as a history major and was a member of the cross country and track and field team. In 1970 the coach attained a B.S. Degree in history.

After college, Mr. Long drove a beer truck for seven months. In September of 1970 the coach started his teaching position at Manasquan High School. This is his eighth year of teaching at Manasquan and seventh at coaching. He was boys' freshman track coach for three years.
