New and Noteworthy: The Tablets

This year, Manasquan High School has made a great leap forward with the advancements in technology by providing each student with a personal laptop / tablet. The Dell Venue Pro 11 is equipped with the 8.1 Enterprise Software; it is convenient to use as a portable tablet or as a sleek laptop. The tablets come with a keyboard and a case that contains a charger, a screen cleaner, and a pen that can be used on the surface of the tablet.

There are many new programs on the tablets. Other than the common Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, it also has programs such as OneNote. OneNote allows teachers to share notes and files with the students that they will be using for the rest of the course. For example, in math classes, such as Mr. Battaglia's, he has shared his course folder with each of the students, allowing them to download the file and have the notes for the rest of the semester or year.

Many questions have surfaced about whether the tablets are mandatory to use in every class or whether the old fashioned notebook paper and pen will suffice. There has been concerns voiced in response to the tablets, mainly by members of the senior class. Many seniors, whether they are resistant to change or just prefer paper and pens, have taken a stand against the tablets, believe that the tablets are unnecessary, and feel there is no point in getting them just for one year. Just take a walk down the hallway and I guarantee that you will hear mumbling from a disgruntled senior who is forced to start utiliz-

ing the tablet.

"I'm not as into it [the tablets] as the teachers are. I feel like the teachers are expecting us to do more work since we have the tablets, like they assign more projects on PowerPoint," said senior Alex Kurtz. Matt Del Guercio further commented on this when he said that "teachers now expect you to do all your homework on your tablet" and as far as PowerPoint goes he says it seems to "spazz". Most seniors, Gillian Black, Brian Comer, and Ryan Jensen to name a few, find the tablets most useful for watching Netflix. Alex Kurtz, on the other hand, does not have this luxury, since she has had Wi-Fi issues, like many other people in the school. Many seniors also agreed that there wasn't much instruction given out with the tablets. There was a two minute tutorial but that didn't seem to cut it.

Ryan, Alex, and Gill agree that even though the tablets are annoying to lug around, they are convenient to use to type documents right there in class instead of waiting to go home or to the library. Whether it ranges from a small problem like carrying them

around or comes down the school wide Wi-Fi problems, it appears that seniors are not accustomed to using the tablets and therefore find anything slightly wrong with them to be a nuisance.

However, as the school year progresses more and more students are becoming comfortable with the tablets and how to use them to their advantage. The mumbling in the halls has turned to a low simmer. Students are finding tools that they can use to their advantage,

such as OneNote to help them connect to their teachers, and also Microsoft Word to help get ahead on homework. Multiple students have ditched the pen and paper to take notes right on their tablet, whether it is with the use of the touchscreen pen or the keyboard.

As time progresses the kinks are slowly being reworked and resolved. One problem was the WIFI issue, but once the problem was sought out, in a

matter of days, it was fixed. Another problem in the first few days of school with OneNote, was resolved when students were informed that instead of the OneNote that came with the tablets the students had to use the OneNote 2013, and, again, problem solved. It's these quick fixes that allow the tablets to stay up to date and usable.

Also, the super staff of tech support guys can be found downstairs every day, and are just waiting to hear the newest problem in order to solve it at the touch of a button. The resources have been supplied and now it is up the students to take advantage of them.

MHS Introduces New Academy of Engineering

Manasquan High School is proud to announce the launch of the Academy of Engineering this year. The school board has planned to introduce an engineering program for several years, and now the necessary funding has recently been approved, making it possible. Mrs. Edwards has also been a great asset to the Academy, and has been named its director. She was able to successfully secure grants which allowed MHS to obtain a 3-D printer and establish the Innovations Lab, both of which facilitate the Academy of Engineering.

Mr. Coppola describes Mrs. Edwards as being exceptionally "in-tune with educational technology".

Our Superintendent, Dr. Kasyan, has also been instrumental in developing the academy. He had the vision for the program and made it a priority to get the academy approved in the 20152016 School Budget. Last year, he introduced two engineering- focused courses to MHS: Engineering& Design and Architecture & Construction, both of which are taught by Mrs. Hoeler. The administration was pleased by the abundance of positive feedback and the sizable enrollment yielded from these courses, and knew the Academy of Engineering would be a well-received addition to MHS.

In Engineering & Design students utilize professional engineering software to plan 3-D models. These models are designed to tackle real-world problems that engineers will encounter and need to solve. Another course offered, Architecture & Construction, focuses on the design and construction of 2-D design plans.

Additionally, the administration made efforts to research robotic technology, as they consider it to be the cornerstone of the Academy. Introduction to Engineering Robotics is offered this year beginning in the second semester, and it will be taught by Mrs. Edwards. This course explores the foundations of engineering through robotics and provides students with an opportunity to integrate mechanics with programming. It is open to 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students, as there is a prerequisite to have successfully taken a science and a math course in order to ensure efficiency in utilizing STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math) concepts in class.

There are also plans to start a competitive Robotics team this year, which would be led by Mrs. Edwards. The club will be open to all students and there are already an impressive amount of students who have expressed their intention to join. In addition to the hands-on skills application, critical thinking, and leadership opportunities, these competitions offer students the opportunity to earn college scholarships!

With every new school year comes new rules, regulations and guidelines that may not have been around in prior years. This year is no different, as the administration has a few policies that we as students must get ourselves accustomed with in order to make the school year run smoothly.

While some small changes may not be too noticeable to most students, one change has already made for some wide controversy between the student body. As the majority of us quickly realized in the beginning of the year, the bathrooms are not available in between classes; the doors are locked during the switchover of blocks. This has created a problem for many of us since we use the time in between class to use the restroom facilities, so that we don't have to miss important lessons throughout the day.

The administration made the decision before the school year began to revisit this previously enforced policy. "Yes, the decision was made over the summer on behalf of the high school administration and the school security guard. This is a policy that was in effect years ago, that we have chosen to

revisit," Assistant Principal Mr. Bramley explained.

Assistant Principal Mr. Cahill joined Mr. Bramley in providing insight to the new bathroom regulations. "So the main reason for the policy mostly has to deal with student accountability. We like to make sure everyone in the building is accounted for when they enter their classrooms, they said. "If teachers go to take attendance and many of their students are late to class due to being in the bathroom, it makes the instructor's job a lot harder. We like to see that the whole class is acounted for and on time."

The question was then brought up asking how they would respond to some students who feel it is wrong that the bathrooms are to be locked. "We are going to monitor the school policy and assess its effectiveness," they said. "If any student has an emergency or needs to use the bathroom at the time they are locked up, the nurses office will always be open in the case of a necessity."

Senior Alexandra Warren has a different opinion on this "locked bathroom" situation. In an effort to change the administration's mind about locking the halls

during time in between blocks, she created a petition that was signed by approximately 100 students throughout the school. When I asked her about the petition, she replied, "Well this petition was created to inform the side effects of students holding

their bladder. I wanted to show that your body was created to release its waste and if not, bacteria begins to build up, leading to serious medical issues."

She believes that the locked bathrooms are only hurting students. She mentioned that if students can't use the restrooms during passing

periods, they end up taking time out of class to use the bathroom. They could potentially miss key parts of class, leaving them behind and confused. She believes that it shouldn't be happening. Students should be able to use the restroom in between classes to save the lost class time.

Although Alexandra realizes that the administration isn't doing this to hurt the students but to keep them accounted for, she wants them to understand the negative affects that locking the bathrooms has on students.

"Now students are forced

to take valuable class time to use the restroom. I just feel like we should be able to use the bathroom whenever we need to," Alex explained.

While the majority of the student body would definitely wish to have bathroom regulations back to the way they were, it is always best to follow school

rules accordingly and see where it gets us. For all we know, this could end in positive results for the administration and perhaps even the students. So even though many peers are left frustrated with the locked bathrooms, this could lead to a healthier school environment. Only time will tell where this policy takes us.

Feel the Bern: The Surprise Leader Inc. The Democratic Primary Race

He looks like everyone's crazy old uncle or grandpa. He has frequently disheveled white hair. He speaks in a thick Brooklyn accent. He may not have the looks and aura of JFK, but he has a chance to become the next person to hold a job JFK and 42 others have held: President of the United States. The

man who I'm describing is Bernie Sanders, the 71 year old Senator from Vermont, who currently leads Hillary Clinton by 22 points in New Hampshire and 10 points in Iowa in some polls.

Sanders has had a meteoric rise over the

summer, starting out as an obscure candidate from a small state, but emerging as a legitimate challenger in the polls. Sanders' message has resonated with millions across the country, especially young people and liberals angry with what they believe is the lack of change in Washington due to frequent disagreements and stalemates in Congress and other issues like high unemployment. Sanders' stances on major issues are a liberals' wish list of what they want to see changed in Washington and in America: Increasing the minimum wage to \$15 an hour, making tuition free at public colleges and universities, getting rid of the death penalty, lessening the wage gap, enacting a universal health care system in America, and increasing the awareness of and action against global warming. Sanders has mainly focused his campaign on increasing opportunities for the middle class and has repeatedly said that wealth has to be distributed among all Americans and not just among 1% of our nation's millionaires and billionaires.

Another key tenet of Sanders' campaign has been the reforming of the campaign finance system. From the beginning of his campaign this past May, he has run a grass roots campaign and hasn't taken a single cent from super PACs or benefactors like the Koch Brothers that have dominated campaign finance in recent. This, together with his other opinions on key issues, helps him really connect to not only liberals but young people who appreciate his authenticity and his ability to say what Republicans may not like but what has to be said.

Bernie's grass roots, bluntly honest, ways come mainly from his upbringing in a Jewish household in Brooklyn to a father who emigrated from Poland after his family had been killed in the Holocaust and a mother who had lived in New York

City. A young Bernie became interested in politics as a young age because as he puts it, "A guy named Adolf Hitler won an election in 1932 and 50 million people died as a result. What I learned as a little kid is that politics is, in fact, important." After graduating from James Madison High School in Brooklyn, Bernie fought for civil

rights and housing equality as a member of the Socialist Party at the University of Chicago, even participating in the 1963 March Washington. moved Bernie to Vermont after college and ran Governor Vermont twice as a member of the

Liberty Union Party. Running as an Independent in 1981, Bernie won the election for Mayor of Burlington and stayed mayor for 8 years. Bernie became the first Independent elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1991 and a United States Senator in 2007. While in the House, Bernie was an early propoent of gay rights and voted against the war in Iraq in 2003. Seeing that he could never win a presidential election as an Independent and because he had left- leaning views anyway, Bernie decided to run for President as a Democrat, announcing his campaign last May.

Bernie has drawn increasingly large crowds that compete with the crowds at rallies of bigger named candidates like Hillary Clinton and Jeb Bush, including 27,000 people at the Memorial Sports Arena in Los

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Once Yogi tired, he displayed his abilities to win as a coach, managing the Yankees to the World Series in 1964 and the Mets to the World Series in 1973.

Mets 1st base coach in 1969, and as a Yankees coach in

1977 and 1978. It was his second tenure as Yankee manager in 1985, which ended with him being fired after 16 games that led to a bitter feud with owner George Steinbrenner that lasted until 1999. For 14 years Berra never set foot in Yankee Stadium and was absent for 2 World Series championships. After Steinbrenner met Yogi at his house, the two made peace and Yogi returned to Yankee Stadium.

On the day he returned July 18, 1999, which was Yogi Berra Day at the stadium, he threw out the first pitch from Don Larsen as he had done during Larsen's perfect game 33 years before. And, fittingly, on that day a perfect game was thrown by David Cone, which further cemented Yogi's mystique and legacy and the aura of winning that followed him throughout his life.

Berra grew up as the son of Italian immigrants in the hill section of St Louis and received his famed nickname because his friends though he looked like a Hindu Yogi when he waited to bat with arms and legs crossed. In 1942, he was passed over by his favorite team, the St Louis Cardinals, and instead signed with the Yankees. Following this, Berra, unlike other players who avoided participating in battles, actually saw time in WWII in the Navy, even storming the beach at

Normandy. He played with the Newark Bears minor league team after the war, beginning his connection to New Jersey, where he lived the rest of his life.

Berra's funeral also took place in New Jersey at Immaculate Conception church in Montclair and was attended by sports legends like Harry Carson, Mariano Rivera, Reggie Jackson, Derek Jeter, and Joe Torre. The tributes and remembrances in the ensuing days were numerous: the lights on the empire state building Above: Immaculate Concepturned Yankee blue, the Mets, Yankees, and Astros held moments of silence, and Derek Jeter, the new bearer of the ti-



tion Church in Montclair, ÑJ where Yogi's funeral took place.

tle of greatest living Yankee, wrote a touching tribute to Yogi on his website, The Players Tribune. A memorial service was held at the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center on the campus of Montclair State University.

In the end, Yogi Berra will not just be remembered as a legendary baseball player and someone who contributed countless humorous malapropisms to our vernacular, but as a wonderful man and husband who touched the lives of everyone he came into contact with and who exemplified everything great about the American way. He grew up poor as the son of immigrants, played the national pastime, and even served our country in WWII, and truly personified what Tom Brokaw would call the "greatest generation." I'll leave it to Derek Jeter to describe Yogi's effect on people he met: "Yogi understood something simple about the sport: Baseball is meant to be fun. Any time he was around, he made it that way. Yogi's mission was to put a smile on people's faces, and he succeeded." Yogi, you will truly be missed.

New Music Profile: Halsev

Halsey, a blue-haired, confident, and emotional new artist, has definitely caught my attention in the music world. I listen to any musician, from Bruce Springsteen to Mac Miller, or from The 1975 to Taylor Swift, but she has something to her that is different from the rest. And that something



is making her more appealing and promising each day. Trust me, once you take one listen to her, you'll instantly fall in love, like I did a month ago.

Halsey, whose real name is Ashley Nicollete Frangipane, is from Washington, New Jersey. She is an upcoming American singer, songwriter and recording artist. Halsey started her career at age 17 by posting YouTube videos of herself covering popular Taylor Swift songs. Thereafter, she wrote and recorded her first single "Ghost" and posted that on SoundCloud. After six hours of it being available, nine record labels were unexpectedly blowing up her phone.

In early 2014, Halsey signed her first recording contract with Astralwerks Records and was ready to start working. She released her debut EP, Room 93, on October 27, 2014. (EP stands for "Extended Player" and is created before an album drops for musicians to raise awareness of their talent.) She explains in a Fuse TV interview, "The Room 93 EP was my indulgence with my obsession with the isolated feeling of being in a hotel room. As I started traveling and making music, everything was out of hotel rooms: Dating people, having business

meetings, trying to keep friendships alive in this isolated prop environment that's like a mock house. 'Oh we're going to make this little thing that's supposed to look like a house but it's not, it's pretend.' It's voyeuristic." The song "Is There Somewhere" is my favorite because it is a beautifully written tale about how she fell in love with a boy. The boy is Matty Healy, the lead singer from the alternative band The 1975. Matty was already in a relationship when Halsey fell in love with him, making her his second choice. In this song, she describes how she tries to pretend as if she is the one he really is in love with when they are together.

After the release, Halsey started to open for The Kooks in 2014, only playing original songs from her EP. She then led a co-headline tour with her musical friends Young Rising Sons in the beginning of 2015. In the summer of 2015, Halsey had the pleasure to be the first act on the Imagine Dragons tour. Now, in the fall of this year, Halsey will be the opening act for The Weeknd on his Madness Tour. However, while on tour with The Weeknd, Halsey will be able to play a bigger set list since her debut album, called BADLANDS, came out via iTunes on August 28th, 2015. In a Billboard interview, Halsey explains that, "It's called Badlands because it's supposed to feel like a dystopia, like an isolated wasteland. It's got the Tarantino, Sin City vibe. Badlands is as if you exited Room 93 to the world that it exists in."






To me, Halsey's music is very authentic, with a splash of vulnerability and awareness. She tells a story in each of her songs, which keeps her music intriguing and compelling. She creates pop music that's almost ironic; her lyrics catch you off guard. As she tells her story, she throws phrases and circumstances at you that are so seemingly conversational that they almost feel like they don't belong there. Halsey has reinvented that angry, female pop record and it is absolutely worth listening to.

Halsey has a plethora of songs that depict love, not only from her point of view, but from society's as well. One of her songs, "Colors", is also written about Matty Healy and how he changed her, but this time at the end of their relationship. Lyrics such as "You were red, and you liked me because I was blue. But you touched me, and suddenly I was a lilac sky. Then you decided purple just wasn't for you" strongly illustrate her past feelings. Halsey's lyrics are extremely deep and well thought out. Matty Healy is a very dark person who craves the blackness and whiteness of the world as well as the intense feeling of love, which symbolizes the red. On the other hand, Halsey is very energetic and open-minded, which exemplifies the blue in this equation (also her hair is dyed blue). Moreover, when red and blue hues mix, they create purple, which is what Halsey believes has happened to her during her relationship. Portrayed as these two separate colors, when Halsey and Matty "touched", she evolved into a lilac sky, which is a lighter shade of purple. 

my life without playing with every


