# Baum Bausch & Lomb Winner

**"Chris is an excellent student and is highly motivated.**

She is pursuing a career in science and should be very successful," stated Mrs. Christine Clark referring to Christine Baum, this year's winner of the Bausch and Lomb Science Award.

Each year the honorary science award is presented to a twelfth grade student in recognition of outstanding achievement, good character, and superior intellectual promise in the study of science.

The nomination for Baum was selected on several criteria. First, a member of the science faculty offered professional judgments regarding the quality of work done by Baum and her level of performance in the science courses she has completed at Manasquan High School.

Secondly, a search of the student record was taken to certify the courses taken and the teachers with whom she studied, as well as the grade achieved.

Thirdly, consultation with the Guidance Staff established Baum's class rank.

Last, discussion among the Science Faculty determined the merits of each nominee, followed by selection of the award winner.

Although Baum has chosen not to compete, Bausch and Lomb Science Award winners from each high school may vie for a four year scholarship offered by the University of Rochester.

Baum has been a straight A student at MHS in all of her science courses. She began with 9th grade Lab Biology and she took 10th grade Chemistry. In her junior year she had Physics, Anatomy and Physiology. She is presently studying Advanced Placement Chemistry on a non-credit basis with Mrs. Clark in preparation for college. Baum is also studying Organic Chemistry with Dr. Charles Hayne.

This Spring Lake resident, who is presently ranked number 1 of her Senior Class of 264, hopes to attend either Chestnut Hill College, John Hopkins University or Virginia Poly Tech. Her major will be pre-veterinary.

Baum's outside interests include horses, biking and running. She worked at the Windward Horse Farm

at Wall Township for three years as a groomer.

At MHS she is active in the Spanish Club and the National Honor Society. She hopes to play softball this spring.

With a heavy workload in Calculus, English IV, Spanish IV Honors, Advanced Placement Chemistry and Physical Education, Baum studies 3 to 4 hours every night.

"I would like to thank the science teachers for giving me a good background in science. I am surprised and ecstatic about this award," Baum said.

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# SQUAN TIES FOR 1<sup>ST</sup> PLACE IN MATH CONTEST

Manasquan High School is tied for **FIRST PLACE** with CBA, Freehold Township, Middletown South, and Raritan in Region 12-Monmouth County of the New Jersey Math League contest No. 3.

Only nine schools in N.J. earned a team score higher than MHS' 25 points. The highest score was North Plainfield's 28 points.

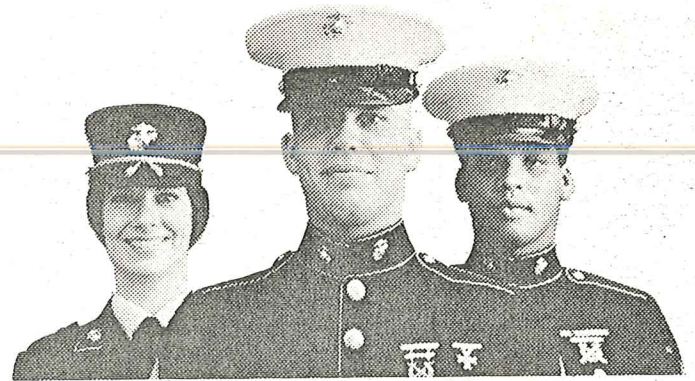
This marks the first time that Manasquan High School has risen above third place since our students began participation in the League a number of years ago.

The team score for Manasquan High School in Contest No. 3 was the sum of the scores of Estelle Green, James Graff, Steve Groener, Peter Boyle, and Christina Baum, who all scored five out of a possible six points.

Other students scoring four out of six points were James Brower, Jenny Murray, Todd Lindstrom, and Chris Reilly. About 120 Manasquan High School students took part in Contest No. 3.

In the cumulative total for the three contests so far in the series of six Manasquan High School has 69 points. This is five less than the leader, CBA. Manasquan is tied for fifth place with Ocean Township.

Nineteen high schools are in the Monmouth County Region 12.

## 125 COMPETE IN MATH CONTEST

Over 125 students in Manasquan High school competed in the Seventh Annual NJ High Schools Mathematics Contest on November 17, 1983. The contest is sponsored by the Association of Mathematics Teachers of New Jersey (AMING) and is designed to promote active interest in mathematics among high school students throughout the state.

The contest consisted of fifteen problems of varying levels of difficulty. This year's contest was felt to contain more difficult problems than previous years, producing an average team score of 16.7, down from last year's average of 24. The team score for each participating high school is the sum of the five highest individual scores.

Manasquan High School's team score was 18, placing us 27th among the 75 high schools represented in the statistics for this contest.

Miss Kelly Cowles, a Manasquan High School senior, placed among the top twenty-five students in the state in this contest. She completed seven items correctly; just three items less than the two top individuals who scored ten out of fifteen items correct.

Miss Cowles received Honorable Mention in the individual standings for her efforts. She is to be congratulated for doing so well against some of the most powerful high schools in New Jersey in the realm of mathematics.

Manasquan High School has competed in each of the AMING contests through the years it has been in existence. The faculty advisor is Walter Edick, assisted by George Bower. Both are members of the MHS Mathematics faculty. Through their volunteer efforts, and the cooperation of their colleagues, Manasquan High School also competes in the New Jersey Math League, the Annual High School Mathematics Examination, sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America, and local competitions.

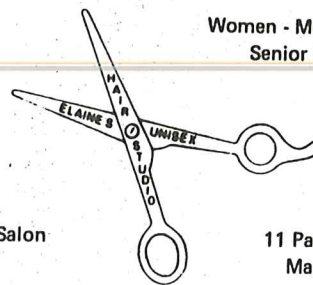
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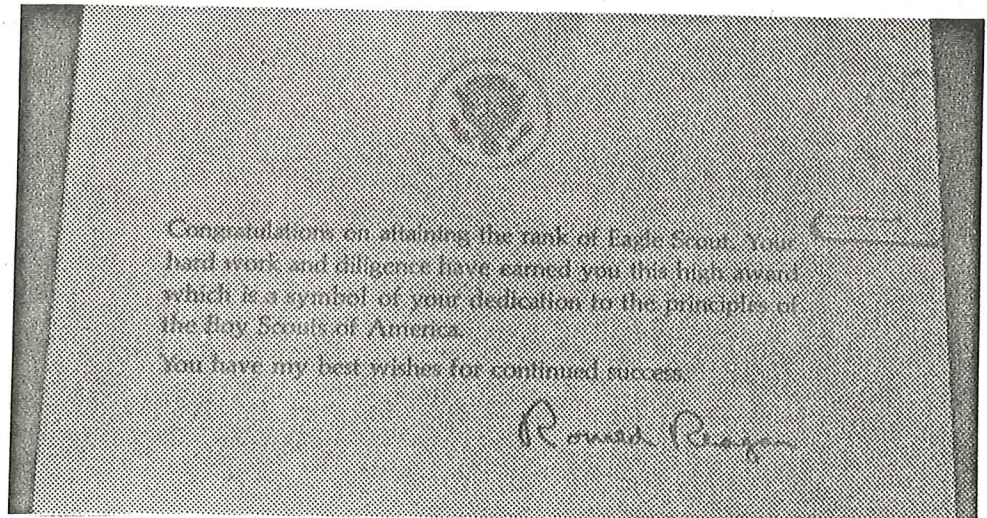
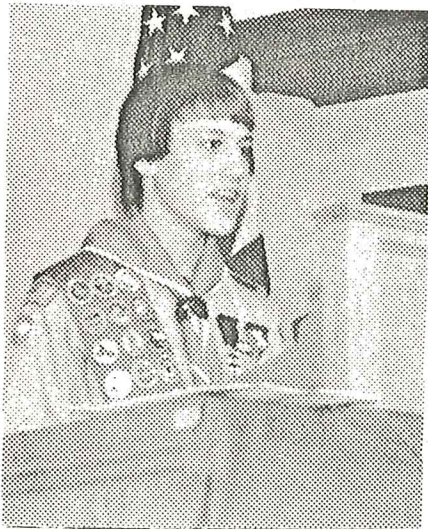

Their last two tours, as well as their last two albums, have hosted stunning success in the U.S. as well as England

But who is responsible for this less-than-heavy metal sound? Well, the first person I would have to convict is Joe Elliot. Joe is the band's lead vocalist. Other members of Def Leppard include: Phil Collen on lead guitar, bassist Steven Clark, and rhythm guitarist Rick Savage.

During D.L.'s initial tour of the U.S., they performed many of their original songs including "Ride Into the Sun". This tour took place in early 1980. Later on in that year, they released their first American LP called On Through the Night. The album had moderate success over here, but not as half as good as in Def Leppard's native country of England. But then again, it was expected of Def to do well in England, because they had been playing there since each one of them was about 10.

After the 1980 album, it was 1981; therefore, it was time for another album. And so it was; in 1981 Def Leppard produced their first American hit album, High and Dry. Maybe it wasn't exactly a major success, but it surely did better than their first attempt.

Now that the second U.S. release album was made, it was time for another tour. Of course, the tour finally ended and time came for yet another album. This time, there was BIG success. Pyromania topped the charts in no time at all, and the big single "Photograph" crashed through the charts, stunning most of the other Top 40 musicians. # JAMES GRAFF: STUDENT OF THE MONTH

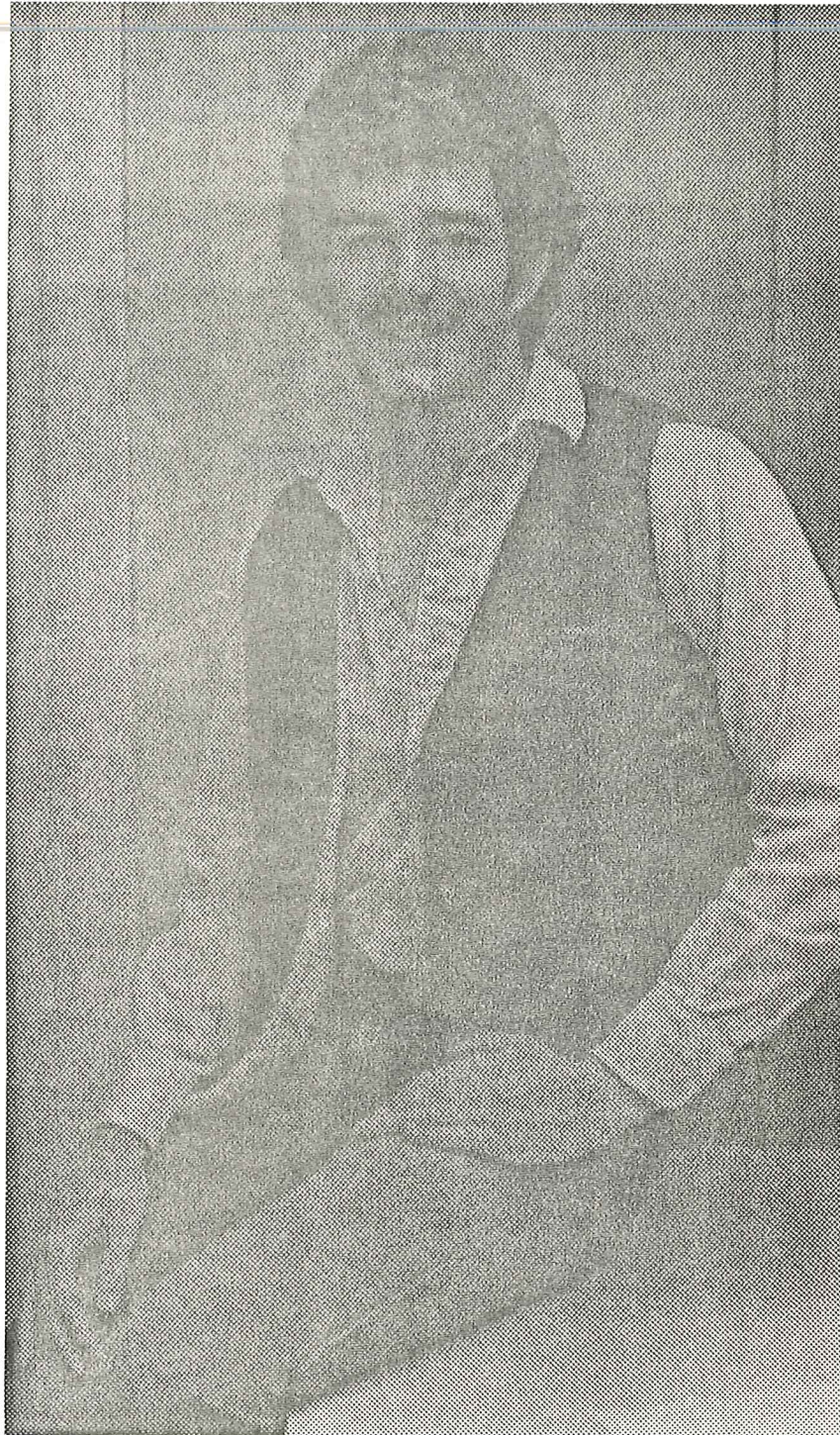

4. Yes, but not enough of an effect that he will win in the primary.

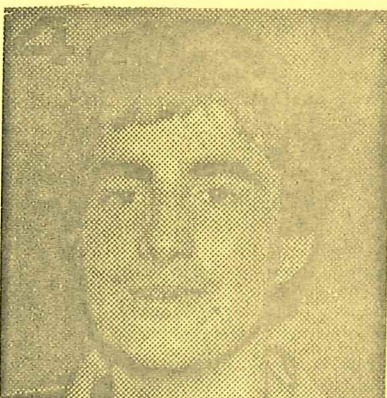
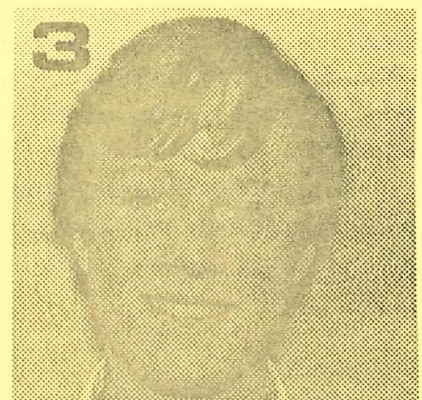

# GENESIS

Genesis was essentially a seven-ties' creation. They rose to prominence in the early part of the decade sharing an audience with such groups as Yes and ELP but lacking their instrumental talent.

The original members of the group at Charterhouse School comprised Peter Gabriel (vocals), Mike Rutherford (bass) and Tony Banks (keyboards). Their desire to write songs brought them together and to the attention of pop entertainer Johnathan King. He went on to produce their first album for Decca, "From Genesis to Revelation" (1969). It didn't go over as a big hit either for the public or the critics who were disappointed. Their following album, "Trespass" was basically following in the footsteps of their first effort. After "Trespass", Phil Collins (drums) and a little later Steve Hackett (guitar) were brought in to add musical muscle to the group.

"Nursery Crime" (1971), their third album, marketing the debut of Collins and Hackett, was more fully realized in which Genesis' unusual style began to take a more concrete form. Their following continued to grow with "Foxtrot" (1972).

By 1974 with the release of "The Lamb Lies Down on Broadway", Genesis became a force to be reckoned with. Gabriel had become a remarkable performer wearing outrageous masks and costumes to resemble the bizarre characters he had created.

Having achieved this major breakthrough, Gabriel—who was Genesis as far as most people were concerned—left the group to pursue a solo career in late 1975. For many it signalled the end of the group. After auditioning hundreds of likely replacements, Phil Collins stepped out to take over the lead vocal role with remarkable ease. The first post-Gabriel album "Trick of the Tail"

(1976), was also well received and Genesis has a rejuvenated trio (for Steve Hackett had also departed) have since reached greater commercial peaks than the Gabriel years. After "Trick of the Tail" came "Seconds Out" (1977), "And Then There Were Three" (1978), "Duke" (1980), "Abacab" (1981), and finally their latest and without a doubt their best release, simply entitled "Genesis".

All three have also released solo material; Collins has worked with jazz-rock outfit band Brand X and appeared on Robert Plant's latest album "The Principle of Moments", and also produced. Ironically, Collins' solo career has been ten times more successful than Peter Gabriel's.

Did you ever wonder how MHS was 10, 20 or even 30 years ago? In this column, I will go back in time and you can see just how it was! The information for this column is taken from the Warrior morgue. The cost of the Warrior 10 years ago ranged from 5¢ to 10¢ an issue.

September 73- All of the cooking classes went coed. "Prior to this year only girls were allowed in the kitchen, but now with courses open to everyone many boys have been able to display their hidden cooking talents by preparing exotic dishes," stated Miss Morano, cooking teacher.

October 73- Manasquan High School's drama club was preparing to present "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown". It was directed by Miss Patricia McCorkle. In other news, the woman teachers turned to pants instead of skirts. Woman teachers began wearing pants on Wednesday, October 3 when it was approved by William E. Miller, superintendent of Manasquan.

November 73- The Manasquan Board of Education announced on Tuesday night that they would bring before Mr. Marburger of the New Jersey State Board of Education a petition to remove Spring Lake, Belmar, and South Belmar as Manasquan's sending districts. January 73- Squan to go on split sessions in Fall. The increasing enrollment forced Manasquan High School to adopt a complete split sessions schedule in September. Junior and Seniors will attend school from 7:30 to 12:00 and Freshmen and Sophomores from 1:00 to 5:00. Manasquan High School presents "Anything Goes".

February 73- Manasquan's Wrestling team, coached by Mr. Walter Campbell, ends their season taking third in the B Division. Dollar to Serve on Drug Council-Five young people from MHS have been appointed by the Board of Freeholders to serve as members of the Monmouth County Narcotics Council.

March 73- A self study was set up in Manasquan High School in preparation for the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools accreditation evaluation next November. Manasquan's Hockey club defeated Sayerville in the first round of the Hockey League B Division playoffs. They played Long Branch for the championship.

April 73- In sports, five members of the MHS track team are co-holders of a new World's Record along with 95 other runners: Jim Clayton, Jim Tully, Bob Kelley, Elijah Jenkins, and Clarke.

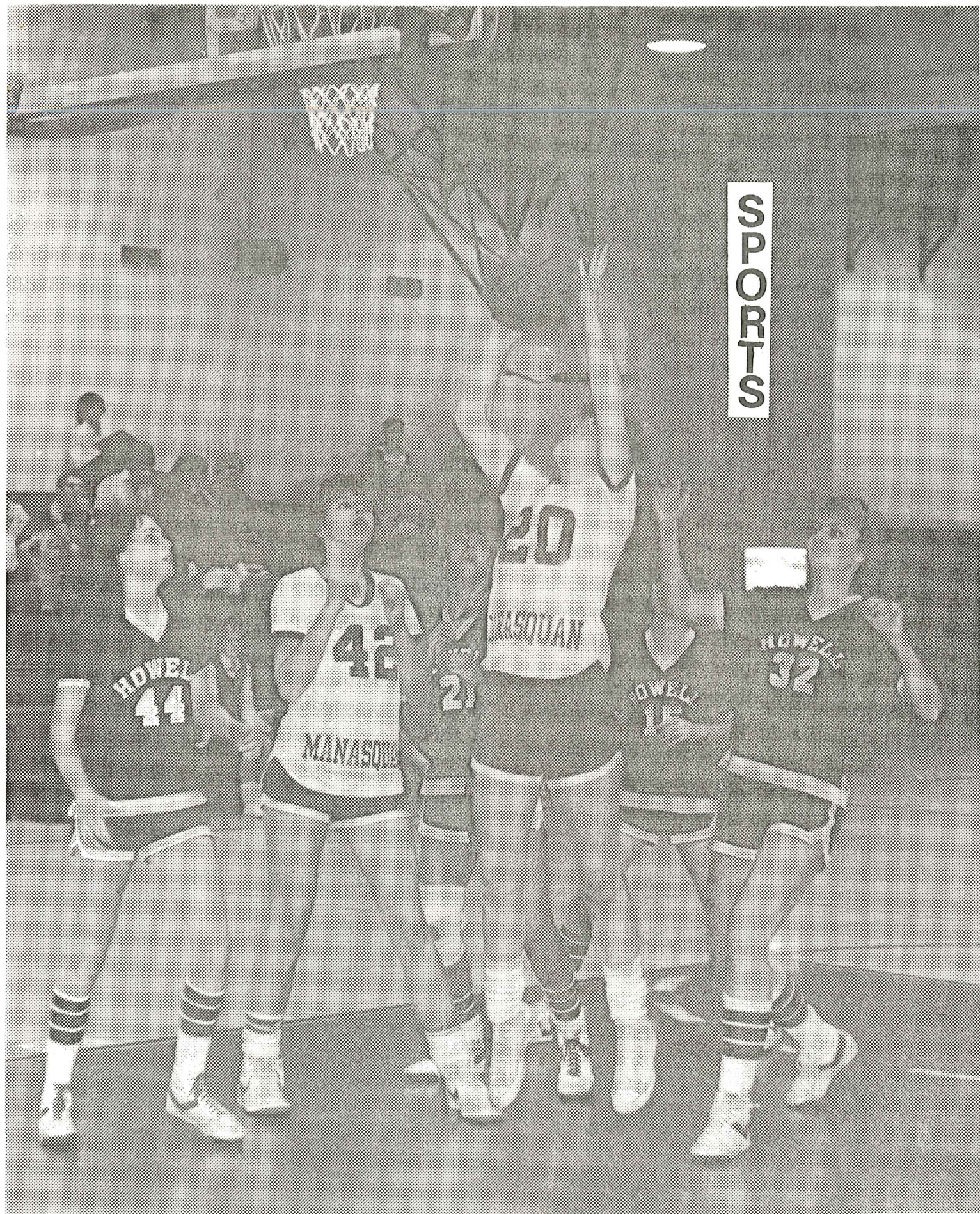

The first annual Career Day at MHS was held for students in grades 10, 11, and 12. The Keyette Club which consisted of all girls sponsored a cancer drive. # Varsity Hoopsters Upset Colonials, 55-46

"We played tough under the boards and that's what won us the game," stated Bill Newbury in reference to Squan's victory over Freehold Boro on the Boro's homecourt Tuesday afternoon, 55-46.

The Warriors jumped off to a quick start against Freehold. Darnell Esdaile hit three jumpers to give them a 13-8 lead over the Colonials, who had a record of 10-3.

Freehold Boro fought its way back into the game during the second quarter. Scott Gregory tossed in six points while the Colonials' defense held Squan scoreless for over five minutes. At halftime Freehold was leading 20-19.

Both teams played evenly to start off the second half, trading baskets each trip up the floor. Boro then scored six straight points to up its lead to 38-33 with one quarter remaining.

Squan made a beautiful comeback to put the game away in the final quarter. Esdaile and Pat Honey combined for 15 of Squan's final 22 points to seal the upset victory at 55-46.

Squan jumped off to a quick start against the Crimson Knights, building up a seven point advantage midway through the quarter and taking a 15-10 lead.

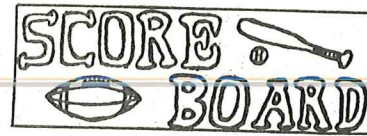

Squan is looking to up its record as they will take on Howell and St. Rose, respectively, this weekend at home.



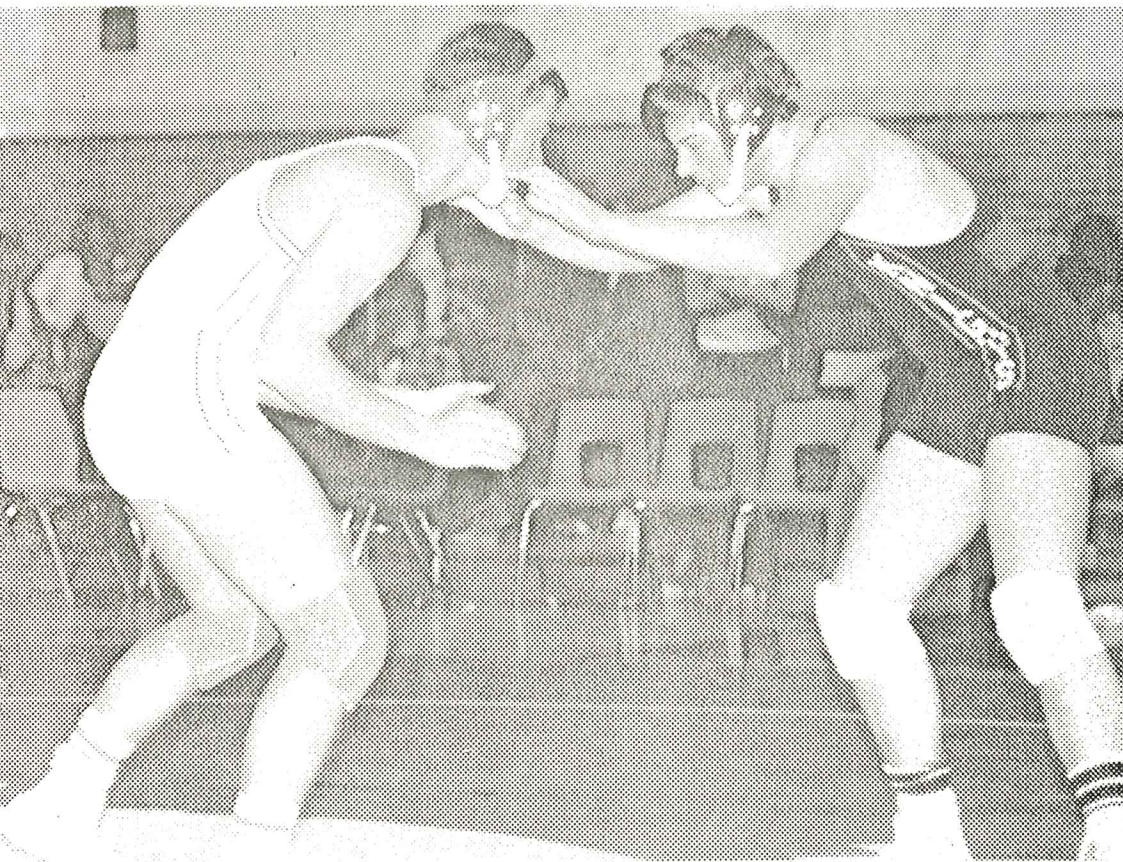
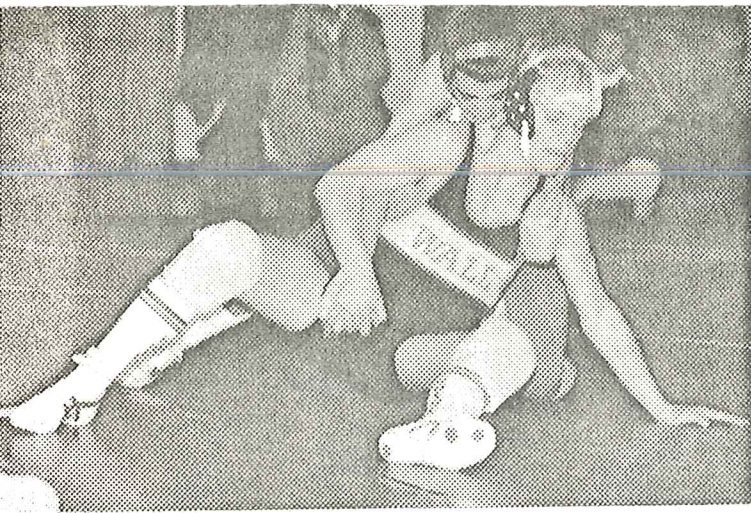
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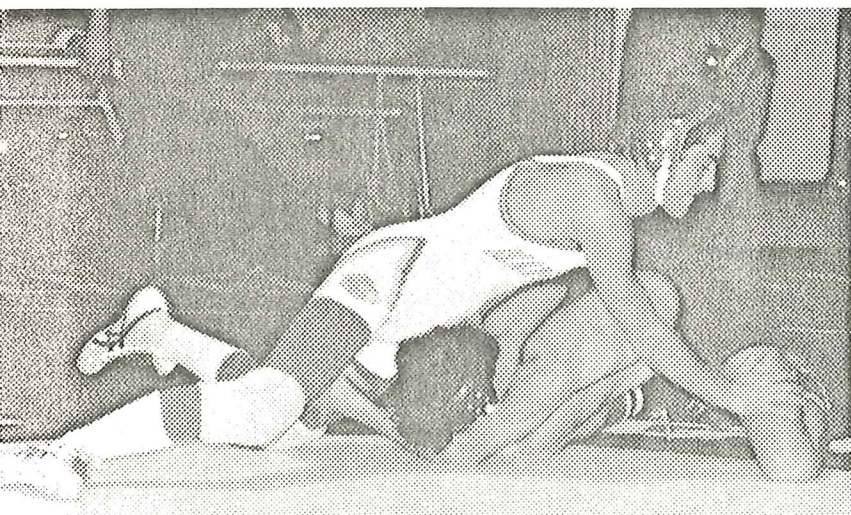

Center: Junior Brett Beliveau looks over his opponent in the 167 lbs. weight class.

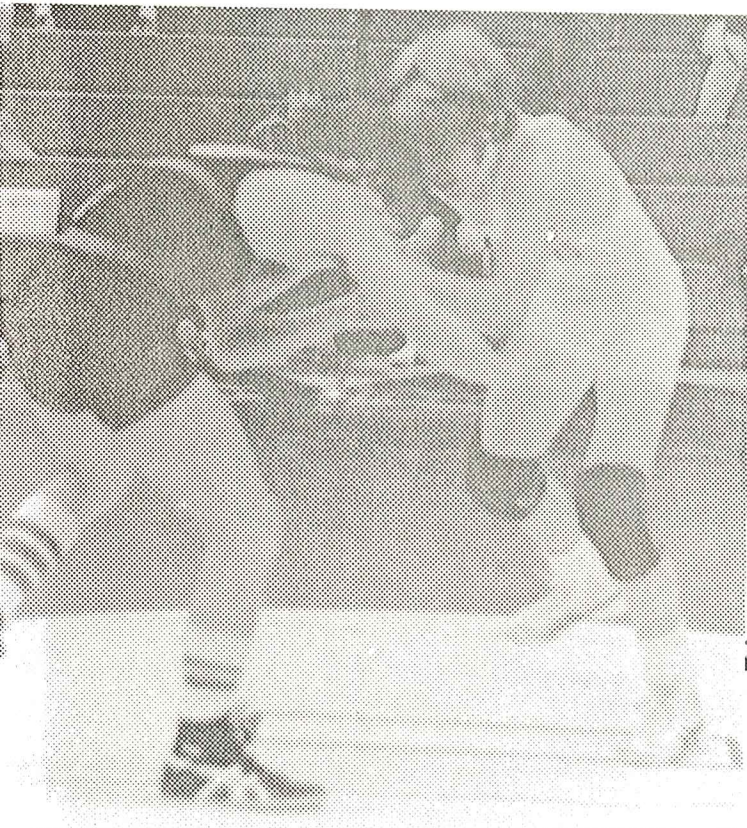
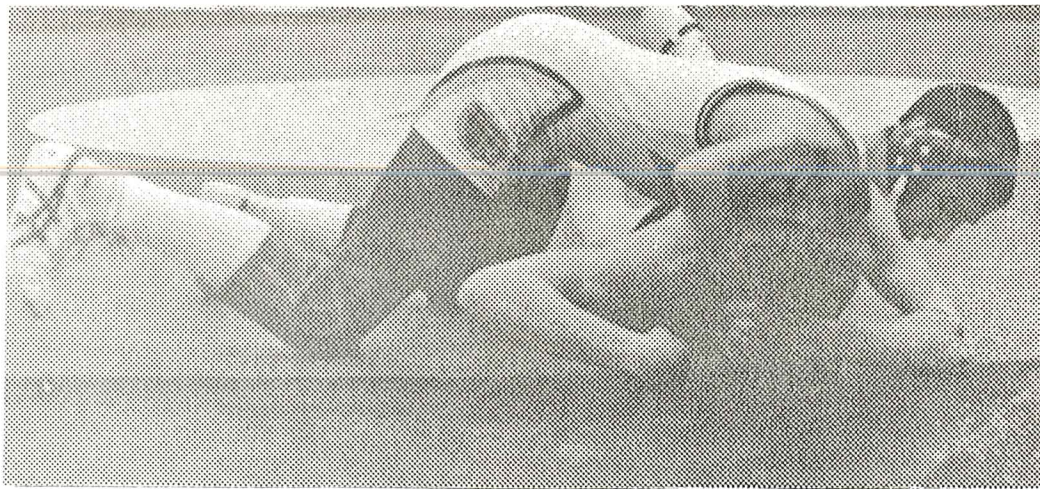

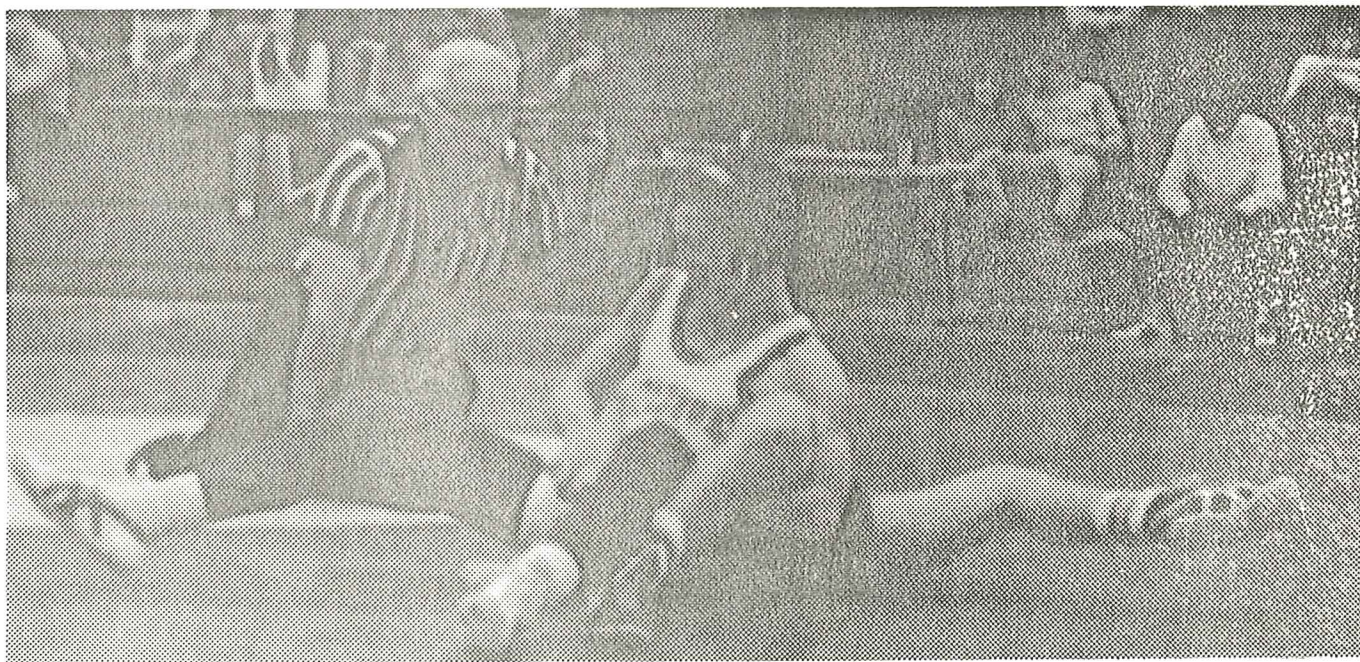


Above: Danny Martyn shows his Jackson Township opponent who's on top in his 6-2 match.

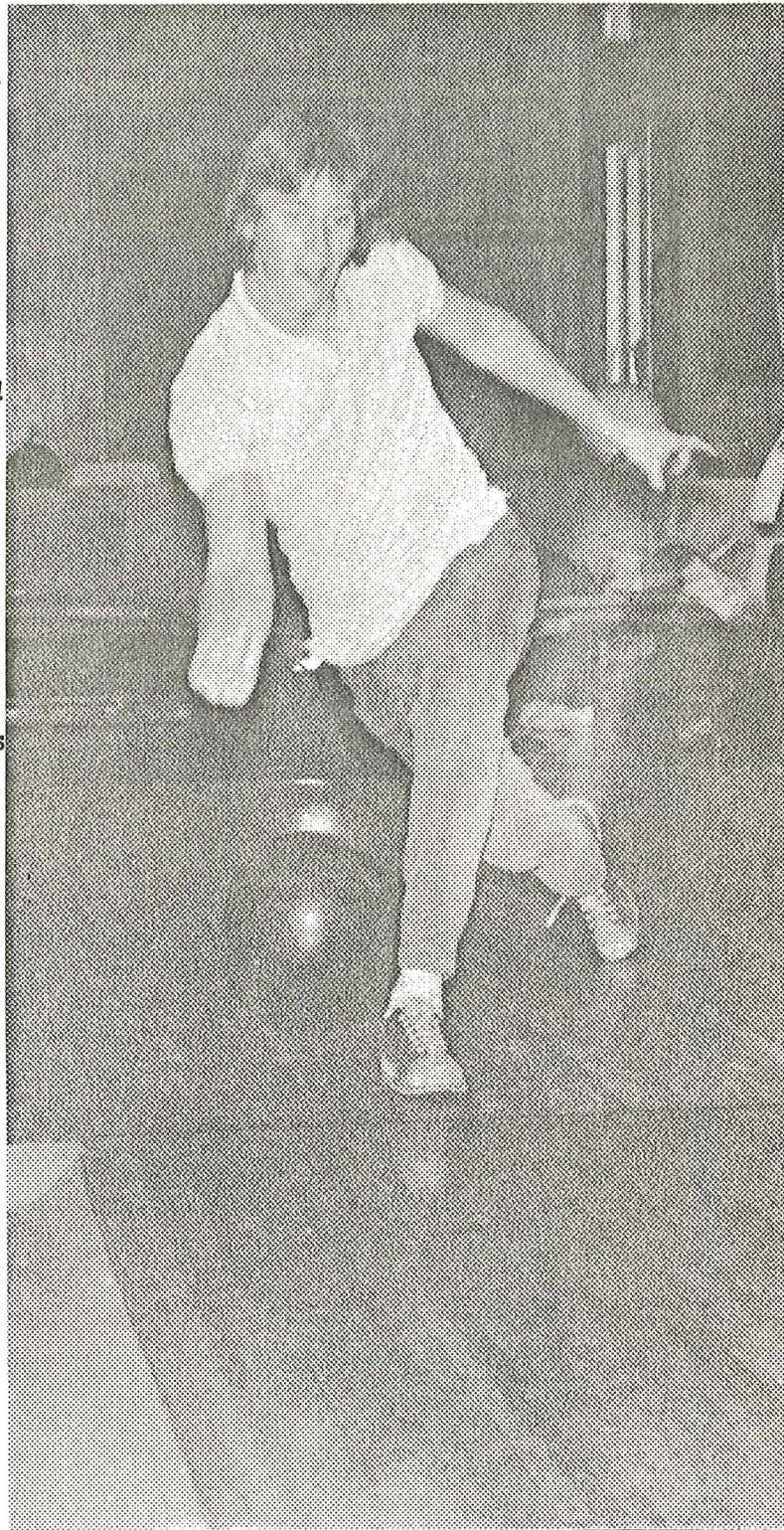

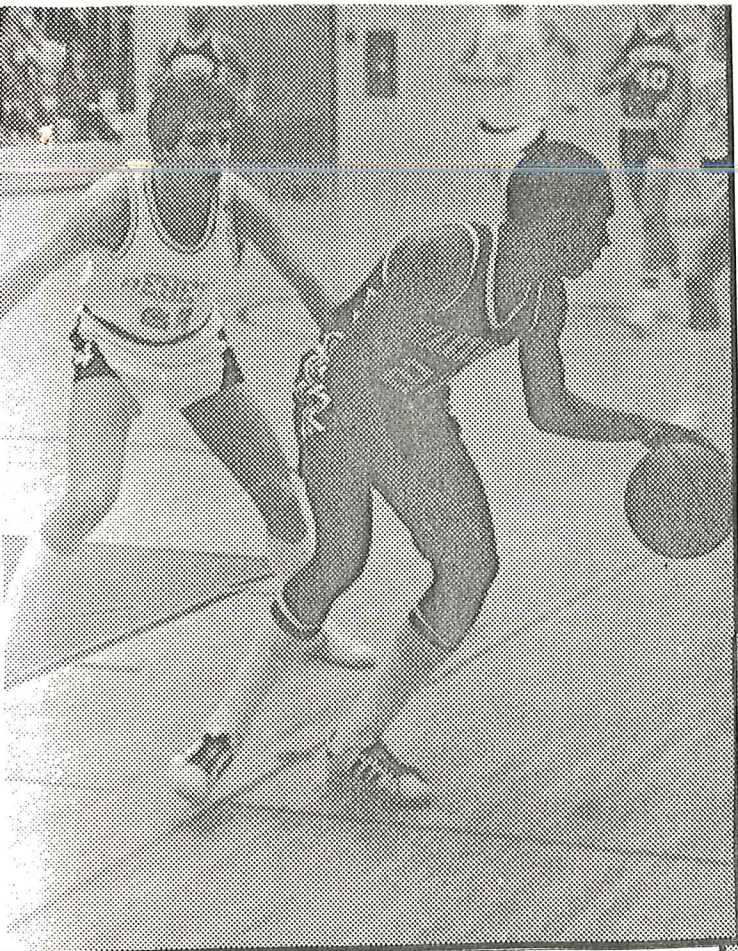

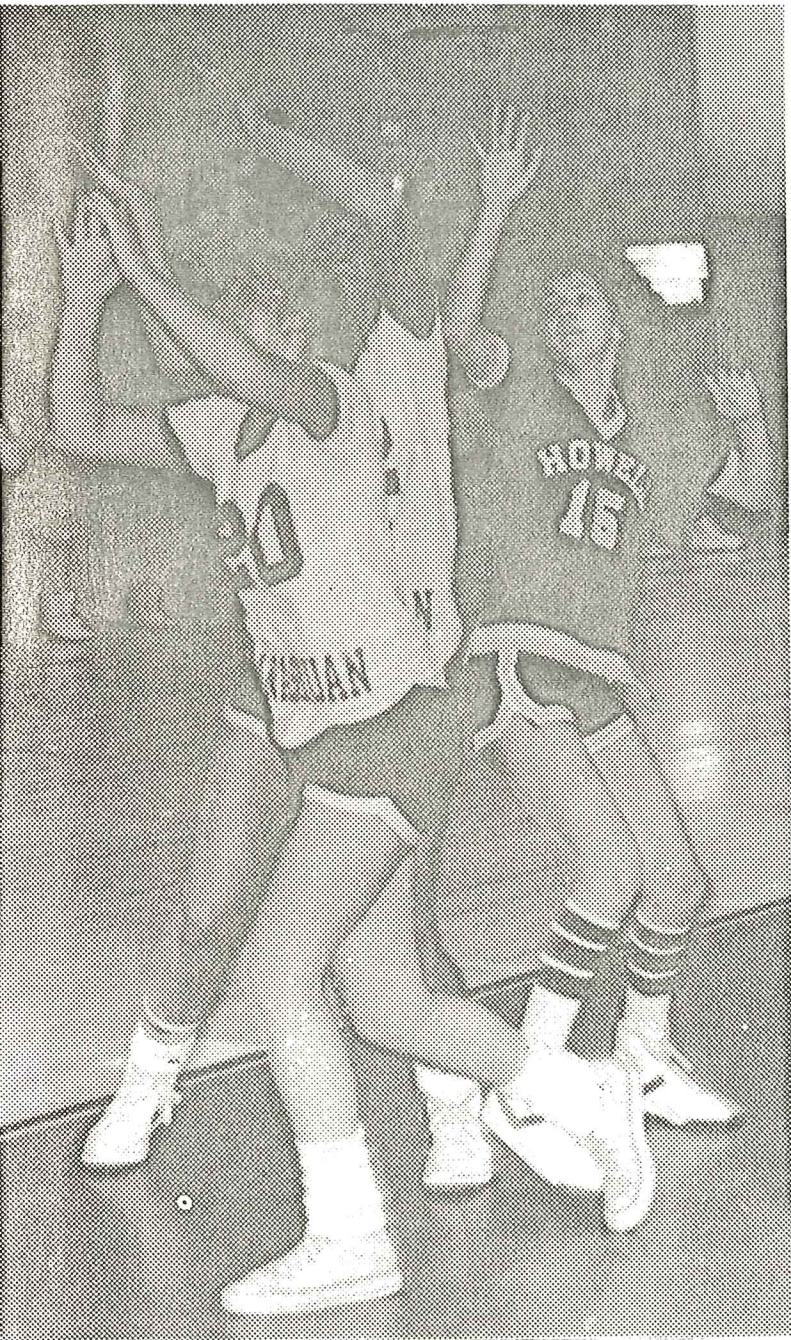
