





Have you ever wondered what it would be like moving to a new country, a new school, a new house and living a new life? Leaving her family back home, Juliette Blondeau knows what it's like to live somewhere completely new and different from her home life.

Juliette lived in Rouen, France, an old town near Paris that holds a very traditional neighborhood. "It's beautiful and it's very well known for its Old Catholic churches," Juliette said. She used to attend boarding school but instead of four years of high school, she only attended three years. After her time in boarding school, she had a chance to do something she had always wanted to do - learn about American culture. But she did not want to learn like a tourist, she wanted to experience the culture and live like an American. She took a chance and decided to be an exchange student. So why did she choose Manasquan? "I really wanted to act; this high school seemed really good for that," Juliette said.

Unlike us, Juliette couldn't choose her own classes during high school. Everything was strictly academic; she took sci-

ence, literature and economical classes. Her school days were very different from ours also. What we call a typical school day is 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. but to Juliette, that day is very short. A typical school day in Juliette's old school was from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. almost four hours longer! With the extra time on her hands, Juliette has taken advantage of joining many school activities. She played in the Powder-Puff football game during Spirit Week, and has joined Drama Club, GSA, TV Production, Photography Club, Film Club and Art Club. She also plans to try out for the softball team in the spring, and is a member of the Yearbook class. "Juliette is very eager to learn about things and she is very involved. She's a great photographer and the yearbook staff is really glad to have her in the room," Miss Congilose, English teacher and advisor of the yearbook said. Becoming a part of all these clubs and activities has helped her to experience American culture as she always wanted to do.

But these are not the biggest differences between Juliette's school in France and MHS. Juliette tells us, "I think the biggest and main difference that I've noticed here is that you people eat really fast! Back at home, we had an hour and thirty minutes just for lunch. It's a really big deal to eat well and here it's like just eat a sandwich and you'll be fine. We could also leave during lunch, go to a nice restaurant with friends during school and come back to study some more. Here it's so strict, you can't even leave!"


In France, you're free to do whatever it is you want as long as you kept up with your studies. We hate when we have a substitute teacher, because we're just left work to do without the actual teacher there. For Juliet and her classmates back home, when a teacher was absent, it's much different. "If a teacher was missing, we didn't have to go to class or we would just leave. It wasn't a big deal; if the teacher wasn't there then we wouldn't be either."

Much like we are forced to speak Spanish in Spanish class, when Juliette's English classes met, it was mandatory to speak English. At first, it was very hard for Juliette to speak English but over time she got the hang of it. "It is more difficult to speak it (English) because people talk really fast and so I get a bit confused as to what you're saying."

Even before she moved here, it was important for Juliette to learn to speak English. Her family loves to travel and wherever they travel to, people generally speak English. Eventually she hopes to be bilingual.

Although the protesters may not be going about it the best way, their intentions are actually understandable. The facts of how quick the wealthy are becoming wealthier are really staggering.


According to the CBO, between 1979 and 2007 the incomes of the top 1% of Americans grew by an average of 275%. During the same time period, the 60% of Americans in the middle of the income scale saw their income rise by 40%. Imagine the average household income being \$36,000 per year. Being in the top 1% of wealthiest Americans would make an income \$108,000 a year. The middle class would be \$50,400 yearly. Pretty big difference, right?

Since 1979 the average income for the least wealthy 90% ofAmerican households has decreased by \$900. However, the top 1% increased by over \$700,000. This is because the government allowed the wealthier people to pay closer to what the average people had to pay in taxes.


In 2007 the richest 1% of the American population owned 34.6% of the country's total wealth, and the next 19% owned 50.5%. Thus, the top 20% of Americans owned 85% of the country's wealth and the bottom 80% of the population


owned 15%.

Maybe if the protesters found a calmer raise way to awareness about these numbers, more people would listen and people more would be supportive. However, more people suspicious than supportive. It is extremely important that people become aware of how real these numbers are.


free moment.




