

Manasquan High School finds itself on a very exclusive list. The school is one of 539 from the United States and Canada to be honored by the College Board on its 3rd Annual AP District Honor Roll.

Athletics

To earn this honor Manasquan not only had to increase its access to Advance Placement courses, but also the amount of students that earned scores of 3 on the AP Exam had to increase. This can be described as an "ideal situation" for a school's AP program.

Manasquan shares this distinction with 5% of districts across the nation. More specifically Manasquan is one of thirty-four districts in New Jersey to get this

honor and one of three schools in Monmouth County.

lt seems each vear Manasquan's AP scores improve. Since 2007 the number of students getting 4's and 5's on the test increased from 28% to 55%. Manasquan has also seen an increase of 74.5% in the number of students taking tests.

Jason Bryant, teacher of the AP World History and AP US History courses here at Manasquan High School, feels that the AP testing

results validate the school - the work that all of the teachers do, not only the work of the AP teachers but also the teachers that prepare students to take AP classes, and the students who work very hard. "It is very reflective of the talented teachers and students across the board," says Mr. Bryant upon discussing the unbelievable results of the AP tests at Manasquan High

Back in October Manasquan High School Seawant chapter of Rho Kappa Honor Society held their first induction at the Manasquan Women's Club. These new members applied for the Honors Society last June under the encouragement of Mr. Fagen and Mr. Bryant. The two history teachers are involved with the MHS History Club, which they now expanded into a National Honors Society. There are now 51 active MHS members of this national organization, dedicating their time and over-achievement to the community.

"I wanted to make the existing history club part of a nationally recognized organization. These kids work so hard, especially over the years, and notability is what they deserve," said Mr. Fagen, when asked about his great enthusiasm

and dedication toward bettering the organization.

Principal Coppola is very proud to have a program where students' achievements are brought to light. When asked about the organization, Mr. Coppola replied, "The History National Honor Society is another opportunity for us to recognize academic excellence. Mr. Fagen's vision will allow many students to be celebrated for their academic success in this area."

For those who are unaware of what this organization is all about, Rho Kappa Honor society was created by the National Council for the Social Studies and is a recognition program for high school students in grades 11-12. The Rho Kappa National Advisory Committee establishes the national standards for all Rho Kappa chapters across the country. Local Chapters create their own bylaws that must be consistent with and comply with the Rho Kappa national constitution. Membership in Rho Kappa is an honor based upon a student's accomplishments in the field of social studies and overall academic achievement.

The local chapter for Manasquan was named "Seawant." This is a Dutch word meaning Wampum. Wampum is a shell that served as money for Native Americans. This named was used as a way to acknowledge Manasquan's' origin involving the Dutch

The application process requires candidates to show participation in activities that demonstrate civic engagement in the school or community and their desire and aspiration to be a member of the organization. Also, all applicants must have a letter of recommendation from a current faculty member.

Everything from years of hard work to the cut and dried eligibility to even qualify for the organization, as well as tenaciously giving back to the community, are necessary to be a member of this impressive organization. Surviving Sandy

Looking back to the days before Sandy struck her wrath against the Jersey Shore, many can recall claiming "Hurricane Sandy is not going to be that bad." Seeing the damage now, anyone living within the sending districts would take back what they had said in a heartbeat. With boardwalks torn into ruins, houses condemned and lives lost, to say that Hurricane Sandy was a disaster would be an understatement. Senior Zach Campbell of Belmar and his family did not see Sandy as a threat. Though living only blocks away from the beach and knowing that the hurricane would make landfall close to his home. Campbell's believed that the consequences of Sandy were not going to be worth evacuating their home. Because Zach's brother is a local police officer and his father is head of the department for public works, he and his mother agreed that if trouble arose, reaching safety would not be a difficult feat; little did they know, however, the damages soon to come. When asked about his experience with the storm, Zach explained that it only took around twenty minutes for the ocean water that had submerged the streets to rise, along with his family's panic. The water quickly came rushing into the Campbell's home, and proved to be unstoppable after several attempts by Zach's family to blockade the doors. It was then that Zach and

his mother knew they needed to call for help.

Their first attempt at a rescue was by Zach's father, who tried to reach their flooded house by driving a large truck; however, the water in the streets was several feet high, rendering the truck useless against the tide. The second attempt at rescue, though risky, was ultimately successful. Zach and his mother were rescued at separate times by first-aid responders, in which they were forced to ride a body board attached to a jet ski through the dan gerous streets of Belmar to safety. Though Zach and his family in the end were safe, their home and belongings fell victim to Sandy's wrath. The Campbell family lost two cars, and the water that had completely submerged their basement destroying their washer, dryer, freezer and refrigerator.

Though replacing these items will cost a lot of money to replace, the most valuable items that were lost were their memories. The Campbell family's collection of home videos and photographs once kept in the basement is now destroyed.

Zach sets an example for the rest of the community as despite all of his loss, Zach, along with many members of the Manasquan High School football team who have been victimized by Sandy, volunteered their time to the community torn into ruins.

Sandy was not only the largest Atlantic hurricane on record, but it was also the second-costliest as well. When asked about damage costs, New Jersey Governor Chris Christie responded by saying "The devastation on the Jersey Shore is some of the worst we've ever seen. The cost of the storm is incalculable at this point."

The super storm is estimated to have caused damage of at least \$20 billion, and with the interruption of businesses, there is expected to be an extra \$50 billion in losses. The storm was also blamed for more than 7 million outages across the Northeast.

More than 13,000 flights were canceled across the U.S. on October 29, and more than 3,500 were called off October 30. From October 27 through early November 1, airlines canceled a total of 19,729 flights.

The New York Stock Exchange and Nasdaq reopened on October 31 after a two-day closure for storm. The last time the NYSE closed for weather-related reasons was 1888.

Two weeks after Hurricane Sandy, many people remained without power, and utility companies were struggling to return to normalcy. But that is the least of concern for many who were devastated by Sandy. If their home wasn't condemned by the dangerous flood waters, chances are the ocean water mixed with sewage has caused uninhabitable living conditions. This has caused a high demand for rental houses, which is resulting in a serious shortage of these available homes.

More than 1,500 FEMA personnel are along the East Coast working to support disaster preparedness and response operations, including search and rescue, situational awareness, communications and logistical support.

In addition, 28 teams containing 294 FEMA Corps members are pre-staged to support Sandy responders. The American Red Cross announced they have 4,000 disaster workers across storm damaged areas.


"We expect action and leadership on immigration reform in 2013" said Eliseo Medina, international secretary-treasurer of the Service Employees International Union (originally reported by the New York Times).

This election also saw huge amounts of money spent on the behalf's of both candidates. In total about 1.8 billion dollars was raised by both candidates to support their cause, some of the highest amounts that have ever been seen in a presidential election. One of the reasons why so much money was able to be raised was because this was the first year there was no limit mandated on the amount of money raised by Super PAC's, or private business that donate money to candidates. Super PAC's alone raised

around 200 million dollars or around nine percent of the total money rose by the candidates.

So with all the election hoopla over with, what are we going to have to watch? Luckily for those who enjoy watching political drama unfold the Fiscal Cliff is approaching rapidly. If a deal is not cut between Congress and the President by January first of next year automatic budget cuts will be implemented, skyrocketing taxes and damaging the overall economic growth of the nation.





Returning for their fourth year is head coach Matt Voskian and assistant coach James Wladich. Both of whom grew up wrestling together. Coach Voskian is a former graduate of Manasquan who was an outstanding football player and wrestler. During his career he won over 50 matches, placing 5th his senior year out of the whole shore conference, which consists of 44 teams. 
