



White Sox

Marlins




game. Thanks to Sarah Mahon's goal in the last five seconds, the team came off the field victorious!

As far as improving any weaknesses, Aquilante advised "If we keep up the hard work, we'll do fine!"



Above: Fordham University's Administration Building. Below: The Washington Square Arc set right next to NYU



Book Review: The Road

On a road, you can learn about yourself. Not by which road you take, but how you well take it: the way you overcome obstacles - - or don't - - determines who you really

Unfortunately, the road they take in The Road is a bit tougher. For one thing, it's the apocalypse. Woo hoo! The end of the world! It's like Armageddon, except there was no Bruce Willis to save us. So what to do now?

Well for a father and son, they walk. The unnamed main characters spend most of

the novel traversing a desolate highway, through snowstorms and cold forests, past enemy figures carrying guns, and by unspeakable horrors that would scar even a grown man. They're walking until they reach the Atlantic ocean.

And that's it. This Pulitzer-prize winner is as straightforward as they come: father and son walk towards the ocean. There's no ring to destroy or woman to save, empire to defeat or specific fear to overcome. They're going simply because there's nowhere else to go and, in such apocalyptic times, you need a goal to keep you occupied... especially when you're traveling with a little boy.

Without a big payoff or intricate plot, what's so great about The Road? In the way of climaxes.

there are lots of exciting scenes. Our heroes have to evade roaming bands of murderers, run

away from na-

ked cannibals, cross blocked suspension bridges, and fight the constant battles of hunger, will, and weather. Also, the father does carry a gun, and he

certainly uses it.

The second strength of The Road is imagery. Scenes are brought to choking, breathing life by McCarthy's powerful descriptions. He uses long passages of poetic prose to place you right there next to the characters: "The soft black talc blew through the streets like squid ink uncoiling along a sea floor and the cold crept down and the dark A came early and the scavengers passing down the steep canyons with their torches trod silky holes in the drifted ash that closed behind them silently as eyes."

But as with any Mc-Carthy novel, this is not one to read idly - you need to give


> your full attention to eniov it. Reading it in school, at work, or anywhere that doesn't

ginning to end, The Road compels the reader absolutely and creeps slowly up to your emotions and takes hold of them. Some of these scenes just about open your chest and pull on your heartstrings manually. And the ending comes not with a bang, but a sad elegance.

You will love this book if you give it a chance, and by giving it a chance, you give its main characters a chance to survive. Yeah, you can always just see the movie, starring Viggo Mortenson and coming out in late 2008, but the book has something a movie can never have: Cormac Mc-Carthy's beautiful, masterful prose.

start MvThe of Blueberry Nights mirrors the sweetness of the film's title. As the credits, done up in white and purple lettering, appear on the screen, the camera gets uncomfortably close to a piece of pie as we watch vanilla ice cream melt off the top and run slowly down the pie onto the plate below. The sweetness of the pie in the opening shot doesn't particularly radiate through the rest of the movie, but the underlying whimsical and soothing feelings certainly do.

Like Wong Kar-Wai's Chungking previous film Express, My Blueberry Nights is an interesting take on the

modern-day love story. Kar-Wai himself refers to his movie as the tale of "a woman who took the long road instead of the short road to meet up with the man she loves", which sums up the movie quite nicely. The story is a simple one: a twenty-something woman named Elizabeth (singer Norah Jones, in her first film role) who has been recently dumped by her boyfriend decides to take a soul-searching journey of sorts around the United States to hopefully discover herself (and possibly love) along the way. In her travels she comes across a bevy of interesting folks including a couple whose marriage is on the rocks (David Strathairn and Rachel Weisz), a compulsive gambler (Natalie Portman), and a melancholy café owner (Jude Law).

The story sounds thin in writing, and it certainly is in actuality as well. However, as with most other Wong Kar-Wai movies, the story is simply the base for the astounding visuals to work off of. Wong Kar-Wai did not work with the masterful Christopher Doyle this time around, but the cinematography still nothing short of Slow panning breathtaking. shots along with occasional blurriness and generally casual cinematography makes the film seems very calm, cool, and hip. It also makes the film move at a

glacial pace, which fortunately is never a problem as the story (if you will) is consistently interesting and the visuals are unrelentingly sumptuous.

Unfortunately, I cannot say the same for some of the performances. Many critics, including myself, feel the idea of "singer turned film actress" is a disaster Carey's cinematic (Mariah train wreck Glitter comes to mind), and Norah Jones's performance certainly did not give me any hope that this trend may produce something worthwhile. Throughout the movie she lacked emotion and proper delivery and was a real evesore when on the screen next to actors and actresses such as Jude Law and Natalie Portman. Hopefully, if given another stab at acting, she'll be able to redeem herself. Jude Law, Natalie Portman, and the other supporting actors and actresses definitely outshone Norah Jones, but were not particularly remarkable either. All of their performances were serviceable, but none of them stood out or wowed me to any degree whatsoever.

Nevertheless, My Blueberry Nights blew me away. For a film with minimal plot that relies almost entirely visuals to keep audience entertained, it was a damn good piece of cinema. I'm convinced that it's that unexplainable Wong Kar-Wai vibe that resonates throughout all of his films. I'm not someone who particularly takes to films that rely heavily on visuals, bu this vibe continues to draw me back to more and more Won Kar-Wai films, and this film i no exception.

So, overall I guess the



Students Can Make A Difference

Everyone has the potential to make a difference.

Over the last year, an AP government and politics class at Nutley High School received a project to propose their own public policy. The public policy they chose was a teen antismoking measure in which smoking was to be banned in all public places.

Who knew that this class project might become an actual New Jersey law?



Over the last few years, teen smoking has become a problem. According to the state Department of Health and Senior Services, approximately one third of New Jersey's high school students are smokers and about 90% of smokers begin before they turn eighteen. An even scarier statistic is that more than 947 million packs of cigarettes are consumed by approximately 3 million children under the age of 18 in a year.

"Smoking is the single most preventable cause of death and disease," stated Herb Conaway, M.D. "Without preventative action, more teens will eventually die from smoking than will die from AIDS, automobile accidents, drug use, homicide, and suicide combined."

And while preventative measures have been taken, making it illegal for anyone under 19 to buy tobacco, there was no law prohibiting the possession of it. A ten year old could be walking down the street smoking a cigarette, and no one had the authority to do anything.

That was, at least, until recently.

Earlier this year, AP high school class at Nutley High School, met with Assemblyman Scalera, who challenged them to propose their own public policy. The idea they proposed was an anti-smoking measure for teens.

Scalera brought the proposal in front of the New Jersey assembly and with the AP class present, the bill passed 53 to 20. Now the bill faces the senate. If New Jersey makes this bill a law, they will become the twentieth state to prohibit minors



At the end of each workout, Sergeant Knight called the gym classes into the middle, and discussed the importance of exercising and following your dreams.




She states the her deceased uncle serves as an inspiration, who was also talented in art and she strives to make her family proud.



Squan Students Go On Mission of Mercy

Over Spring break, most students relaxed, spent time with friends or went on vacation. Two Manasquan students, however, something extraordinary. Senior Jordan Owens and Thompson Megan junior traveled to Honduras with the medical brigade of the House of Friendship, an organization that aids disadvantaged children living in Honduras.

The girls flew out of America in the early hours of the morning. For the next ten days, they worked to help set up clinics in four different rural villages that attracted thousands of people who have no other access to healthcare.

In each village they ran three different clinics- pediatric, general medicine and dentistry. The girls assisted the doctors, dentists and other medical professionals who volunteered their time and services over the Easter break.

Both girls said the experience was very rewarding. Megan has been going since her freshman year, and is the third sister in her family to go. Her eldest sister heard about the program through her pediatrician, Dr. Cahill, who has been going to Honduras with the group for 18 years. This was Jordan's second year going to Honduras, and she also heard about the program though someone who had been recruited by Dr. Cahill.

Before going, Megan solicited dentists, elementary schools, pharmaceutical companies and parishioners from St. Mark's church for supplies for the brigade. She received normal articles like toothbrushes, toothpaste, vitamins and medicated cream that are so rare in Honduras. One pharmaceutical company even sent a tractor trailer full of supplies to Megan's home.


Megan wrote a letter for the company asking for donations, and they replied with a phone call when Megan wasn't home. Her mother talked to the company, and then one day they pulled up to the house with dozens of boxes of supplies. Everything the members collected was sent over to Honduras beforehand in a container ship. Megan said she was very appreciative of "the outpouring of generosity."

Jordan saved all the toys she could from McDonald's happy meals, with help from younger children. She brought themforthechildrenin Honduras, many of which didn't have any toys. They loved the small gifts which American children often lose/discard within the hour of eating the meal.

Jordan said the most rewarding part was talking to the little kids. She also had a wonderful experience with an older woman who came into the clinic. Jordan was assisting a doctor when a woman came in, one of the last patients of the day. She was all by herself, and was 100 years old according to her card. She needed help for her feet, which were hurting her. Jordan says they were caked with dirt, and had severe blisters from old shoes and constant walking. Jordan attempted to wash the woman's feet and gave her a new pair of socks. She looked up when she heard a noise, and realized tears were running down her face. She told Jordan that no one had ever shown her such kindness before. "Soon, we were all crying," said Jordan.

Jordan said the woman was a rarity because there are very few elderly people in Honduras. Because of the poor standard of living, lack of food, shelter, and healthcare, people









MHS Gay-Straight Alliance Demonstrates the Power of Silence


Many people say that actions speak louder than words, but can you say the

Junior Jack Masterson Awarded Dr. Norman J. Field Award




Are you ready to be a super hero? If you say yes, then all you have to do is sign up! No, you won't be given the ability to fly, have x-ray vision,



or pick up a bus. If you want to be a true hero, you can donate blood at Manasquan High School's annual blood drive!

On Tuesday May 20th, from 8am to 2pm, the Central Jersey Blood Center will be sending phlebotomists (nurses who specialize in drawing blood) to the MHS gym. Anyone who is at least seventeen

120 and is pounds eligible to give. Plus in a recent change of policy, students with tattoos and piercings that were done by licensed New Jersey are also qualified.



"Our goal this year is to get more blood than the year before, which was about one hundred and fifty one pints with one hundred and forty six participants," added Mrs. McCoy. Last year the blood drive was shut down because of insufficient stuff, but this year the Central Jersey Blood Center has made it a point to assure the nurse that enough staff will be sent.

The school with the most blood will win Great Adventure passes for the entire junior and senior classes! Plus, one student will win \$5,000 in scholarships.

Amusement park passes and money are not the only reasons to give. According to Mrs. McCoy, the school

nurse, "It is important to donate because one pint of blood saves three lives and there is an extreme shortage in hospitals, especially with rare types." The

donations will end up in local hospitals and will be used up so fast that by the end of Memorial Day weekend, it will all be gone. As Mrs. McCoy says: "To begin a lifetime of giving blood is such a gift to others."

It's also a great way to find out if anything is wrong with your body because

so, your blood will not be accepted and you will be notified confidentially.

If you like to give blood, Mrs. McCoy advises you to "remember to begin preparation twenty four hours before

It's safe to say that few would notice the biased information, and those that did would probably look the other way. They'd be too timid or too afraid to speak out against an acclaimed and well researched book.


But not seventeen year old senior Matthew LaClair.




