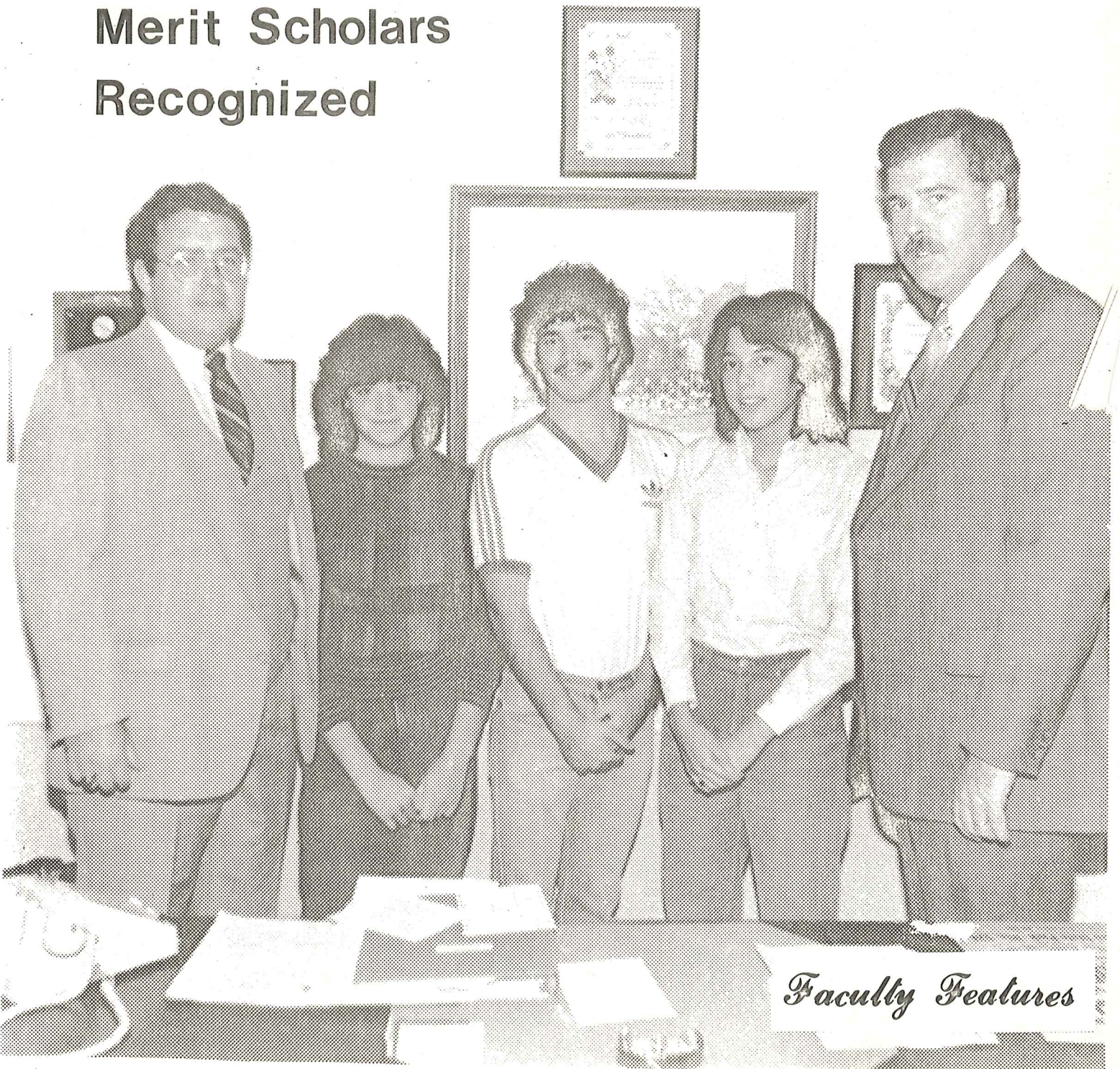

MIND GAMES; LSD (acid)

LSD is the abbreviation of a drug with a long chemical name: D-lysergic acid diethylamide. LSD is also known as "Acid".

The drug is made from a mixture of various chemicals and comes as a white powder or a clear liquid. Sometimes it is in pill form. Usually, a tiny amount of the liquid is dropped onto a sugar cube and is eaten. Some people even put the drug on the back of postage stamps or envelopes, so they can take it by licking.

Medical researchers are experimenting with LSD to find ways of curing certain kinds of mental illness and other serious illnesses. But until more research is done, the drug cannot be thought of as medicine.

LSD is a drug that is made and taken illegally. It is not addictive, but it is so powerful that even taking it once can be disastrous.

Taking a dose of LSD is called "tripping". Within 30 minutes the user is on a trip. It can last from two to ten hours. It could be a good trip or a bad trip. There's no way to tell which it is going to be.

A good trip could be filled with beautiful sights and sounds. Some people claim they can see all sounds and taste colors when on a trip. Scientists and doctors who study LSD still haven't found out exactly how LSD affects people. Some believe it not only seriously damages the brain but also other parts of the body. Since no one really knows for sure these possible effects, more and more people are saying they don't want to try LSD even once!

Rush rocks Radio City

Heavy Metal is the Rodney Dangerfield of rock. It may not get any respect, but it has survived nevertheless.

A case in point is Rush's four sold-out dates at Radio City Music Hall this past month. After nearly 10 years, the trio's popularity hasn't diminished and, it actually appears to have increased. Two weeks ago, Rush and the group Marillion headlined Radio City for a heavy duty metal double header.

As an opening act, Marillion, a five-piece Anglo-Scottish group was thunderous. The first number of their four song set was also the strongest. From there on in it was all downhill, and by the time they got to their third song, about some garden vegetables, they sounded as though they'd been through a heavy metal food processor.

After a half-hour of this harsh sounding rock and an ever increasing number of angry catcalls from the crowd, the audience was ready for the more mellow sounds of Rush.

That's not to say that Rush, in new songs or old, were lightweight. The three piece Canadian band consists of; Guitarist Alex Lifeson, bassist, keyboard player and lead vocalist Geddy Lee, and drummer, lyricist Neil Peart. The group proved they could rock out with the best of the heavies.

Unlike many heavy metal bands, Rush doesn't take themselves too seriously as evidenced by the "Three Stooges" theme announcing their entrance and the Count Floyd video clip featuring SCTV's Joe Flaherty, that introduced one song. For two full hours Rush gave the audience what they'd come for, an assortment of hit after hit from their various platinum albums and an multimedia show complete with Jedi-like lights and video clips.

The Music Hall seemed to lend itself to the group's sound throughout the show, though they broke no new ground in performance. They gave, without a doubt, a thoroughly professional show. Some of the groups well-known songs, such as "Subdivisions" from Signals, and "Limelight", revealed a rock-steady beat and some pretty fancy synthesizer playing from Lee. For the most part the music was loud, with the characteristic heavy percussion completely overpowering the sound of Lifeson's guitar.

Perhaps a little restrain in Peart's drumming and more focus on Lifeson's guitar work could have freed the group from a "quagmire" of heavy metal cliches into which it fell.

As an encouraging note for non-heavy metal fans, Rush has none of the sleazy traits that characterize the most hardcore of these bands. In fact, these three look and sound almost like the Pete Townshend's of heavy metal.

Wetton quits Asia

Rock'n' rollers are buzzing about the latest flap, in which lead singer John Wetton has quit. His departure came just weeks after the group ended its USA tour, to prepare for a December 6, MTV concert to be transmitted from Budokan in Tokyo. Stepping in for Wetton is Greg Lake, who's rejoining old bandmate Carl Palmer in the quartet that also includes former Yes-man Steve Howe and keyboard player

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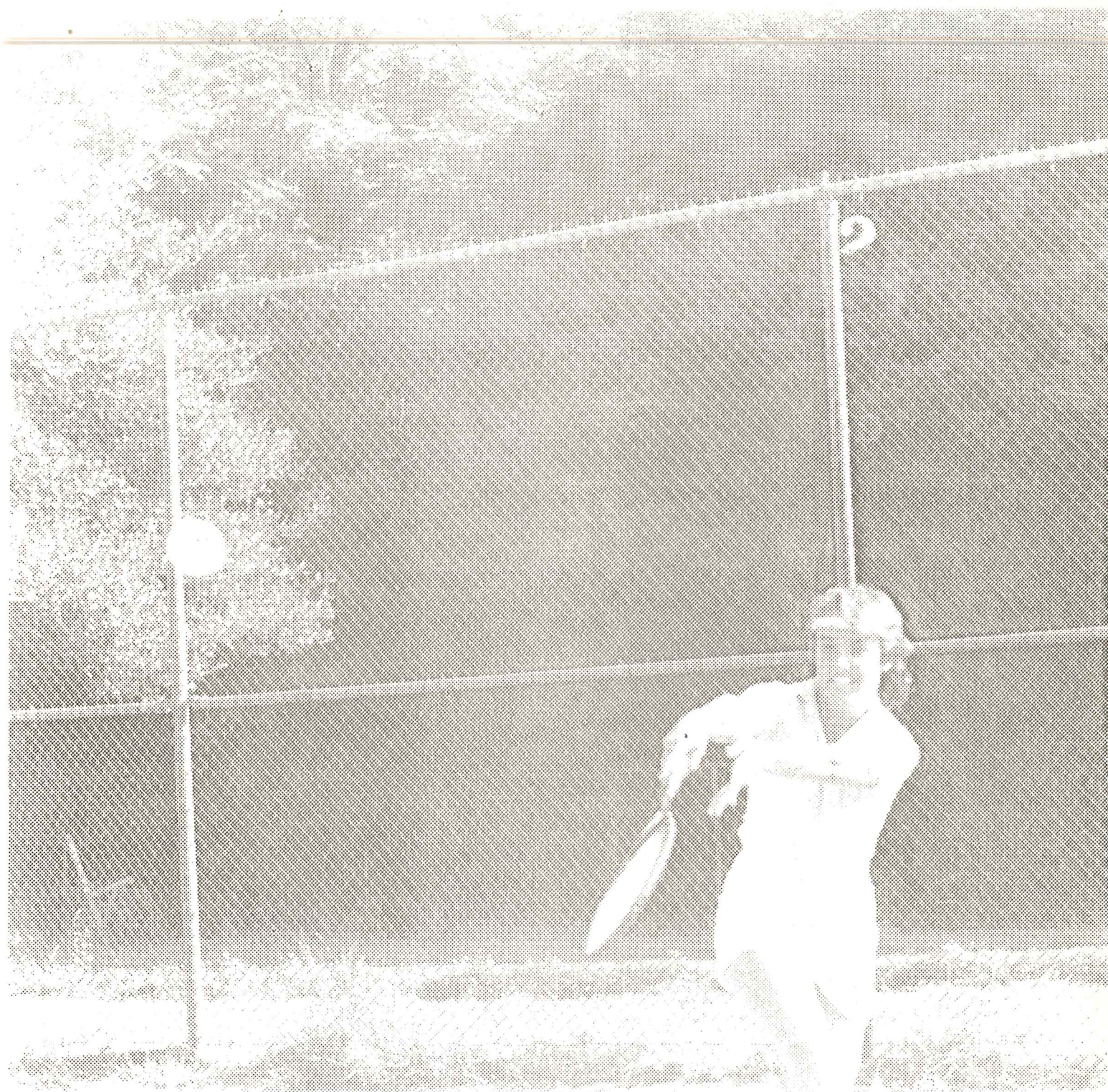

SQUAN 4-POINT BORO 1

After spotting the Panthers a goal in the first quarter, the Warriors came back with three goals in the second quarter and one in the fourth on Squan's home field Tuesday afternoon.

Squan started off slow in the early going of the game. Both teams played a controlled game working the ball up and down the field. Midway through the quarter, Brian Tinsey of Point booted one by junior Bill Cadigan. At the end of the quarter, the Panthers were ahead 1-0.

The second quarter brought out a new team it seemed. The Warriors totally outplayed Point at every opportunity. Lance Simek drilled a shot by the Boro keeper to tie the score at one. 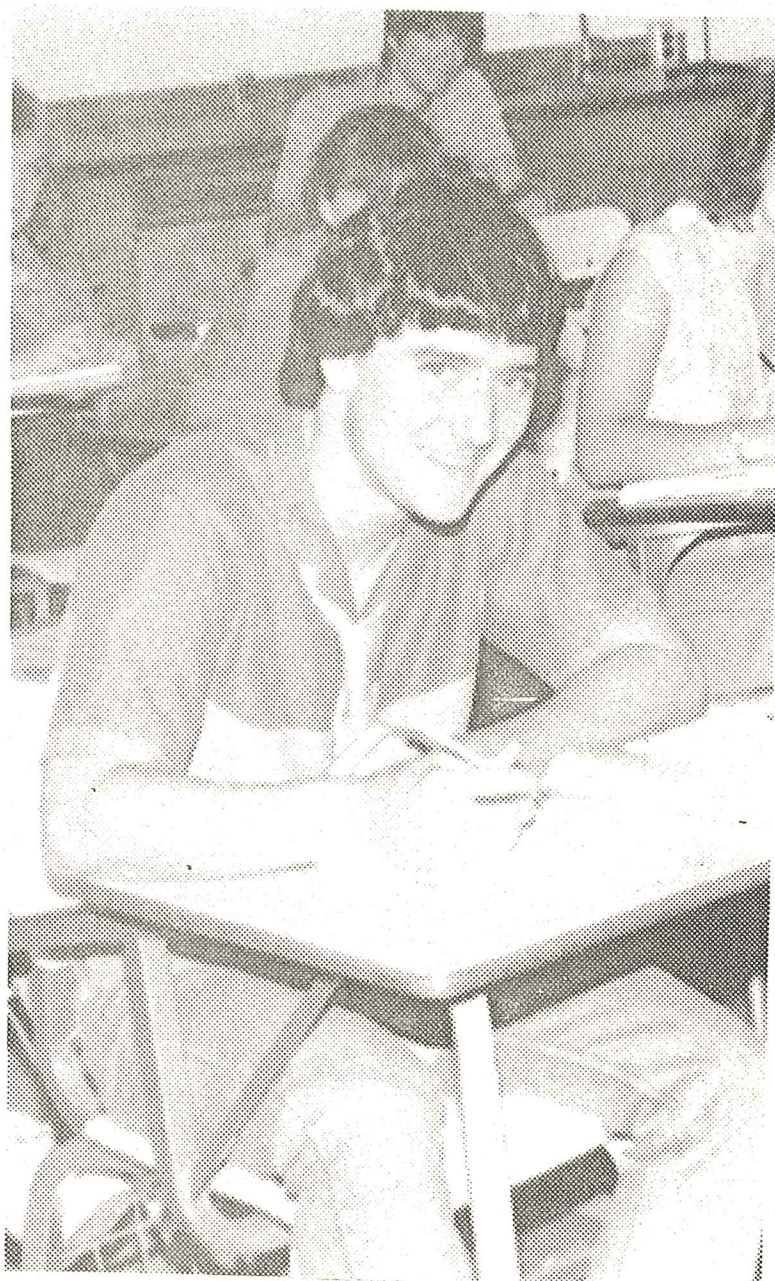
Sayegh continued to sharpen his soccer skills by playing with the Brick Township Centurions for five years, where he also controlled the sweeper position.

Brick Upsets Squan, 28-14

"It was like watching a GIANT game," stated Mrs. Richardson, the Journalism advisor, referring to the Manasquan Warrior, Brick Memorial football game in which the Mustangs won 23-19.

The Mustangs took control early in the opening quarter when they drove 47 yards down to Squan's 17 yard line to set up an 8 yard touchdown run from their fullback, to take the lead 7-0.

The Big Blue's offense retaliated in the second quarter with an 81 yard march in 8 plays and ending it with a 12 yard touchdown run by sophomore quarterback Ty Hawkins. Squan tied it up 7-7 going into the half.

"I thought we played well but every slightest mistake hurt us," stated sophomore fullback Elliot Morgan, referring to Bricks' 59 yard pass to set up another Mustang score. Memorial now led by 7, 14-7.

Hawkins came back to complete numerous passes to bring Squan inside Brick's 10 yard line. Executing the option perfectly Hawkins managed to turn the corner and tie the ball game back up at 14-14.

In the final quarter Memorial moved the ball both in the air and on the ground against the Big Blue's defense setting up a Mustang 17 yard touchdown pass to once again take the lead 21-14.

Hawkins' intercepted pass resulted in a Brick 7 yard touchdown run to put the game in the win column over the Manasquan Warriors, 28-14.

OCEAN 23 SQUAN 19

"I really thought we were going to win. We just didn't play as tough in the last quarter as we did in the first three," stated sophomore defensive back Billy Reynolds, referring to Squans' depressing loss to a tough Ocean Township squad, 23-19.

In the opening quarter junior quarterback Rich Eknoian handed off to sophomore fullback Elliot Morgan over right end for a 58 yard touchdown run to put the Big

Blue on top 6-0. Unfortunately senior kicker Nelson Lapham missed the extra point.

Throughout the second quarter Squan played tough defense as well as running excellent offense. Senior fullback Derrick Roberson took a handoff from Eknoian and exploded through Ocean's line from 24 yards out to increase the Big Blue's lead to 12-0. Again Squan missed the extra point.

From the first play of scrimmage in the second half Morgan once again took a hand off from Eknoian over left tackle, Dennis Roberts and glided 61 yards for yet another Big Blue score. Squan was now on top 19-0.

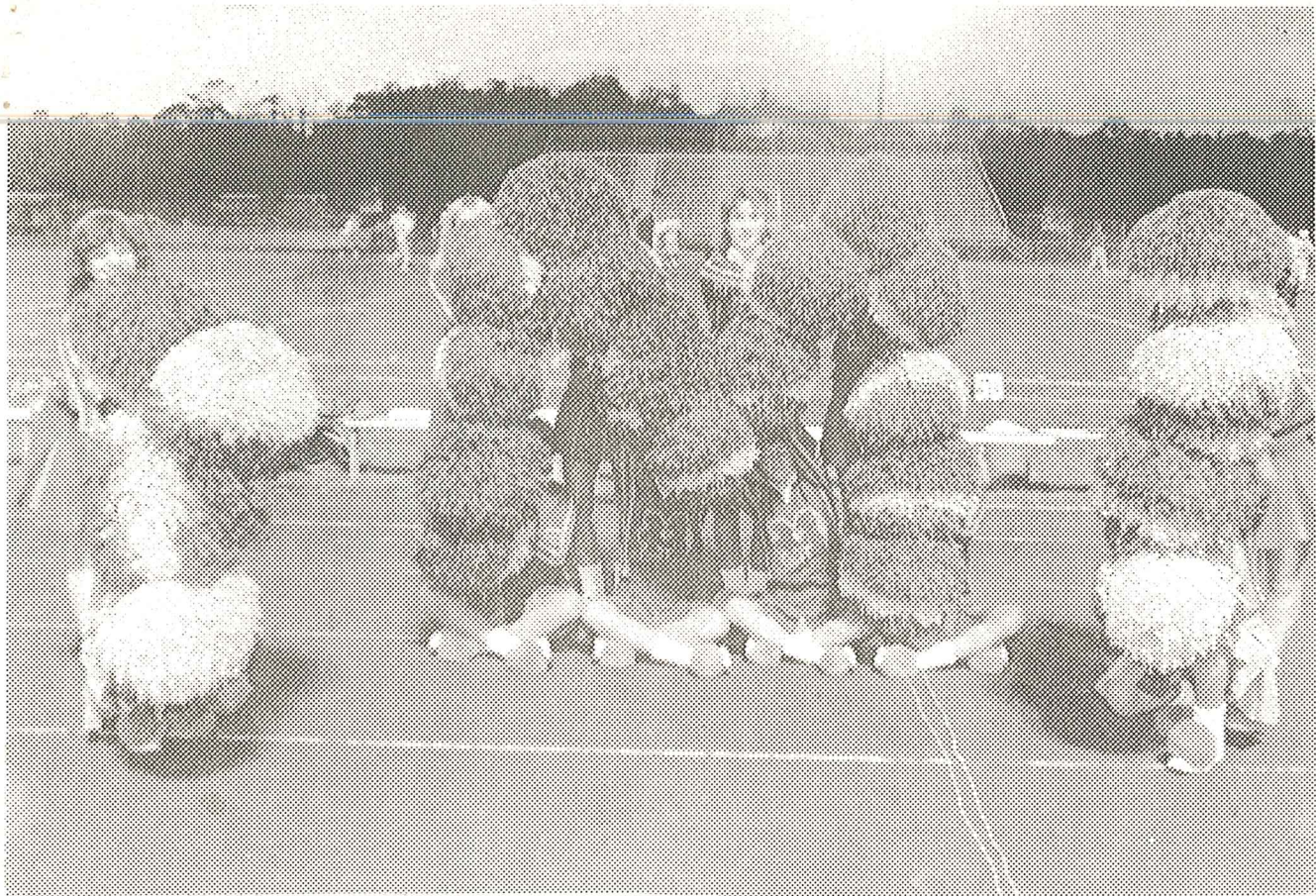
The Spartans' offense came back with a quarterback draw which resulted in a 56 yard touchdown to put Ocean on the score board. Squan was still in front 19-7. "We gotta beautiful 'D' although mental errors hurt us," stated defensive back Tony Jones, referring to Ocean's 57 yard touchdown run.

Very early in the final quarter Ocean's quarterback threw a 20 yard touchdown pass to pull them within 5, 19-14.

Squan being penalized was the result of 4th down and 15 on the Big Blue's 1 yard line. Eknoian was given instructions to give Ocean the safety which closed the gap even more to 19-16.

Following the safety Squan punted and left the Spartans' offense on the Big Blue's own 40 yard line. Ocean drove 36 yards down to the Big Blue's 4 yard line. With one minute left on the clock Ocean threw a touchdown pass to defeat the Big Blue 23-19.

"In my opinion too many linemen play both ways and don't get enough rest," stated defensive tackle Jim Hoos, referring to Squan's loss to Ocean.

(Below) Senior Mike Sullivan tries to intercept the Brick offense.

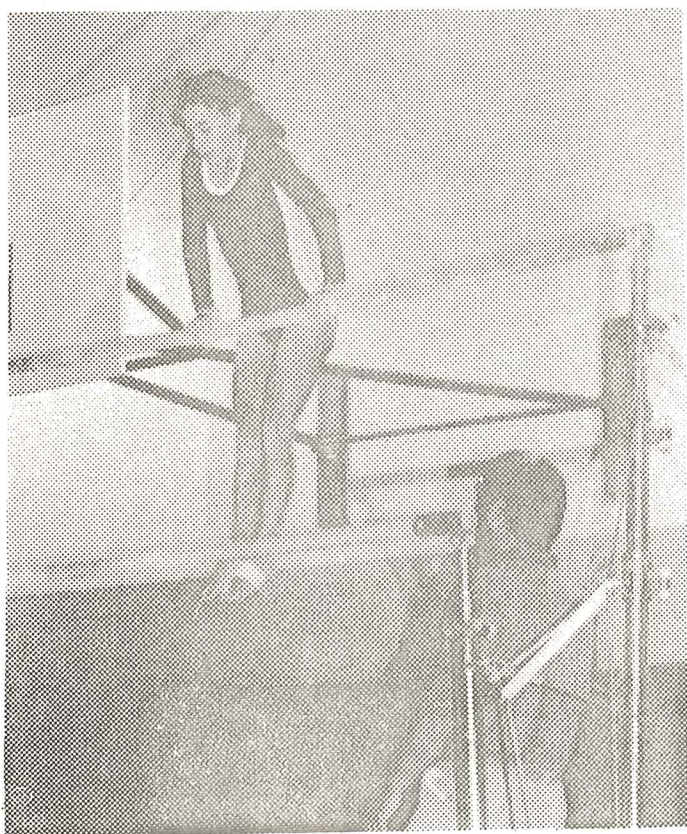

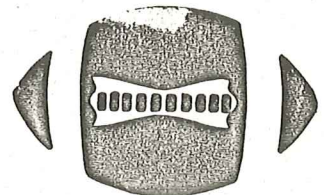

COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S TOP 20 REVIEW

Freshman sensation Edwin Simmons of Texas, ran all over Oklahoma as payback for last year, when Marcus Dupree raced up and down the field to upset Texas, 23-22. The 6' 4", 220-lbs. freshman ran for 100 yards, a 67-yard touchdown, and one 8-yarder, for 14 carries. #33 looks like a possible Heisman trophy-winner in the future, as well as an All-American. Texas beat the Sooners, 28-16, and the Longhorn defense held Dupree to 50 yards on 14 carries. With Texas' schedule and their victories, they should be ranked above #1 Nebraska who are playing teams like Oklahoma State and other second-rate teams.

#1 Nebraska still remains on top with their 14-10 victory over Oklahoma State. The Cornhuskers' unbelievable runningback Mike Rozier leads the N.C.A.A. with a healthy 151.8 yards per game average. It looks like a possible undefeated regular season for the Huskers', but the test will be taken in the bowl game.

John Congerni passed Pittsburgh by Florida State, 17-16. Other top 20 victories include: Georgia over Mississippi, 36-11; Michigan over Michigan St., 42-0 (yes, 42-0!) ; Ohio State over Purdue, 33-22; North Carolina took Wake Forest, 30-10; and Florida downed Vanderbilt.

There was only one major, top 20 upset this weekend. that was those Penn State Nittany Lions over the Alabama Crimson Tide. Doug Strang (Strang?) led a fantastic aerial show, while D.J. Dozier, another freshman sensation, rustled for 103 yards.

The top twenty chart has shaped up pretty well in these past six weeks of play. Nebraska and four other teams are still undefeated. This looks like it will be one of the most suspenseful and exciting races ever. My personal pick for this year are those Longhorns of Texas, as they will (probably) roll through the rest of the season with virtual ease.

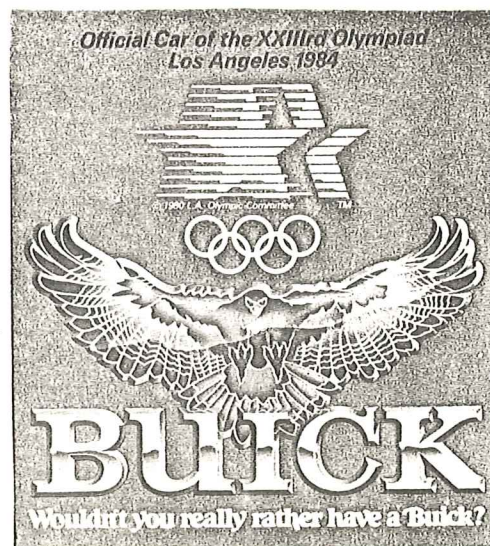

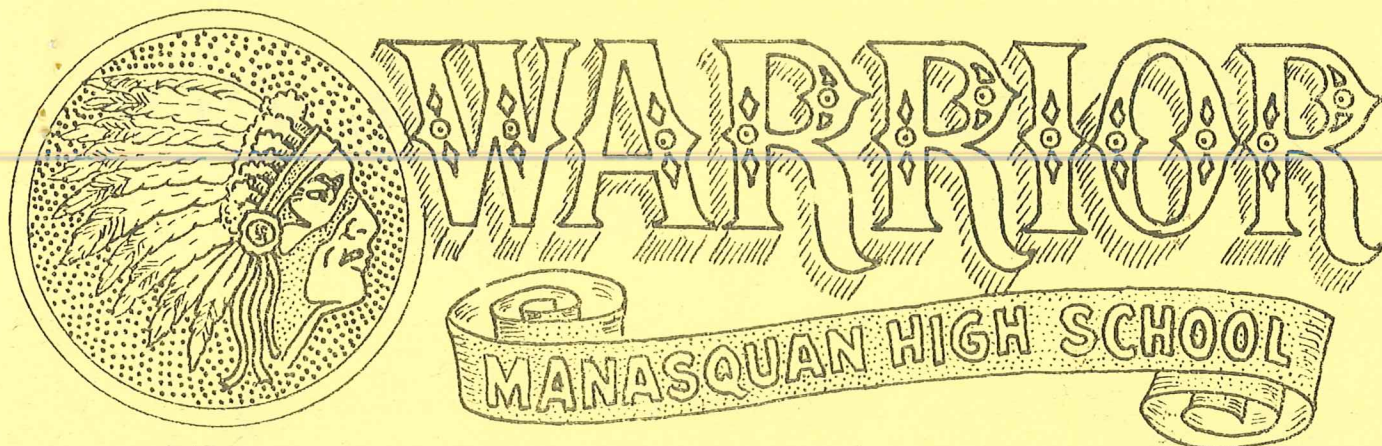
