Seniors Travis Gassner and Bryson McTighe claimed the two seed, and seniors Kent Ochse and Pat Swift grabbed the third.


Surprisingly, former ``King of Ping" Alex Otchy, and his partnerSteve Schatzman made a very early exit in tournament play.

SOAR Launches Jewelry Project




students through Medieval, renaissance, and Elizabethan eras, all the way up to present.


When Shelly Berry was finished talking about the history of jewelry she gave a lesson on bending wires

to make earrings. All of the students made their own bracelet and pair of earrings.


The Jewelry SOAR Project was huge success and a lot of fun!

Fugitive Frosh



OSU Set to Face Off Against the Gators

Coming into the weekend of Dec. 2, the BCS Championship game looked set as Ohio State vs. USC. All USC had to do was beat cross-town rival, the UCLA Bruins. However, they couldn't get past the pesky Bruins, and the debate as to who should play Ohio State began.

That debate however finished the next day when the new BCS rankings came out. This time the national championship nod went to the Gators of Florida, instead of the Michigan Wolverines. In the past three weeks, there have been three #2 teams, but now there is only one.


On January in Glendale, Arizona, the Buckeyes will take on the Gators to determine year's national championship. The match-up features two of the best offenses in the nation, and two experienced and battle-tested quarterbacks.

The Buckeyes head into the national championship with a perfect 12-0 record and the #1 ranking in the country. Heisman front-runner QB Troy Smith leads this talented cast. Smith has had a huge year through the air with many good wide-receivers including Ted Ginn and Anthony Gonzalez. OSU also has a solid running game with Antonio Pittman, who rushed for over 1100 yards this season. defense is lead by sophomore

line-backer James Laurinaitis.

The Gators are also a very strong team, having lost only 1 game with the toughest schedule in America. the big victory in the SEC championship game. Gators looked poised to give the Buckeyes a run for their money. QB Chris Leak has had a solid year, passing for 22 TD's. Freshman QB Tim Tebow also provides a spark when he comes into the game for Leak. Tebow has over 400 yards rushing and 11 total TD. Percy Harvin is another freshman sparkplug for the Gator offense. Harvin has 406 yards on the ground and 367 receiving yards. The Gators, like always, have a verytalented and deep defense.

Even though there is a lot of time between now and the game, when the time comes to play this game, it will be worth the wait.
