



Country Wide E. Coli Breakout Linked to California Spinach

Who would have thought that the spinach greens that are so good for your health could cause abdominal cramps, diarrhea, fever and, in rare cases, fatal kidney failure? Well when it is infected with the stomach acid-loving bacterium of E. coli O157: H7, over 100 people will experience these symptoms. On September 18th, the Food and Drug Administration announced that a second company in California has been implicated in the E. coli outbreak linked to spinach. The number of identified victims is still rising.

This new identified company, River Ranch Fresh Foods, received salad that included spinach from the first infected company, Natural Selection Foods of San Juan Bautista. The spinach that passed through the River Ranch was sold under brand names such as, Farmers Market, Hy-Vee, and Fresh and Easy.

State and local health officials received reports of illness and asked people what they ate to search for the source. To identify the new company, officials examined Natural Selection's records and found it had supplied River Ranch.

Tracing a case of illness to its source, including the time required for DNA analysis of the E. coli, takes about two weeks, Dr. David W. K. Acheson, director of food safety at the F.D.A., said Sunday in a conference call. Dr. Acheson called the process "trace-back and trace-forward."

The investigation is in its early stages. "At this point we have not found E. coli O157 in any bags of spinach



that have been tested," Dr. Acheson said. "Our link back to Natural Selection comes from the epidemiological studies." But after questioning the victims about what they had eaten, he said, "bagged spinach has risen to the top of the list."


The federal health authorities are advising consumers not to eat fresh spinach. They said frozen spinach had not been implicated.

The number of reported cases of E. coli infection rose by seven on Sunday, to 109, but officials said that the real number was probably higher and that reporting was probably delayed because some health departments were not staffed on weekends. They also said they expected the number of states in which cases had been reported, 19 on Sunday, to rise.

So far, 16 cases of hemolytic uremic syndrome, a serious kidney complication from E. coli exposure, have been reported in 20 states. One death, in Wisconsin, has been linked to the outbreak.

The cause of the outbreak is still not clear. It could be irrigation water, Dr. Acheson said, or it could be a processing problem in a factory. In the humid environment of a sealed bag of spinach or salad mix, E. coli can multiply rapidly if the bag is allowed to get too warm, he said.

Some processors expose spinach to chlorine to kill E. coli, which can kill the bacteria on the leaf surface. But if the bacteria are in irrigation water they can enter the plant, and the chlorine will not reach them, Dr. Acheson said.



E. coli infected spinach caused a mass recall from grocery store shelves and sickened almost 200 people.

New Homeroom Or a Longer Second Block?

When Manasquan High School students were sent their postcards this summer telling them where to report to homeroom, they were undoubtedly puzzled. Instead of the room number, they said a class such as Calculus-212.

The reason for all of this confusion is the newly instated homeroom policy. Developed to cut down the overwhelming amount of

tardiness, this new policy has students reporting directly to their first block class each morning. Usual homeroom activities such as taking attendance and the morning announcements are conducted at the beginning of second block instead.

Also, the unexcused absence policy has become much stricter this year. Instead of the old policy of one whole day absent without a note equals an unexcused absence, students will receive unexcused absences if they are less than ten minutes late to a class three times, or more than ten minutes late to a class once. Also, classes will count individually for credit. For example, if you skip fifth block more than eight times, instead of receiving only detentions, you will lose credit for that class.

New "Survivor" Format Causes Major Controversy

The anticipated thirteenth season of Survivor premiered on Thursday, September, 14th. In previous seasons, creator Mark Burnett divided groups on the island based on age or gender, although this season he made a drastic change, dividing the groups by ethnicity. Is this a publicity stunt or a valid sociological experiment?



Although often referred to

as a 'melting pot', American society is really a mosaic of cultures. Despite our count less strides to end prejudice, ignorance still existstoday. Mark Burnett's decision to divide the teams on Survivor by ethnicity instigates a societal conundrum: are we all racist?

The New York City Black, Latino and Asian Caucus had been so disturbed by this segregation that they went as far to demand the withdrawal of the season altogether. However, is this outrage really necessary? From the beginning, the purpose of Survivor has been very clear. The show is meant to be a sociological experiment depicting how real people react and survive in a desolate environment. Now, Burnett has thrown us a curve ball. Mark Burnett states that he "thought [the] racial element of the show could bring out the best in the competitors."

I sincerely agree with Burnett's idea. Think about it—we are a society that has a vast history of prejudice and discrimination. Even today, in 2006, we still experience racism. These prejudices may not have been as obvious as in previous years,




but the impact is still evident. By segregating teams into ethnic groups, Burnett is enabling players to feel a strong sense of unity within their team, while still allowing viewers to understand that prejudice is an inescapable American characteristic.


of the secret became too much, Hassan and his father moved away from Amir and his home, devastating both families.

yards rushing on 15 attempts and 11 yards passing on 12 attempts in the first half. "The defense played well the whole game," said Coach Kubu to The Coast Star. "We gave them one first down by going offsides twice. We rushed well and we did a good job up front. We handled them and got to the ball well."

Now four weeks into the season, Manasquan faced its first "worthy" opponent in St. John Vianney. The Lancers boasted the "best defensive secondary" in the shore according to the Asbury Park Press. However, that was the last thing on the Warriors mind as they rolled to their fourth victory, winning 44-9.

The team had a slow start, allowing St. John Vianney to kick a field goal after a "big circus play" that woke up the defense. It was the first time Manasquan had trailed all season in a game, but that did not last very long. The Warrior defense began to work its magic, which quickly resulted in a ten yard interception return for a touchdown by junior linebacker Steve Kircher. Senior Martin Marshall's devastating tackle was the cause of the interception and the cause of Vianney quarterbackAnthonyZambito's early exit from the game.

From then on it was smooth sailing for the football team. Mike Mele led the offense again with 16 carries for 109 yards and

three touchdowns. R.J. Read and Chaz Coursey also each added a single touchdown. Other standout plays included, Kelly Mahon's spectacular, juggling, one-handed catch for a 42-yard gain and a safety by the Warrior defense.

Next, Manasquan faced formerly undefeated Rumson Fair-Haven Bulldogs. Warriors came out victorious once again, shutting out the Bulldogs 33-0. After the game Rumson coach Shane Fallon commented on Manasquan, telling the Star Ledger, "They're the best high school team I've ever seen. They force you to make mistakes and they don't give you much, and the rare times that they do make a mistake, you have to capitalize on it."

Manasquan once again relied on its running game and "lock-down" defense to stay perfect this season. Both Mike Mele and Chaz Coursey each ran for over one hundred yards and two touchdowns. Quarterback R.J. Read also had a 33-yard touchdown pass to Evan Ragan.

Two other Squan touchdowns, including a78-yard run by Mele and a touchdown reception by Brad Newman, were called back due to holding penalties. "I don't think we played that bad, I just think we played sloppy," Brad Newman told the Star Ledger. "We didn't play as well as we wanted to, but our defense picked it up and kept them off the board."

Newman's two sacks helped the Warriors hold Rumson to just 51 yards of total offense and -3 on the ground. Rumson failed to earn a first down on five possessions in the first half and only managed to get one in the second half. "We feel like our defensive line can dominate and take over games and I think we really did that in the second half," Newman added. "I think we should stop the run every single game."

With a perfect record of 5-0, the Warriors now enter

their toughest part of the season. Their next two games will be against the defending South Group II champions Point Pleasant Boro away on October 13 and a repeat of last season's Central Jersey Group II State title game against Raritan Rockets on October 21. The last remaining regular season games after Raritan are against Shore Regional and Thanksgiving day rival Wall, both are at home.


The fans were gathering before the game as we lined up to fill our section in the bleachers. We watched Barnegat perform its pregame show, and then the
