

## Squan Engineers Take Home First Place at STEAM Tank Challenge

For most people, getting married, graduating high school, having their first baby, or even doing something as remarkable as climbing Mt. Everest would be considered the peak of their lives. But for senior Kevin Lin, he recently experienced his own greatest moment of pride as part of the winning team in the STEAM Tank Challenge.

"[Winning was] the climax of my life. I've never had the chance to do anything like that before where it would be a step into my future," Kevin said.

Back on October 25th, students in the Academy of Engineering and in the Robotics Club presented their ideas, inventions, and innovations to a panel of judges down in Atlantic City during the final round of the statewide competition. Two weeks later, they learned the amazing news that they had placed first

out of 193 teams from around New Jersey.

John Heeseman, Marc Gargiulo, and Kevin Lin, all seniors here at MHS, were the members of the winning team, alongside 2017 graduate Mike Lurch and junior Matt Palangio. Awarded first place was the Outdoor Eco-Track, a concept utilizing 3D printing technology to create an environmentally friendly, removable and reusable outdoor track for sports such as Cross Country and Track and Field.

When asked about how he felt when his project took home the first-place prize, John said, "Obviously I was super excited. I knew we had a good idea and that it would do well, but I wouldn't say I knew we were going to get first place." He elaborated on what the victory meant for the school and for the

future of this invention. The school would gladly explore using the "eco-track".

His teammate Kevin was less sure of his team's victory, saying that he was surprised that they won. "We've been working on this [project] for months. About in the middle, we had a lot of

errors and considered just giving up but we knew that the reward [of potential victory] would be worth it."

John, Kevin, and the rest of their team have recently been talking to patent attorneys to try receiving a patent for their invention, as well as working with the president of the Tesla Science

Foundation Chapter New Jersey, Samuel Mason, to expand product development and to make prototypes.

Manasquan High School's other competing team the Exo-Controller, an XBox controller powered by the thermal heat produced by a player's hands, took third place.

The goal of the The STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, & Math) Tank Challenge's task was to "invent something new, modify an existing product or identify a situation or problem that needs resolution ... and present their inventions before a panel of entrepreneurs, business leaders, and inventors". 
the giving tree set up. Teachers can take a tag with an age written on it and then buy the suggested present on the tag. It is a great way to help out local students and parents in our school com-

## Christie Out, New Governor Phil Murphy In

Across the country, people flocked to their local polling stations to cast their votes which would determine many of the most important positions in our government. This year, the mid-term elections occurred on the 6<sup>th</sup> of November.

In our home state of New Jersey, Phil Murphy, Democrat and former U.S. ambassador to Germany, was able to easily defeat Lt. Gov. Kim Guadagno to become the 56<sup>th</sup> governor of the state of New Jersey. He will be the first Democrat to hold the position since before Chris Christie came into office in early 2010.

For the Democratic party, this was a major victory. It gives a boost to the party's anti-Trump platform and will give the party nearly complete control over the state government. Over the next few years, the Democrats will be able to pass many bills into law that were struck down during Christie's administration. Issues such as tighter gun laws and a raised minimum wage are just some of the policies that Governor Christie has fought against over the past few years that the Democrats will have no problem passing come 2018.

The Governor-Elect's main goals are centered around making New Jersey a more progressive state. Some focal points of his campaign include increasing funding toward education, legalizing and taxing marijuana in order to generate more income for the state, and to fight President Trump's agenda and policies.

His victory can be best con-

male and female, feeling unsafe, victims need advocates and voices.

If you have been a victim, not speaking out if you are not ready to does not invalidate what has happened to you. If tweeting #MeToo to some hundred followers seems daunting, it's okay. Talk to a trusted individual, like a friend or a counselor in your school, in a private setting if that is more comfortable for you. You are not alone. It is estimated that every two minutes, an American is sexually assaulted. You are not alone, and the fact that there are this many others like you is not okay. Fortunately recent developments in news regarding the injustices in Hollywood has shed a light on this issue that appears to be lasting.

Unfortunately, more actors and public figures have had allegations made against them since Weinstein's name hit the papers on a large scale in early October. Actors like Kevin Spacey, who has been accused by over a dozen men, many who were teenage boys at the time of soxual barassment, assault

or rape. Netflix, the creators of the show he starred in, House of Cards, has since fired him. Comedian Louis C.K. has also been accused of sexual misconduct by half a dozen women. These are just a few names that have victimized countless individuals, adolescents and adults, men and women, but all undeserving of the pain and disrespect they had received.

Since Harvey Weinstein's victims have spoken out in a domino-like fashion and he has lost his job, he has made a public statement, acknowledging that "the way [he has] behaved with colleagues in the past has caused a lot of pain", as well as "sincerely [apologizing] for" his misconduct. This, as well as the money he used to pay off victims in return for their silence and the money he owes them legally, is like putting tape over fault lines from an earthquake. The actions that have taken such an astronomical emotional toll on the actresses he targeted cannot be erased by a dollar signs.


to Dirty Dancing or James's preference Beauty and the Beast. But Cammy won and James was still "excited to do the lift."



# Controversial Tax Plan Passes in Senate; Offers Massive Cuts to Corporations

In the early morning of Saturday, December 2nd, the senate passed a tax reform that promised

changes sweeping many Obamaera tax policies and will have a dramatic impact across the country. It will be the single biggest tax overhaul that the nation has seen since the Reagan administration. The plan also intends to provide a huge boost to Trump's administration after it failed to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

Following closely to the idea of trickle-down economics and Reaganomics that dominated the 1980s, the plan promises to drastically cut the corporate tax rate from 35% down to 20%. Some senators are currently fighting to have this number pushed up to 22% in order to fund other tax cuts like an improved child tax credit or to lessen the impact the plan will have on the national deficit.

Still, this cut will most likely not be enacted until 2019 if the committee decides to go through with the Senate's approach rather than the House of Representative's plan. Many Republicans hope that corporations will use these massive

savings in order to aid the lower and middle class and increase tax revenue for the federal government



in the future. In other words, they hope that these savings will "trickle-down" as corporations funnel this money into the economy.

In total, the plan promises to cut taxes by \$1.5 trillion. Economists are skeptical, however, that the plan will help the American economy like many of the reformers are asserting. They also fear that the national deficit, which is well over \$18 trillion as it is, will rise by over another \$1 trillion if the Senate plan passes as it stands.

One of the most controversial aspects of the tax reform that was proposed is the removal of the Individual Healthcare Mandate. Under this, everyone who was eligible

for healthcare was forced to buy healthcare or else they would suffer tax penalties. Even though this provision would still technically be a part of the plan, the penalty for infringing on it would fall to \$0. As a result of the new policy, its estimated that 13 million people will lose their healthcare and premiums will raise by about 10% across the board. On the plus-side, the federal deficit would decrease by well over \$300 billion.

most importantly, by the public. This plan may be signed into law just three weeks after it was first passed in the House and Senate.

In all, there are many pros and cons with the new tax reform depending on where you fall on party lines and what your income is. Of course, there is a lot more to the new tax plan than what is covered in the article so it's important to find out more about the plan by yourself. The most important part of the plan is that it may benefit many people in our area as their taxes may lower even though things like the national deficit, income inequality, and prices for healthcare will worsen as a result of the plan.



# Practicing Gratitude this Holiday Season



Try mixing red, brown, and dark green together for a rugged yet festive look. I recommend you wear this combination in rural or woodland areas. Also try adding boots to complete the look.






Blue, white, and gray are great colors for this season. Wear them in the city, at brunch, or when out shopping.
