

During his presentation, How Are You Doing? Eight Tips to Improve Your High School Newspaper, Tuers roasted and praised many shore area school publications. Junior Gail Mullery also received compliments fro her timely and well written article "Candidates and Issues '84" featrued in the November 1st issue of the "Warrior".

The 20th Annual High School Journalism Seminar, sponsored by the Asbury Park Press and Monmouth College was held on Friday, November 16. Thirty seven high schools, including St. Rose, CBA, and Point Pleasant Beach, attended the presentation at Monmouth College.

Students and advisors attended group sessions about advertising, sports, columns, reporting, editorials, photography, features, and graphics. The sessions were workshop classes presented by staff members of the Press, who spoke and held open forums about specific topics of running a newspaper.

Guest speaker Michael McManus, a syndicated columnist, spoke about "Why You Should Consider a Career in Journalism," to the student journalists. He mentioned how his career effects so many others. McManus's column, "The Northern Perspective" is published by more than 50 newspapers and it involves issues pertaining to the Northeast and Midwest.

Illustrator/cartoonist and sports writer for the Press, Bill King, demonstrated editorial art in his presentation. King described the use of simple symbols that can be used to stress a point.



Studio albums have been of immense appeal to the public. A studio album meant new songs, new ideas, and new moves towards progress. Usually, each new studio record means another step towards technical perfection. They are the highest quality recording a band can make, and we, the public, like them.

Live records are a little different. Live recordings are generally harder to make and the problems involved in producing a good quality live recording can sometimes seem insurmountable. There are quite a few semi-legendary bands who have written some classic songs, but for some reason they can't seem to produce a reputable live album. One example is The Who. The Who's only live recording thus far, Live At Leed's was a fine album from a musical point of view, but the recording was rather poor and their distinctive sound wasn't captured that well. They just happened to be one of those bands whose live sound could only be fully appreciated in person, Just for reference, their only other live LP will supposedly be released within this month.

On the other hand, a band like U2 can usually make a great live record. You can see this trait in their only one, Under A Blood Red Sky. Some of U2's greatest songs are on this album, and the recording itself, made last year at Red Rocks Amphitheatre in Colorodo, is excellent. Classic tracks like "Gloria", "New Year's Day", "Party Girl", and "I Will Follow" are all included here. The mixture of U2's music and the cheers of the crowds is perfect and well-balanced, as is the ususal musical perfection in which they performed their repore.

Other tracks include "Sunday Bloody Sunday", "11 O'Clock, Tick Tock", "40", and "The Electric Co.". This is an excellent live album and a great U2 cutting. Definite vintage material. Anyone who just appreciates live music by itself should take a glance at this record; it's well worth the effort.



CHAPMAN RESIGNS

On Monday, November 12, Manasquan Varsity Head Football Coach, Gary Chapman told his team that 1984 would be his final year at the helm of the Warriors. Players and coaches that were present were shocked at the suddenness of the announcement. Chapman's resignation raised many questions. But those being asked most often are why did he quit and who will be next in line for the job.

Chapman explained that the lack of public support, as well as the school's inability to make the program more attractive, were the major reasons for his decision. The latter could certainly seem true when one sees the declining participation in football. It could be blamed on decreasing student enrollment as the determining factor, but it's hard to believe it could curb up to 40 players from the roster. When I talked to athletes in other varsity sports they felt that the school could, in fact, make football, as well as their individual sports, more exciting.

Many people, including students, claim that the resignation was the result of tremendous outside pressure and the fact that Chapman could no longer make a winner with what talent he had and thought it was time to move on.

Chapman's arrival at Manasquan came when head coach Jack Hawkins called it quits, after many successful and colorful seasons directing the Big Blue. Chapman left his head job at St. John Vianny where he too enjoyed many successful seasons to fill in Squan's vacancy. In his first few years as the leader of Squan it seemed as


though both Gary Chapman and Manasquan High School football would continue their winning ways.

As of late, though, the Warriors record wasn't what Chapman or the players had hoped for, and more importantly, what the fans had come to expect. The criticism had gotten to be too much for the coach, who moved the Warriors home bench from the side of the stands to the opposite side near the tower a few years ago solely to get away from the fans who became a headache for Chapman, many outsiders believe. Though public opinion might not have been favorable towards the former coach, the players that I have talked to, past and present, had, on the whole, nothing but respect for Chapman.

When asked what stood out in their minds about their coach, Senior Matt Clark said it was his "unyielding commitment to excellence" and his "giving everybody a fair shot in proving themselves on the football field", according to senior Quarterback Mike Gerraty. All players I talked to thought that Chapman would coach again and do well in the process.

All this leads to the big question of who is going to lead the Warriots into battle next year. Speculation and wild predictions have been commonplace with everyone giving their pick and supporting evidence. Among those names being tossed around are former head coach Jack Hawkins, who is widely liked and who will have son Ty controlling the offense. Varsity Baseball coach Jake Landfried is also being mentioned. Assistant coach Walt Edick,

"It was a defensive battle," stated defensive end Matt Clark. The Big Blue held the Piners to only six yards rushing the entire game.


"So much for the great Turner Pierce. That just proves nobody runs against Squan, nobody!" exclaimed defensive back Tony Jones.


Late in the third quarter Squan fought back desperately, and Lance Simek brought Squan right back into the game as he scored to make the score 2-1.

In the fourth period Squan was on the attack but on a transistion play Brunswick brought on a counterattack and tallied to end Squan hopes of a state crown.

The Big Blue finished the season with a 9-9-2 record and 5-5 in class B-South. The highlights of the season were a 3-2 victory over Monsignor Donovan, and overtime victories over Central and Howell.

The leading scorers for the Warriors were Lance Simek, Matt Herrmann and Pat Honey. Six out of Squan's 9 losses came to the Shore's top team, Lakewood twice, Wall twice and CBA twice. DOLPHINS AND MARINO ON TOP

The Miami Dolphins and their "quick strike" offence led by all pro quarter-back Don Marino are having a season most teams dream about. The Dolphins are currently 11-1 with Marino on top of the NFI in passing touchdowns and percentage.

Marino's first start was last year against the Buffalo Bills. His first two NFL completions were to the Bills' defense. Coach Don Shula had faith in his rookie, as Marino went on to throw four touchdowns that game. He went on to throw 20 touchdowns in the '83 season and became all pro. The Dolphins are 18-1 when Marino calls the signals.

The 1984 season did not start out well for the rookie sensation. Marino had orthorscopic surgery on his knee and spent most of the preseason on the bench.

Coach Shula was concerned about Marino's performance against their tough opening day rival, the Washington Red-skins. All questions were answered fast. Marino threw for 311 yards and five TD's.

GOODEN ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

It's finally official. The Mets' Dwight Gooden is the 1984 National League Rookie of the Year. That was the big news in baseball Monday, November 12th. It would have been bigger news if he was not selected. Gooden who was 17-9 with a 2.60 era and a major league leading 276 strike outs, wound up with 23 out of 24 first place votes.

Gooden is the first teenager to win this award and fourth Met to take Rookie of the Year honors. Pitchers Jon Matlack and Tom Seaver won prior to Darral Strawberry's selection last year.

SANDBERG NATIONAL LEAGUE MVP

Ryne Sandberg was named winner of the national league's most valuable player award last Tuesday, when he joined pitcher Rick Sutcliffe, Cy Young Winner, to give the NL fast champion Cubs a sweep in awards this season!

Sandberg, 25, and only in his third season in the major league, had a fantastic season. He batted .314, slammed 34 doubles, 19 triples, 19 homeruns and drove in 84 runs. Sandberg also stole 32 bases and was an excellent second baseman.

Met's Keith Hernandez was a distant second and Tony Gwynn finished third in the MVP balloting.

SUPER BRAT STRIKES AGAIN

John McEnroe, the bad boy of the tennis scene, was very nauty last Monday, November 5th in Stockham, Sweden.

McEnroe took time off from playing the \$315,000 Stockholm Open to blast the International Tennis Federation about the Davis Cup's schedule for the 1985 season. He called the ITF "a bunch of idoits."

McEnroe also displayed his temper on the court defeating Anders Jyrryd, 1-6, 7-6, 6-2. It was a vintage McEnroe temper. McEnroe hit a spectator with a ball, called an umpire "a jerk" and smashed a bottle of water court side. This incident cost McEnroe \$2,100 putting him over the limit set by ITF of 7,500.

Johnson has also completed a shortened version of a triathalon and hopes to do another marathon, although his goal is the full triathalon.
