The sprouting and growth of your seedlings is truly rewarding, and the past few weeks have proved this. The garden, however, is not completely planted but should be within the next two weeks.

As of now, all underground plants such as green leafy vegetables, varieties of beans, corn, cucumbers, and squash have all been sown. A few of the more tender vegetables remain unplanted.

It is now time to sow any melons such as cantaloupe and pumpkin. Harvest can be expected in 75 to 85 days or in August. The fruits will continue throughout the early fall until the first frost.

It is also the appropriate time for peppers and parsley to be taken from the cold frame or indoors and planted in their respective areas.

The time most gardeners wait for has arrived. This, of course, is the time to plant your tomatoes. In doing so,a few steps should be taken to assure an increased production.

To stake your tomatoes, adquate room will be needed. A minimum of two feet each way between plants is essential for proper growth. If three feet is allowed it will make staking and weeding easier and will still be proper distance for pollination.

Each individual hole must be turned over with a hand trowel to a depth of one foot. An application of peat moss will give the tomatoes organic matter which will eventually naturally decompose into useful nutrients, plus absorb water keeping the root system moist.

To avoid transplanting shock it is beneficial to apply a quick activating fertilizer. Liquid Plant-Up-Starter (5-15-5)used at six tablespoons to one gallon of water will prevent shock and continue vigorous growth. Fish emulsion (5-1-1) at three tablespoons per gallon water, and (5-15-5)Miracle Grow at one tablespoon per gallon of water are also excellent fertilizers for young plants. All of; these mixtures can be applied to the roots and can also be absorbed through the leaves.

Fish emulsion can be used on all vegetables every two weeks throughout the season. Some gardeners prefer the (5-15-5) Miracle Grow because it contains secondary plant minerals such as copper .05%, iron .1%, manganese .05% and zinc, .05%. This can be applied to all vegetables wery two weeks at a rate of one gallon per 100 square feet. For full grown tomatoes the ratio is one gallon for each plant.


For the first feeding ONLY, if the label calls for one gallon of liquid fertilizer, it is recommended to use two. For all other feedings, the ratios should not be doubled.

Other types of fertilizers, rather than liquid, are popular. Many varieties of time released fertilizers are sold and used widely. One type, a "Precise Time Released Tomatoe Food (6-18-6), is applied at a rate of two tablespoons per plant. This application in the early spring will last the entire season.

All fertilizers, when used properly, will not burn or damage your plants. EVERY feeding and watering should be completed in the early morning. Evening watering creates a moist atmosphere in the garden which forms different types of fungi and plant rot.

Applying bark chips or dried grass clippings around each plant and between rows will help control weeds, absorb moisture, and modify soil temperatures.

Once all varieties of vegetables have been planted or transplanted, it is advisable to sow a second or third set of your favorite vegetables at two week intervals to prolong the season and insure an abundant crop. This will also avoid trouble of having one vegetable ripening all at once.

Demand For Gas Grows

Saudi Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamimi suggested to gas quenching Americans to reduce consumption to avoid facing higher prices.

The Oil Minister also said that Saudi Arabia will not increase its previous level of production.

"Since supply cannot and should not go up, it is consumption which will make all the difference. It is your duty as a consumer to reduce the consumption to the lowest possible level. If you do this, then not only the price of oil will not go up, but it might even go down a little," said Yamini.

The suggestion by the Saudi Arabian leader came as California Governor Edmund Brown Jr. was getting ready to sign an order to keep more service stations open on weekends. The order would limit the amount sold to 10 gallons in California.

Since the demand of gas is rising, Americans have turned to smaller cars. Since there are waiting lists for small cars, the price of them are rising. Some dealers have year long waiting lists for the Volkswagon Rabbit Diesels and they won't add more names to the list.

In many areas, there is no shortage of gas supplies but drivers might find themselves in line for gas.

"The stations have been cut 15 to 20 percent over last year's sales, and you can't take that much juice out of the marketplace and get through the month," said Tom Anderson, president of the Pennsylvania Service Dealers Association.

Members of Congress were getting ready to take up Carter's challenge that they come up with a standby national gas rationing plan.

Gasohol Being Tested and med

Rising gas costs encouraged New Jersey energy officials to use gasohol on a test basis.

Gasohol is a mixture of one part ethyl alcohol to nine parts unleaded gasoline.

Charles Richman, state assistant energy commissioner, said that the experimental program will test gasohol to see if it does give better gas mileage.

"All this has been made possible by the oil companies raising oil prices, which has made gasohol competitive," said Eugene White, a Smithtown lawyer.

Gasohol will sell for three cents more than unleaded gasoline, but, according to White, it will increase mileage by about 5 percent.

Gasohol is on sale in Iowa and other Mideast parts, and three stations on Eastern Long Island, N.Y., were busy as they began the gasohol experiment.

"We're excited about the experiment and want to see just how gasohol works and if it can effectively help us alleviate the gas problem. We also want to see how the fuel affects car engines and whether it provides the predicted extra mileage to justify the few cents higher," said Charles Richman.

The problem about gasohol is that there is no spare pumps since most stations have three types of gas and no spare pumps.

Gasohol opponents argue that the growing demand for alcohol might drive up costs for goods such as bread.

"We're in the process of setting up at least one, and probably two locations where we can supply and moritor gasohol in the state. There is no decision on the number of cars to be used, but they would probably be small, with a comparable number to be used as a control group," stated Richman.

AIR CUSHION VEHICLES

Vehicles which travel on a cushion of air, are sometimes called "hovercraft". The cushion is created by compressing air with a fan to form a bubble which lifts the vehicle off the ground. The vehicle can then be driven and steered by jets or propellers. A principal advantages is the reduction in friction between the vehicle and the surface it travels over. V.C.V"s are also able to travel over land and sea with equal ease.

A.V.C'S were first produced by Sir Christopher Cockerell, in Britain, and were launched in the English Channel in 1959. They have since been used on land and water.

The cushion of air upon which the A.C.V. travels is like a pneumatic tire except that it is continually leaking. The air that leaks out is continually replaced by the powerful fan.

There are various ways of enclosing the cushion. A rigid skirt may be constructed around the base of the craft. However, this trails on the surface and creates friction which slows down the vehicle.


A skirt may be created by high-powered # downward air jets forming a curtain around the cushion of air. This limits the height at which the A.C.V. can travel. The jet curtain becomes less efficient the higher the vehicle is off the ground

The third type of skirt is flexible and, although it may touch the ground or water, does not cause much friction.

At sea, A.C.VIS are capable of speeds up to IDO mph. They do not require special docks or landing stages as theu can draw up on the beach to land passengers or freight.

In the future we may expect to see hovercars and hovertrains. Cars will travel long distances quickly, smoothly and cheaply. Trains will travel over a rail or track, just a fraction of an inch above the track, at 300 mph or more.

The air cushion principle can also be used to relieve the strain on types carrying heavy loads.

Two years ago, a band put out a debut album which did not acquire much widespread popularity for the group. However, they established themselves among small groups of people that are very aware of new names and sounds in rock and roll. With the release of the band's second album, these few but influential people passed the word that these guys were to be reckoned with. Today, this group, especially the lead guitarist and vocalist, is gaining a large and loyal following. Here, I review their second album, "Move It On Over". Ladies and gentlemen, I give you George Thorogood and the Destroy-

The album opens with the title song, "Move It On Over". After that fast paced tune comes the single from the album, "Who Do You Love?". Here, Thorogood displays his prowess as an electric quitarist. His style of raw vocals sets the mood and the drums and bass, played by Jeff Simon and Billy Blough respectively, hold the rhythm section together. A slow country/blues tune, "The Sky Is Crying", follows. The slide guitar here is excellent and the vocals beautifully express the sorrow and pain of lowe. The pace picks up on the next song, "Cocaine Blues", as the band wails and Thorogood tells of how he killed his cheating girlfriend while indulging in a little snuff. The side closes out with an old Chuck Berry tune, "It Wasn't Me". It seems Thorogood is at his best doing a Berry song, as he plays much in the same style. In fact, he could be called the present day Chuck Berry. As anyone who has seen him on stage knows, he moves around with the same grace and even hops around stage in the ultimate Berry-style. His voice gives the songs new affectations with the raw, bluesy touches and southern country twangs. Together, the two would make a great duo.

Side two opens with a powerful and vibrant song, "That Same Thing." Second is "So Much Trouble", on which the slide guitar is as good as any I've heard. Following is a country/blues' song, "I'm Just Your Good Thing", in

which Thorogood's voice takes on a vengeful tone. "Baby, Please Set a Date" comes next and "New Hawaiian Boogie" closes out the album.


September 8, Pope John Paul I. Successor to Paul VI, John Paul was the unexpected choice of the College of Cardinals. His wide smile and engaging manner captured the hearts of the world for 33 short days in the late summer. He also shattered many old barriers in the pomp and circumstance that surrounds Popes. John Paul never had much of a chance to spread the warmth of his personality.

November 8, Norman Rockwell. The most popular artist in the US for the last 50 years. Always adept at capturing the quirks and humanism of people. He had a big group of supporters because he reached people through sentiment.

November 15. Margaret Head. The great anthropologist, author and social critic, she was singly devoted to improving the human condition. She was a stong supporter of the youth of this country and a power in the women's movement. A friend once commented that Margaret Mead "wanted to be a mother to the world." JEAN-LUC PONTY: LIVE!

"Jean-Luc Ponty: Live", the new live album by Jean-Luc Ponty, is more or less a sampling of the different moods and scenes that the French violinist creates in sound at a concert. Recorded during December 1978 on his most recent tour, this album gives the listener an interesting insight of the talent of this violinist.

"Aurora", off of the album of the same name, begins with Ponty playing his five string electric violin softly while Ralphe Armstrong's bass and Casey Scheuerell's drums balance out the sound. Allan Zavod's bass synthesizer lends a surrealistic sound, just as Ponty starts part two with a brisk solo which soon changes the song into a jazz-rock tune. Ralphe Armstrong utilizes his fretless bass to the utmost, emitting flawless progressions not unlike Stanley Clarke or the bassist known only as Erroneous. Armstrong is featured in a solo further into the song, through which he performs quickly and smoothly.


"Imaginary Voyage" starts with a soft, mellow solo by Ponty, which leads into Joaquin Lievano's guitar solo. A light, airy piece featuring Allan Zavod on keyboards concludes part three, and Ponty begins the fourth part with a short violin section, followed by Jamie Glaser on a guitar solo with bolting, perfected riffs. Ending the side is yet another extremely rapid solo by Ponty, while pounding bass, guitar and drums back it up. Allan Zavod's keyboards can be heard in the background creating sound effects.

Ponty's solo "No Strings Attached" sounds quite similar to the song "Echoes of the Future" off of the album "Upon the Wings of Music". This is probably the spaciest material ever performed by Ponty, resembling numerous electronic musicians like Jean-Michel Jarre and Tangerine Dream at some points but still retaining the creativity of the artist. Ponty used digital delays to acquire a reverb on his five string electric violin and a bass synthesizer for various effects.

"Egocentric Molecules", from Ponty's latest lp, "Cosmic Messenger",

retains the energy drive of the studio version and adds the spontaneous variations of the live rendition. Joaquin Lievano has a wild guitar solo in the beginning of the tune succeeded by Ralphe Armstrong's pounding bass solo and assorted sound effects. Concluding the solos is one by Ponty, which is performed with electrifying intensity. Allan Zavod's keyboards are featured at the conclusion of the tune, aptly ending the album. As with the credits on "Cosmic Messenger", the drummer's name (which happens to be Casey Scheuerell) has been omitted for some unknown reason.

Throughout his years as a solo artist, Ponty has written nothing but instrumentals. Even his last album, which some said could possibly be a "turning point" album in his career (it is considered to be his most commercial album), did not feature any vocals but only a variation of the style normally employed by this musician. I would expect much more fine material from this artist, and perhaps even the recognizance that he deserves.

Child Abuse continued

Ten and one-half percent of mothers and 9.6 percent of fathers have suffered medical problems during their lives. Forty-three percent of mothers and forty-five percent of fathers have had social and behavioral actions.

Abusers are sick people and should get help. Many abusers respond better to therapists and do not accept psychotherapy. Day care centers, homemaking assistance, family planning, job and personal counseling, medical, care and visits with a social worker are just a few ways how abusers can get help.

Parents can learn the skills they need to run a household and to raise a family. Pressures which lead to abuse and neglect can be reduced and controlled.

Children are usually placed in a hospital for safety until a decision has been made on what treatment would best help the abuser.

Juvenile courts sometimes award temporary custody of the child to a child- protection agency. If the home is considered dangerous, anyone could be temporarilyplaced in a foster home.

Ibanez, a company which has been in the business for quite sometime, has made its mark in the vast music industry. Not only with guitars but with drums too. They make the super durable Tama drums. As for most Japanese made guitars, they're bought for \$50 or \$60 and last for about a summer or two. They're built for the hack guitarist or beginner.


Ibanez has a huge selection of original designs and copies of the world's better made guitars. They also create a slew of accessories like pick-ups, machine heads, bridges, tailpieces, and sound modifiers. Not only does Ibanez build electric instruments it also produces quite a few six and twelve stringed acoustic guitars. These instruments also show fine workmanship. They create an excellent tone for their moderate prices.

Beginning with one of Ibanez's own designs, the Performer Series, there are five different models. All the models are basically the same except for some slight modifications here and there. In this series prices run from \$350 to \$595.

Next, one could pick from the Concert Series which has three models: CN-100, 200 and 250. The Concert Series, an original, are selling anywhere from \$375 to \$495.

In the Artist Series, prices start at about \$450, going up to \$725. The most expensive Artist has built in EQ (equalization), a unique feature that is only found in a few choice guitars.

Talk To the World

Imagine yourself talking with a Hawaiian over-looking the surf, then with a farmer living in a small village in the Ukraine, and then with the captain of an oil tanker headed for the Panama Canal—all in the same day. Hundreds of thousands of Americans enjoy the hobby of talking to the world from their own homes, and learning about distant lands and their various cultures and lifestyles. The hobby is called amateur radio, or ham radio, and just about anybody can join in on the fun.

Amateur radio encompasses people of all ages and nationalities. Such famous people as Senator Barry Goldwater, Bob Hope, Arthur Godfrey, Dick Van Dyke, Jean Sheppard and King Hussein of Jordan are ham radio operators. Hams chat by voice around the world, send their own pictures by television, communicate by Morse Code, and some even relay their signals through satellites or bounce them off the Moon. After establishing contact with each other, hams exchange personalized cards displaying their call signs which confirm the contact. In addition to the great many facets of the hobby, amateur radio has proven itself to be a very useful form of emergency communication, especially when the telephone lines are down, during such disasters as hurricanes, earthquakes and floods.

Many CB operators have discovered the advantages of ham radio with its many extra privileges. CBers are limited to four watts of power, but amateur radio operators can legally use up to 1,000 watts. And a two-way contact of over 100 miles is illegal on the Citizens' Band, but it is an everyday occurence for two hams halfway around the globe to communicate with each other. In addition, radio amateurs can make use of several different short wave bands, instead of just one.

Winning Your License

Like most privileges, the right to enjoy ham radio must be earned. Unlike CB, an amateur radio license can only be obtained by passing an examination at the nearest FCC office. There are five license classes; the higher the license class, the more privileges and frequencies allowed the operator. To upgrade to a higher license, one must pass a more difficult test than that of the preceeding class. This is called "incentive licensing."

The first step is to learn the material needed for the Novice Class license. The potential Novice needs to learn the International Morse Code and must be able to send and receive code at a speed of five words per minute, a relatively slow speed. This is not as difficult as it may seem, and spending just a few minutes a day listening to code tapes should be sufficient preparation for the code test in a matter of weeks.

After passing the code test, one must take the Novice written exam which consists of 20 multiple choice questions concerning FCC rules and regulations and basic radio theory. Seventy-five percent correct is the passing grade.

The Novice license allows the operator to communicate using code only, with up to 250 watts of power. Many beginners find Morse Code to be a fascinating and fun way of communicating with people. Since many hams would also like to obtain voice privileges and be permitted to use a microphone as well as a telegraph key, they proceed to a higher license class, such as the Technician, General, Advanced and Amateur Extra classes.

Code practice tapes and license study guides are sold at local electronics stores, and are excellent aids when preparing for your amateur radio exam.

Getting On the Air

Once you've got your license and are anxious to get on the air, you will probably start shopping around for equipment. Although some hams are willing to invest thousands of dollars in their radio stations, it is not at all necessary to do so. One can buy an amateur radio station and talk with people all over the world on it, for about the price of a good camera or CB radio. What about an antenna? A simple and very effective antenna called a dipole can be erected between two trees, and costs only a few dollars.

A Worthy Enterprise

Studying for an amateur radio license is well worth the effort. Hams enjoy their exciting and rewarding hobby of exploring the world on the airwaves, and at the same time provide a service to the public in the form of emergency communications.





plate. Coach Landfried observed, "He (Nylk) took a wide turn around third."

Season Comes Near End


The netters were knocked out in the first round of state competition on Wednesday by the Wall Knights, 3-2.


The second doubles team of Fran Slyvester and Kevin Dineen fell to Chris Steelman and John Simptons, 6-1, 6-3.


