

PITCHERS AND HITTERS DOMINATE ON OPENING DAY

Warmer weather, school days winding down, and more outdoor activities taking place. These are all key things that occur when spring finally decides to make its appearance. With the arrival of spring comes the start of another sport season that will be welcomed into millions of homes in America. Major League Baseball officialy kicked off on the second day of April.

Sunday April 2 marked the beginning of the season with three games: Yankees at Rays, Giants at Diamondbacks, and Cubs at Cardinals. Reigning World Champions the Cubs looked to become the first repeat champions since the 1998-2000 Yankees and win 100 games for a second year in a row.

Excitement was all around these three games as the Rays out ran and homered the Yankees, and the Cardinals and Diamondbacks found it in themselves to rally and come out victorious.

San Francisco Giants pitcher Madison Bumgarner broke records by hitting a home run before even allowing a baserunner. It was hit at 112.5 mph., one of the hardest hit home runs by a

pitcher ever calculated. However, he wasn't done hitting powerful homers, as he hit another one a few innings later.

Bumgarner wasn't all about the hitting on that day either, as he had a



no-hitter into the bottom of the sixth inning. But the Diamondbacks were able to rally and pull out the first walk-off victory of 2017, beating the Giants 6-5.

Cardinals pitcher Carlos Martinez paid respect to Yordano Ventura and Oscar Taveras, who both tragically passed away in the off season, by drawing their numbers into the mound before

the game started. The Cardinals then rallied together in the ninth inning with the bases loaded for the second walk-off of the season, beating the defending World Champion Cubs.

The following day was filled with 12 more opening day games, rewarding

baseball fans with two opening days. This day was filled with more power, as players continued to launch home runs into the stands.

Washington Nationals outfielder Bryce Harper hit his fifth career Opening Day home run in the Nationals win against the Marlins. While the Angels Mike Trout hit his third career Opening Day home runaginst the As, Khris Davis homered twice for the A's against the Angels.

The home runs didn't end there as the Rangers hosted the Indians in a slugfest. For the Rangers Rougned Odor hit two home runs, and Carlos Gomez blasted one into the second deck, while for the Indians Edwin Encarnacion didn't want to feel left out and belted one as well.

The first grand slam of the season came from the Dodgers, as Joc Pederson blasted one as they beat the Padres 14-3. And Mark Trumbo launched the season's first walk off homer in the Orioles win against the Blue Jays in 11 innings.

Even with the power of the hit-

From NFL Star to Life Behind Bars: The Tragic Story of Aaron Hernandez

The life story of Aaron Hernandez is a story filled with tragedy, and it came to an abrupt end on April 19th. He was in the process of serving a life sentence for the 2013 murder of Odin Lloyd when he was found hanging by a bedsheet in his cell.

Hernandez grew up in Bristol, Connecticut with his mother Terri, father Dennis, and brother D.J., a tight knit group. Aaron was only sixteen years old when his father unexpectedly passed away due Hernandez looks onward during the 2013 to complications from a hernia surgery. This moment, according to his

mother Terri, is what changed the trajectory of her son's life forever.


After losing his father, Hernandez became a rebellious young man. His mother even said, "he wasn't the same kid," in an interview with USA Today back in 2009. It was a tough time in his life to be without a father as he weighed his college choices. Originally, he planned to follow in the footsteps of his father and brother and play football at the University of Connecticut, but after connecting with assistant coach Steve Addazio of the University of Florida he flipped his commitment and joined the prestigious Florida Gators football team.

During Hernandez's college career, the head coach of the Gators football team was Urban Meyer, a legendary figure in college football history. Coach Meyer did his best

to take Hernandez under his wing.

Meyer dedicated a lot of his time to Hernandez, once even holding a ten-hour meeting with him during a time where Hernandez was really struggling. Meyer did what he could to keep Hernandez from going down the wrong path.

Despite finally having a role model, Hernandez still got

himself into trouble in college. In 2007, Hernandez was involved in a fight at a Gainesville bar after he reportedly ordered alcoholic drinks and refused to pay for them. He was escorted out by an employee, and when the employee turned to walk away, the 17-year-old Hernandez punched him on the side of the head, rupturing his eardrum. The incident was never brought to court, however, as a settlement was reached.

It has also been speculated that a 2007 shooting that injured two people in Gainesville may have been Hernandez's doing as well, but that

case will now remain unsolved.

Following his junior year at Florida in which the Gators won the BCS National Championship in a game against the Oklahoma Sooners, Hernandez entered the 2010 NFL Draft, forgoing his final year of college eligibility. While his talent was unquestionable, his checkered past caused his draft stock to drop. Hernandez was selected in the fourth round, 113th overall by the New England Patriots, continuing the trend of being a member of a football powerhouse.

The Patriots are a model franchise in the NFL.


Over the years, they have upheld fantastic standards and

managed to keep their players under control on and off the field. It seemed to be a great fit for the troubled Hernandez, who entered the league as the youngest player on any

active roster.

On the field, Hernandez blossomed. He and fellow tight end Rob Gronkowski dominated NFL defenses. The Patriots made the two tight end set the basis of their offensive game plan, and they utilized Hernandez's skillset all over the field. On August 27th, 2012, just one year before he was indicted on murder charges in front of a grand

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Water Testing Results Reveal Excessive

Levels of Lead

On April 27, a letter from Dr. Kasyan was posted on the district webpage informing parents, teachers, and students that drinking water in both the elementary and high school have tested positive for lead in certain parts of the schools.

It was anticipated from school officials that there would be a problem

with the water in the schools. Parts of the school are quite old, whether it was from the infrastructure to plumbing. With the age of the building taken into consideration the school district was able to see results of the test coming.

Since the water has tested pos-

itive for lead, the affected classrooms have been addressed and water fountains have been shut down. Water fountains and sinks affected throughout the school are now posted with

"DO NOT DRINK" or "DO NOT USE" warning signs for students and faculty.

With the positive test results the school district has tested all drinking water and food preparation areas that use water

for any risk of lead. 60 samples were taken from the elementary school and 97 from the high school.

Within the high school the science wing was highly affected by lead in water. In each science classrooms sinks have been shut down and signs have been posted. Water

fountains outside both the girl's and boy's bathrooms

Center hall and upstairs have also tested positive for lead in addition to the water fountain outside the training room.

The lead in the water could cause some serious health problems. It's harmful

to the brain, kidneys, and production of red blood cells. While it's not good for anyone to consume, it's especially problematic for pregnant women, infants, and children under

6. It delays development, reduces hearing and attention span, and can even lead to brain damage.


Lead doesn't appear in water naturally, but it spreads from deterioration of

materials that contain lead, which hold the water- allowing it to enter the water distribution system and building's plumbing.

Also, when water sits in lead pipes for an extended amount of time, it can dissolve into the water.

It's important that Manasquan was able to test the water and is fixing the problem as quickly as possible. However, if you drank the water from the school, it doesn't mean your life is at any risk. For the time however, it is not a bad idea to keep your distance from certain water fountains in the school.

Fortunately, the school found out and now they are fixing the problem. Students shouldn't have to think twice about where the water they are drinking came from, and whether or not it's safe. In no time the problem will be fixed and the lead water problem will be a distant memory at Manasquan.

Improv for Ron's purpose is not only to entertain, but to raise money from ticket sales and much appreciated donations for the Ronald A. Kubik Memorial Scholarship.

The Ronald A. Kubik Memorial Scholarship was started in memory and honor of Ron Kubik, a Manasquan graduate and Army Ranger who gave his life in Afghanistan, saving the lives of 5 fellow rangers, 5 Afghan soldiers, and 19 innocent Afghan women and children. For his bravery and service to our country, Ron was awarded the Purple Heart, the Bronze Star, the Meritorious Service Medal, and the Silver Star – the military's third high-

est honor designated solely for heroism in combat.

Mr. Mawn and Mr. Harvey taught student Ron Kubik and started the Ronald A. Kubik Memorial Scholarship in his honor. He took English classes with both teachers and was

in Mr. Mawn's journalism class and Mr. Harvey's acting class.

In fact, Ron had his own column called "The Adventures of Ron." "Each month he would write about some strange adventure he had taken," says Mr. Mawn. In one issue, Ron wrote about visiting the cemetery with his friends. "I'm not saying there was a ghost there but I am

saying you never know and we are not alone," Ron wrote. This quirky and bold personality was just one of the many things that made Ron such an amazing person.

It was only fitting for Mr. Harvey and Mr. Mawn to start a comedy show to fundraise the scholarship, remind people of what Ron was really about, and do something fun to honor Ron's memory in a way he would've liked.

The Ronald A. Kubik Memorial Scholarship is open to MHS seniors and all seniors are encouraged to apply. Just last year, Torey Grennan and Sonny Timpani were each awarded


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FIDDLER ON THE ROOF



Wright's Miraculous Recovery and Return

About 15 months ago, Owen Wright suffered a se-

vere brain injury at Pipeline on the North Shore of Oahu in Hawaii. It had the potential to end his career and even his life. As the first event of the 2017 season rolled around, Wright's ability to perform was questioned by many.

But on March 14th, Wright proved that he was back to his best form and possibly better than he'd ever been. He opened up his 2017 season with a 16.83 total in his first heat. With all eyes on him, Owen Wright displayed one of

the biggest comebacks in history and went on to win the Quiksilver Pro Gold Coast, the first stop of the World Surf League tour.

Wright, born on January 6th, 1990, grew up with great expectations of having a successful surfing career. In recent years, injury has held him back.

During the 2015 season, Wright made history at the Fiji Pro. In round 5 he had a heat total of twenty out of twenty, then in the final he also had a twenty out of twenty, making himself the first person to have two perfect heats in one contest.

The day before the 2015 Pipe Masters was due to kickoff, Wright suffered a tragic brain injury while warming up for the contest. As a few weeks went by and the Pipe Masters ended without Owen, very few reports stating how severe his in-

jury were available. Many thought Wright's injury was just a minor concussion.

Some reports said Wright's brain had "small" amounts of bleeding but a severe concussion. Eventually Wright withdrew from the first half of the 2016 season without an injury update. In March of 2016, Wright went to Instagram for the first time since the injury to reveal his first surf since the injury. He said "I couldn't get to my feet. So I just layed there."

In September of 2016, he posted: "Turned the biggest corner this week with the head injury. It's good to be feeling a lot more like myself again." Then on March 7th, 2017, after doctors gave him the "okay" and surfing in a local contest, Owen Wright announced his full return to tour on Instagram with a confident, "Bring on 2017."

During his first heat back, it looked like his surfing had improved from when we'd last seen him surfing in 2015. Taking first in his round 1 heat, led him straight to the third round where he surfed against longtime friend, team-mate, and three-time world champion, Mick Fanning. Wright beat him by a tenth of a point.

He continued to strive through the contest, winning his quarterfinal heat, then beating 2014 world champion, Gabriel Medina, by a long-shot in the semifinals.

Wright met one of his best friends

and former event winner, Matt "Wilko" Wilkinson, in the final. After Owen and Wilko went wave for wave for thirty-five minutes, Wright came out on top. Wilko said, "To see Owen the way he was last year, was the toughest thing I'd ever seen. If anyone's going to beat me, I'm so glad it's him," as he began to cry and hug Owen in the post-heat interview.

Eleven-time world champion Kelly Slater said, "How is it that after 13 or 14 months of not being able to really surf like the Owen we know, in fact, hardly being

able to surf from what I hear, he comes back and is surfing like this?"

As the surfing and sports world watched one of the greatest returns of all time unfold, Wright never fails to give credit to his baby boy and girlfriend for his success. Wright explained, "There's definitely a Dad Power that you get when you first become one. It's a funny experience, coming in from a heat and holding a baby. Before I had that, I'd come in from a heat and be like 'Oh, did you notice me, that wave this and that.' Now I just sit there and play with him and it's the best thing in the world."

Wright's comeback isn't over. He will be heading into the Margaret River Pro ranked #1 in the world and standards are set higher than ever.


When audience members weren't screaming and cheering as they watched their favorite singers perform, they strolled around the venue filled with delicious food vendors and eye-catching modern artwork.


