



Senior Emma Stark was just one of the many students in attendance. "Everyone had a fabulous time! It was a ton of fun with everyone who came out."


"It was an amazing turnout," raved Mr. Fagen, the faculty adviser of the History Club. "I was blown away by all of the stellar outfits!"

Special Ed Teacher Ms. Kackos Elected to MHS Athletic Hall of Fame


The year was 1992 at an away game on Saint Rose's basketball court where Jennifer Kackos, a forward on Manasquan's undefeated team, had four seconds left to make a winning shot. The ball soared as the fans screamed, the buzzer blared and the net swished. She had won the game!

On Saturday, October 26th Ms. Kackos will be accepting her induction award for MHS's Athletic Hall of Fame.

"It's an honor," she said of this election, "I believe the timing was a bit overdue," she continued, laughing, "but it's so nice to finally be acknowledged for all my hard work throughout the time I played for MHS. I was a little hurt to find out that one of my coaches will be unable to attend, but I'm still excited to see some familiar faces who led me to stardom."

Walking throughout the hallways students can see her achievements; an overall 1,233 total points scored as well as being a part of the Tri-Conference- Class C Championship. For someone who played so incredibly for our high school's basketball team, Ms. Kackos simply trained in her driveway with a 9 ½ inch rim which she said was, "held up by bricks." Close friends, siblings and even her two favorite coaches, Mrs. Kordulak and Mr. Johnson, helped teach her tricks and strategies for the game of b-ball.

Director of Guidance Mr. McCarthy, who serves on the committee for the Hall of Fame and will be involved in the ceremony, discussed why she is receiving this very special nomination. According to Mr. McCarthy, Ms. Kackos "was specifically selected by the Hall of Fame committee for her great success throughout her athletic career in high school which included memorable games and

record breaking scores."

Not only was Ms. Kackos an outstanding basketball player, but also a softball star too. She was a feared hitter who helped lead girls softball to great success in the early 90s.

Ms. Kackos continued her athletics after graduation and received a full scholarship to play basketball at Georgian Court University. After college Ms. Kackos became a special education teacher and coached basketball, softball, field hockey and girls track during her free time.

MHS principal Mr. Coppola complimented Ms. Kackos and gave some encouraging words involving the big event. "I'm very happy for her. I know for a fact she was one of the best athletes who came out of MHS. I'm looking forward to sharing her success at the ceremony," he said.

Once again the ceremony and dinner will be held on Saturday, October 26th at Crystal Point in Point Pleasant. The audience will be expecting a heartfelt speech from both Ms. Kackos and her guest presenter, which she hopes "won't make her too emotional." Anyone who is interested or inspired should go; Mrs. Kackos deserves a crowd!

"I'm excited to be back," Miss Marco says.


MHS Welcomes Another Certo


swayed towards physical education as a result of her love for exercising.

National Honor Society Selects New Members

National Honor Society is a very prestigious and demanding program that only a select amount of students are a part of. To even be considered for the program, the student must obtain an "A" or 93 average and above, from freshman year to the present. Next, students think of a service project that could be completed in the community or in school, that is a total of 40 leadership hours. In addition to the 40 leadership hours, students are required to earn another 80 extra hours through service work, in and around the community. The total required hours a candidate must earn is 120.

To be selected into Honor Society the applicant needs to be "a person of character," Mrs. Fenlon NHS adviser stated, and demonstrate "respect, responsibility, trustworthiness, fairness, caring and citizenship."






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tough decision of ranking the team members.

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John Vianney to the ground, with a 21-14 victory over SJV and a 38-0 victory over Middletown South.


