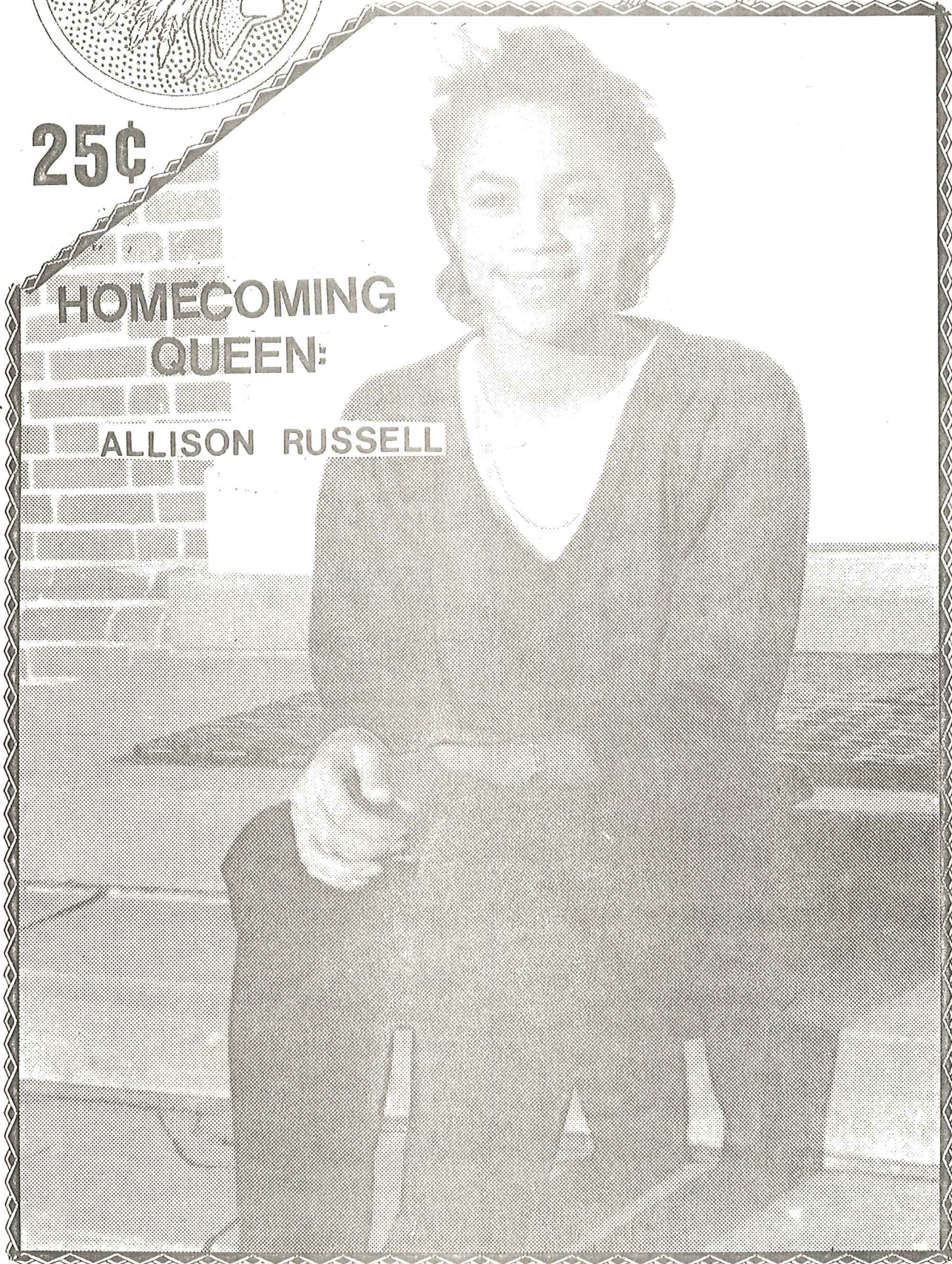

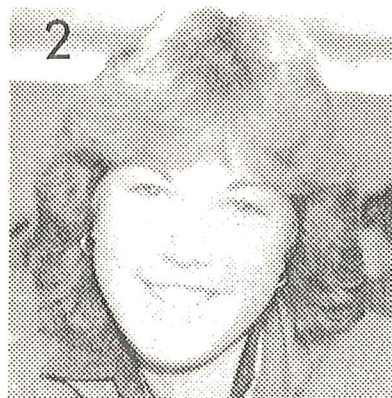

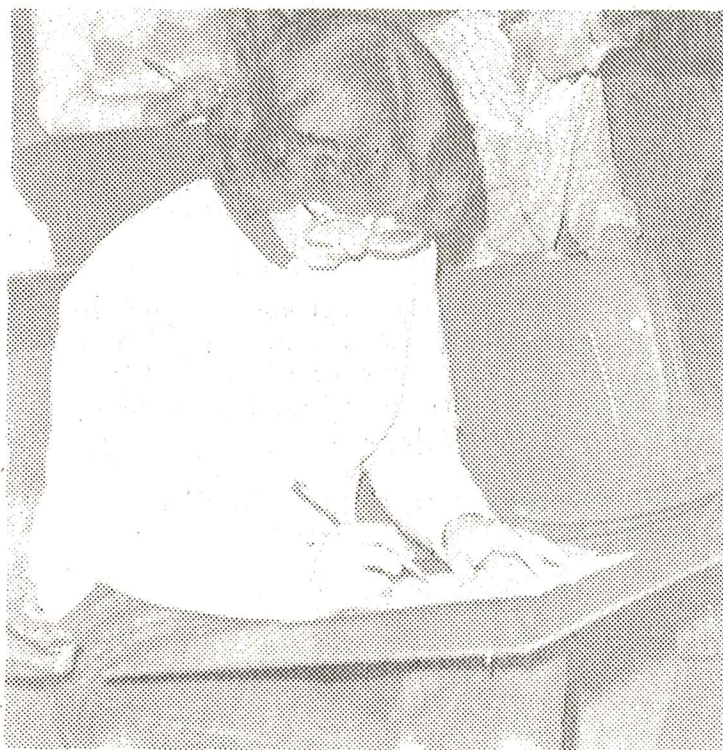

Twenty years ago on November 22, 1963, President John F. Kennedy was killed by an assassin in Dallas, Texas.

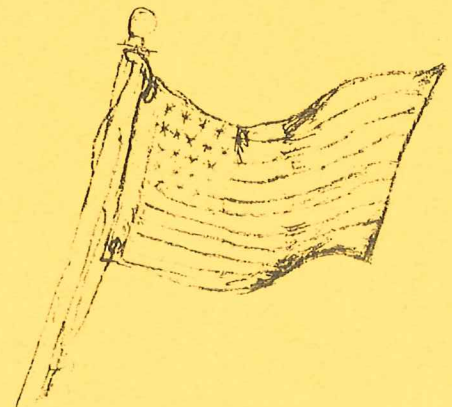

He brought to the office of President a quick mind and the ability to use the power he had fought so hard to win. He wanted terribly to be President and he loved being President. His deep sense of the power, responsibility and dignity of the Presidency showed in his statements and his actions. The Kennedy's were admired throughout the world for the dignity and charm they brought to the White House.

President Kennedy followed no set principles of policy. He tried to make decisions on the basis of facts, then do what he considered practical and right.

John F. Kennedy once said, "I looked forward to an America that would have mind as well as muscle, grace and beauty as well as strength, insight and wisdom as well as power." President Kennedy valued excellence.

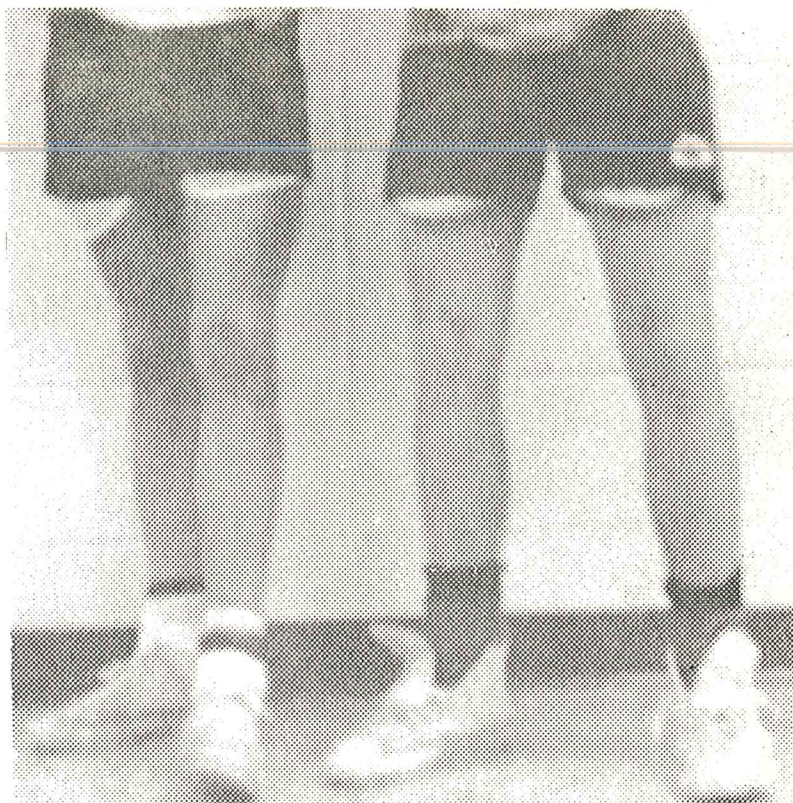

# THIS WEEK IN ROCK

Chris DeBurgh is living proof that a band's quantity will not assure them of quality. Aside from a couple of session players, Chris is all by his lonesome. As matter of fact, most of the best bands on today's music circuit have very few members; five at the most. Some prime examples include U-2, The Police, Duran Duran, and of course, Rush.

But getting back to Chris De Burgh (Did I spell it right this time?), Chris was born in Argentina of wealthy parents. His father was in the British Diplomatic Corps, so he and his family traveled around the world quite a bit. Since Chris' birth, the De Burghs have lived in the Mediterranean, the Island of Malta, Nigeria, and Zaire. They finally settled down in Ireland when Chris was 12, where they have lived ever since.

His mom paid for most of his music instruction, but he self-taught the guitar and the ability to sing, as well as the art of musical composition. When he was 20, he began earning money from his musical aptitude; much to the dismay of his parents. You see at this time, Chris had been in the process of earning a degree in French and English, or in other words, he was majoring languages in college.

Anyhow, he began performing in a restaurant owned by a friend; where he performed his first hit song, "Far Beyond These Castle Walls". Chris comments on these primeval days of his life, "I was getting paid two pounds a week and a hamburger a nite," but two years later, he landed his first recording contract, which is a realitively short time for anyone to go from a bar singer to a professional recording artist.

Since these early days of record-making, Chris has produced six albums. His latest, The Getaway, contains two big hits, "Don't Pay the Ferryman", and "Ship to Shore".

Chris says he likes to write songs.

On the concert circuit, Chris himself has never been on the top billing, but he has opened for some pretty big names, including John Cougar, Loverboy, Men At Work, and Asia; but he'll be on the top pretty soon, thanx to the boost he got from his "Don't Pay the Ferryman" video, and since he's now working on yet another LP, Chris will be in America pretty soon.

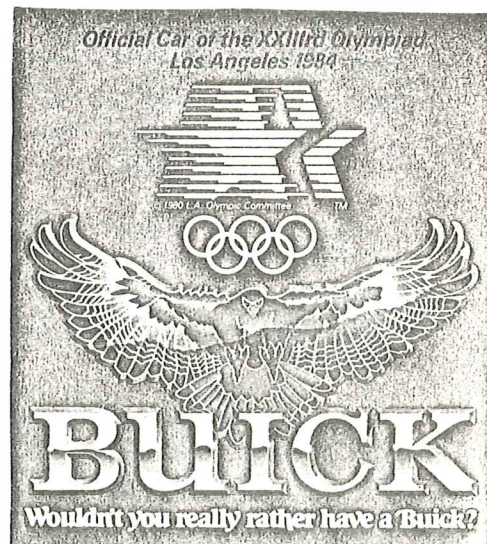

# ROOTS OF HEAVY METAL

Heavy metal is a product of the social revolution of the late sixties, a time when recording facilities, guitar amplifiers and PA systems expanded the capability of musicians to use thunderous sound dynamics and distortion. British guitarists had already started to take the upper hand in this department a few years before on feedback-ridden, power chord-based singles by the Kinks (featuring guitarist Dave Davies) and the Who (featuring Pete Townshend), while Jeff Beck sculpted rude white noises with the Yardbirds.

By 1969 a heavy metal style had evolved in England out of the blues-based hard rock powers Cream, the Jimi Hendrix Experience, the Who, the Jeff Beck Group and especially Led Zeppelin. It was a music of overstatement which soon grew beyond the smaller clubs and theaters, that nurtured it, but was perfectly suited for the larger arenas and bigger audiences in the United States. The loudest sounds possible were needed to reach everyone in the audience, inspired an American heavy metal approach characterized by bands like the Vanilla Fudge, Blue Cheer, Iron Butterfly, Steppenwolf, Mountain and Grand Funk Railroad.

In the early seventies heavy metal was led into kind of a golden age with the emergence of Deep Purple, a British psychedelic band, let guitarist Ritchie Blackmore take over to produce the classic heavy metal albums Fireball and Machine Head. Mick Ralph's guitar helped put Mott the Hoople on the map. Humble Pie came strutting along with frontman Steve Marriott calling the shots, and Black Sabbath was paced by Tony Iommi's slabs of heavy metal guitar.

Meanwhile a frenzied crew of American heavy metal bands poured out of Detroit and Cleveland during these years. Some of the more notable ones were Alice Cooper and the James Gang which included guitarist Joe Walsh who brought a totally original

voice to this kind of music.

The major heavy metal stylists-Hendrix, Jimmy Page, Beck and Townshend-established the music's basic nomenclature. Townshend's power chording was the most expressive use of that technique. Hendrix was a master player whose touch was so light and sure it could be misleading to make too much of him as a heavy metal player. When you get to former Yardbird's Beck and especially Page, however, you define the genre.

A measure of how totally Page is identified with this music is that he is often credited with playing the heavy metal solos on Who and Kinks' singles despite repeated denials by those groups that he played those passages. Ironically enough, Beck has made a counterclaim that Page's Led Zeppelin concept was stolen from the ideas expressed in the first Jeff Beck group.

Led Zeppelin went on to become the seventies most successful rock group and heavy metal, despite being almost universally scorned by critics, was the people's choice. Still, there were problems. The heavy metal guitar hero was part musician, part acrobat-Deep Purple's Ritchie Blackmore, for example, became almost as legendary for the way he manhandled his guitar as for his swash-buckling solos. Destruction of instruments and real or theatrical rage became normal.

As the seventies progressed, the first wave of heavy metal guitarists dropped from the limelight. Hendrix died, Beck turned to jazz-rock fusion, Townshend repeatedly threatened to quit, then proceeded to switch his emphasis to keyboards. Joe Walsh quit the James Gang to woodshed and spend time on solo projects before resurfacing as a member of the Eagles. Page, while maintaining his spot with

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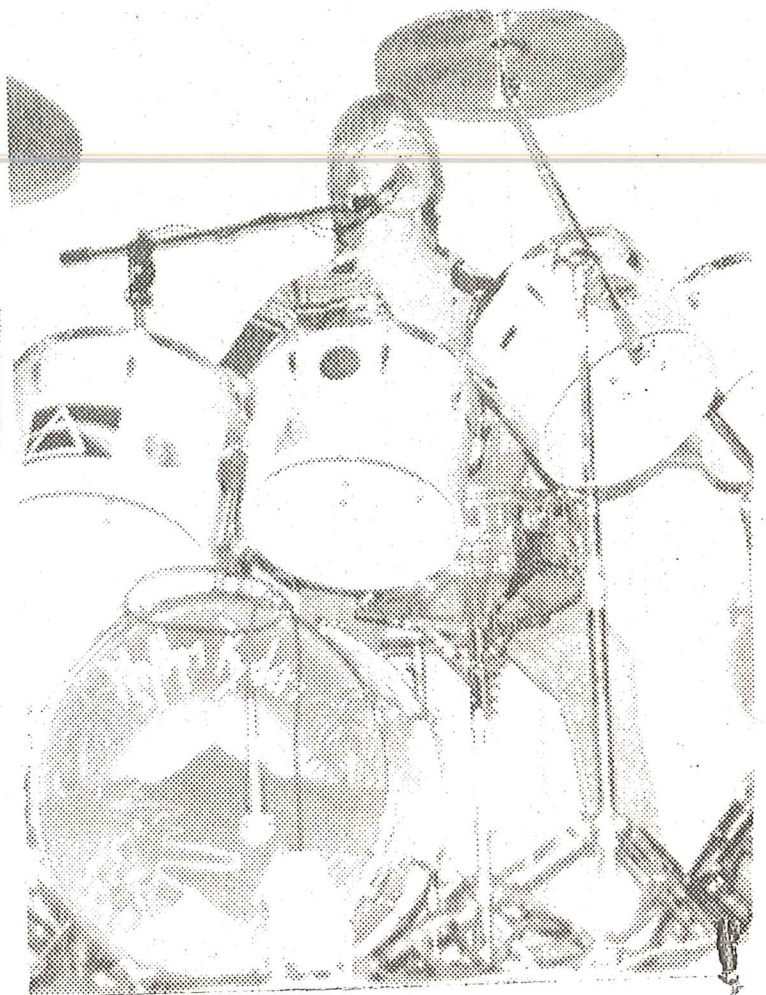

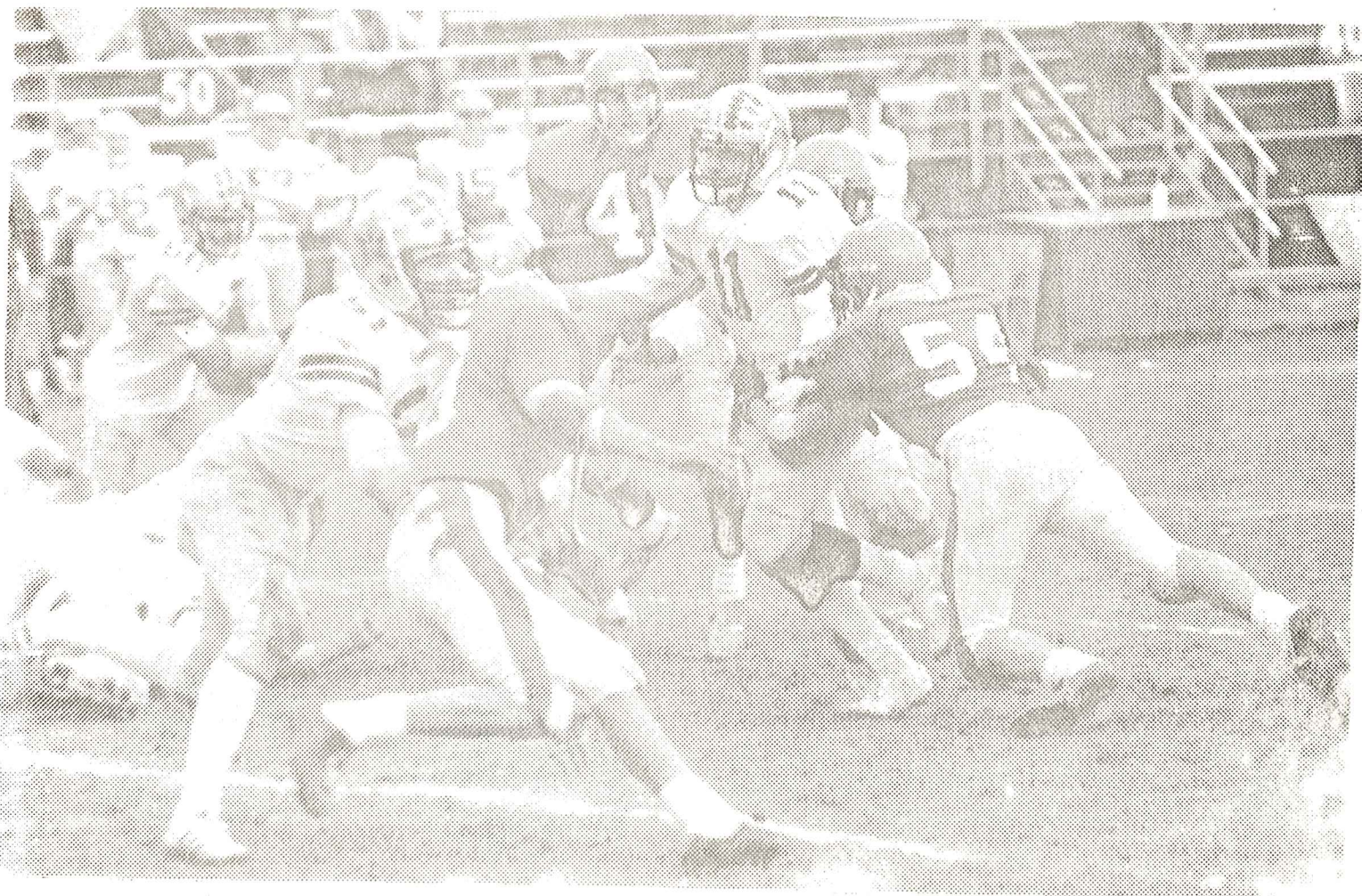

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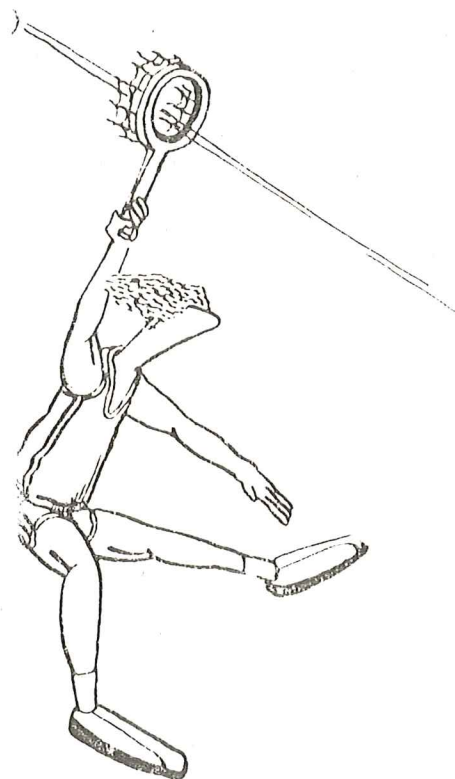
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# Football Schedule

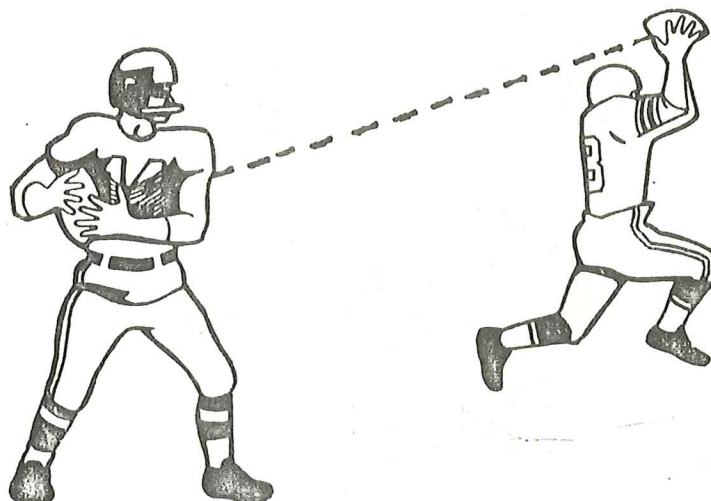

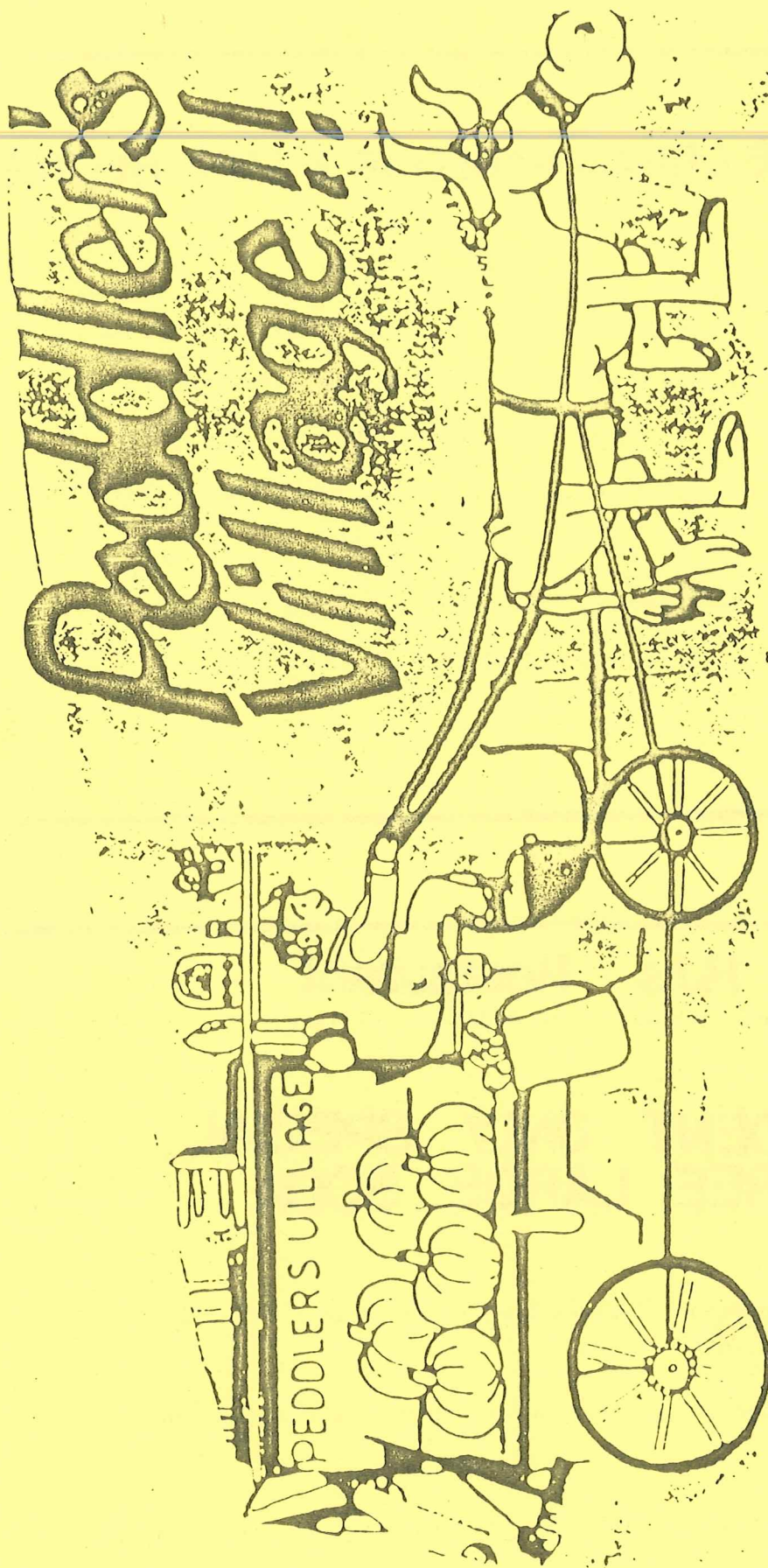
