National Honor Society: New By-Laws Approved

Section 3-Selection. Candidates must be members of the sophomore or junior classes and meet the following requirements:

Scholarship. Candidates must have a minimum scholastic cumulative average of 3.5 or higher at the end of 5 semesters (juniors) or 3 semesters (sophomores). All candidates who meet this minimum scholastic requirement are eligible for membership consideration and will receive a letter stating their eligibility. Students enrolled in remedial or compensatory education courses are not eligible. Membership shall then be considered based upon the service, leadership, and character of the candidate.

Service. All candidates are required to submit a correctly completed activity sheet. Activities should include proof of school, church, and community involvement. Paid employment is not considered a service activity. All activities must be verified by the adviser/employer concerned. The final activity sheet submitted will be used by the faculty council to assist them in membership selection. Failure to submit an activity sheet will automatically drop the candidate from further consideration. The committee will look for a minimum of 25 activity points.

Leadership and Character. A list of candidates meeting the minimum academic requirements shall be submitted to selected faculty members. The faculty shall then rate the students on a scale of one (1) POOR to four (4) EXCELLENT in each of these two areas. The faculty rating will be used to assist the faculty council in making its final selection.

Final Determination of Membership. Along with the candidate's scholastic average, an average of the three ratings for service, leadership, and character are considered for final determination of membership which will be made by majority vote of the faculty council.

Senior Selection. Members of the senior class who have obtained a 3.5 or higher cumulative average at the end of 6 semesters, will receive eligibility letters and be selected through the same process as junior candidates.

Outstanding Student Honored

This years Honorary Bausch&Lomb Science Award winner is Spring Lake resident, Daniel Pearce.

The Bausch&Lomb Science Award is presented each year to a twelfth grader, who has shown outstanding achievement, good character, and superior intellectual promise in the study of science.

The Bausch&Lomb Science Award is very prestigious and its reward is two-fold. The recipient is presented a bronze medallion at graduation; he or she is also eligible to compete for a four-year scholarship to the University of Rochester in New York.

Award winner, Daniel Pearces' present courses here at MHS are European History, (which is his favorite) English IV, Electronics, Physics, Calculus, and Architecturial Drafting. He plans to major in Electrical Engineering at college.

Pearce has been accepted to Rutgers and Tulane University. Tulane is where he is presently bound for if he's not contacted by Duke first. He's not really considering University of Rochester. He says, "It's too cold!"

Pearces' favorite hobbies include swimming and skiing and he was a member of the MHS Cross Country team. When asked how it felt to be awarded the Bausch&Lomb Science Award, Pearce said, "I had no idea I was going to get it! It feels good!"

"The special significance of this award is that it recognizes the senior student at our high school who has attained the highest scholastic standing in science," commented Principal Jeffrey Osborn.

A certain set of criteria is used for awarding this honor.

- 1. A search of the student's academic record in science courses and the grades earned.
- 2. Consultation with the guidance counselors and determined class rank.
- 3. Nomination by members of Science Staff who offer professional judgments regarding the quality of work done by the student and the level of

performance in science courses.

4. Discussion among the mambers of the science department, followed by a poll. Each member of the faculty is asked to vote "yes", "no", or "abstain". The student with the most "yes" votes is the award winner.

Pearce was presented a certificate at the February 11TH Board of Education meeting and his picture appeared in the area paper, "The Coast Star".

The careful selecting of this award was supervised by Math&Science department head,Dr. Charles D. Hayne in coordination with the Science faculty.

After graduation Cindy wishes to attend Boston College, Fairfield University, or William and Mary where she plans to major in Business/Marketing with a minor in Fine Art.


"To be successful and happy in whatever I decide to do," is Cindy's major goal in life. Her advice to others is, "Give everything you have to whatever you undertake."

Missing Children: An Epidemic

Have you ever been homesick? Have you ever wanted to just go home and be back in your own bed and warm house? All of us have most likely experienced this, but what about the 1.8 million children who are missing each year? How do they feel?

Although 90% of those missing run away and return home within a few days, 100,000 are abducted in custody disputes and 20,000 to 50,000 are snatched by strangers and are never to be seen again. Roughly 10% of these youngsters are sexually abused. Even children 5 or 6 years old are being used and sold in pornography dealing.

Many stolen children never see their parents again. In a custody dispute or when a divorced parent "steals"the child, he is returned home only 10% of the time.

When a child is Kidnapped by a stranger, 80% of the children are murdered within two days of their obduction. Missing children are usually under 12 but often are up to 17 years old, especially when strangers kidnap them.

In the state of New Jersev alone, 500 people are reported missing each month. Out of this number, 72% of those people are juveniles. That is 360 people out of 500 are under 18.

Victims of kidnappings or disappearance for an unknown reasons are not from specific areas, race or class. They range from the wealthy to the poor to anyone in between.

Carnivals, fairs, shopping malls and grocery stores, run the risk of losing your child in a crowd. With so many people pushing and shoving, a young persons hand can easily be detached from yours. There is nothing more frightening for a child to lose his parents or guardian in a mass of stranger.

Of the cases reported, people claimed their children were abducted walking to or from school, in neighborhood playgrounds, in their own backyards and even in the delivery room of a hospital.

In 1980, the Parental Kidnapping Prevention Act was passed. It authorizes the Federal Parent Locator Service to locate children in connection with civil and criminal cases.

Another Law in progress is the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act which entitles parents— whether they have custody of their child or not — to have access to school records. If a school refuses the state and Federal Covernment can cut off all aid to the institution.

If a child is returned or finds his way home the trauma can lead to family tension and psychological problems for the child. Parents become very overprotective which could cause conflict and pain. But more important there is the child, who is literarly scared for life. This trauma could take years to get over. The child no doubtly experiences nightmares and finds it difficult to get along with his peers.

Culprits of this horrifying crime have been child care workers, teachers, police officers, and social service workers. There is no way one can be at their child's side 24 hours a day, unless their an infant, but maybe these precautions may help one become more aware.

- * Never leave a small child alone in a grocery cart or in the car-even for a minute.
- *Be sure your child's day-care center or school will not release the child to anyone but you or someone you designate.
- * Warn your children never to go anywhere with anyone- even with a friend- without your permission.
- * Tell children to call out and run away from any stranger who bothers them * Warn your children not to let anyone know when they are home alone.
- * Teach your children his full name, address, and phone number. Show them h how to make a long distance or collect call.
- * Know your child's blood type and have on file a set of the child's finger prints, current pictures, dental records and hair sample.

Students Visit Nuclear Plant

Thirty Manasquan High School students under the direction of Chemistry teacher Robert Lempa and Enviornmental studies teacher Richard M. Trimble had the unique opportunity to tour the Three Mile Island Nuclear Power Plant facility in Middletown, Pa. on Tuesday, March 5. Three Mile Island was the site of the most serious accident ever to occur at a commercial nuclear power plant in the U.S. and the consequences of that accident are still being seen in the jeopardized future of the nuclear power industry today.

The students were taken to the Visitors' Center, logged in, given hard hats and goggles, and then listened to speakers and a film discuss the functions of the plant and the nature of the accident that crippled TMI-2's reactor in March of 1979.

The students were then given an elaborate security clearance and taken to the island itself for a remarkable tour of the plant and grounds. Students were allowed inside the TMI-2's Central Room, Generator Room, and were able to view on the television monitors the ongoing process involved in the \$1 billion cleanup of the plant.

The students were enthusiastic to not only have learned much about the nuclear power industry, but also to have seen directly the site of such an historic event. The tour guides were candid and open in response to several poignant questions about the accident, the cleanup, and what is being done today.






Bottom: Flyweight Joe Ippolito successfully sets the new squat record at

275 lbs.


Top left: Junior Turk Fickling hoists 325 lbs. to get the board in the


