The Blue & Gray **Massive Renovations Underway** Dr. Kasyan says work will be finished next December

Since the start of the summer, Manasquan High School has been unmassive dergoing changes and renovations all over the The major school. renovations still being worked on are new science labs, an and HVAC system, a new greenhouse. Also, over the summer, the school completely renovated both the school's media center and the shack near the Vic Kuba football field.

According to MHS prin-cipal Mr. Coppola, the "main focus of the renovations is the science wing." Throughout the year, the school will be renovating two science labs on the first floor and will be converting another lab into a STEM lab. On the second floor that is being added to the northside of the school, another regular science lab will be added, along with a new room for the Technology team, and a greenhouse.

This is all part of an effort to improve our out-of-date science facilities. As a result, along with the renovated science rooms, the administration plans to add additional science-based classes and give every incoming freshman the opportunity to take Biology their first year. As the science rooms were last renovated in 1962, these changes are desperately needed.

Another major renovation that the school administration is optimistic about is the new HVAC system that will control the heat-

ing and cooling in the high school. As many students at MHS are very aware, the temperature in each room of the building can sometimes drastically differ. With an HVAC system, the school will have a much easier time regulating temperature. Over the summer, Manasquan Elementary School had an HVAC system installed and nearly all of their temperature issues have been fixed.

The majority of these renovations will be paid for by Manasquan taxpayers, who passed a referendum in late January 2017, which established a budget of about \$12.5 million.

Sending districts, meanwhile, will pay interest on loans taken to float the \$12.5 million.

Of the total dollars, \$8.1 million will be going to Manasquan High school while the rest will be used to renovate Manasquan Elementary school. As of early October, the school has already spent a total of \$1.4 million on renovations.

On October 4, Dr. Kasyan, superintendent of Manasquan Schools, assured the staff that the renovations will be

completed "on time and under budget."

In the past, the referendum was repeatedly shut down as Manasquan residents found that too much of the funds were going to the football field and the shack. This time around, however, the district had made it a priority to not include any sports related improvements in the referendum outside of a new playground

for MES. Still, the school was able to renovate the shack next to the football field over the summer thanks to a donation from the MHS Alumni fund.

As long as there are no more major setbacks, the renovations will be fully finished by early January of 2019-about five months later than the first time-table predicted before construction started. Nonetheless, these changes will dramatically improve our school and help us stay prominent in the future. This is a very exciting time to be an MHS student for those who will see the renovations to the end.

Issue One 2017-2018 The Blue & Gray Squan Robotics Engineers Impress at STEAM Tank Competition

On October 25, two groups of Manasquan High School students earned a huge honor, the opportunity to present their robotics projects in Atlantic City, in the finals of the statewide STEAM Tank Challenge competition.

Sponsored by the New Jersey School Boards

Association (NJSBA) and US Army, the STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, & Math) Tank Challenge's task is to "invent something new, modify an existing product or identify a situation or problem that needs resolution ... and present their inventions before a panel of entrepreneurs, business leaders, and inventors".

The two projects that have advanced to the finals from Manasquan are the Exo Controller and the Outdoor Eco-Track. The Exo Controller, described by Mrs. Edwards as "an XBox controller powered by

controller powered by the heat of the player's hands", is the idea being presented by Will Bielicki and Joe Maimone, both seniors, with the help of junior Chris Palangio. Seniors Kevin Lin and John Heeseman, along with Marc Gargiulo and junior Matt Palangio, are going to present the Outdoor Eco-Track.

These seven Squan finalists are the last of thirty of Mrs. Edwards students from the Academy of Engineering and Robotics Club who began competing began all the way back in March of 2017.

Working in groups, the thirty students initially submitted 12 projects in total. Of the twelve, ten were selected to compete in the Central Region semi-finals at the Stryker US Army Reserve Center in Trenton in May, 2017. From there, two were chosen to continue on to the finals.

This is Mrs. Edwards' third year directing the Academy of Engineering here at MHS. She is not surprised by how far her students have come in the competition, but she acknowledges the growing anxiety anticipating the competition. When asked

how she thinks the students feel about making it to the finals, she laughed and responded, "stressed". The idea was introduced to her at a confer-

ence fall of 2016, where she registered for a mailing list to receive more information so that students in the Academy and in her club could submit their

ideas.

"So many of the ideas were great," said Mrs. Edwards. "I'm surprised more didn't make it to the semi-finals, so I'm not surprised that two teams are finalists."

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She also noted the tremendous stress and hard work the students have taken on in their projects, since it is entirely on their own time and extracurricular.

Students now need to ensure that they have a working model or prototype of their idea and to create an impressive presentation. Heeseman, grade 12, spoke

about the challenge: "having a working prototype, like the Exo Controller needs to have, is definitely just as stressful as our team needing a really good presentation". He continued to comment on how no matter how good an idea is, it can not pass if the presentation isn't "strong".

So what happens if our Squan engineers design the prototypes and deliver a strong presentation? The winning prize is getting to meet inventor QVC personality, and Shark Tank panelist Lori Grein er! Not only will the winners meet Greiner, bu work with her to develop their idea. The winne additionally works with a patent lawyer to paten their idea; ultimately, if their idea is approved, the school will then receive a grant to go towards en couraging students to take part in projects like this

The students on the final competing team were recognized at the Manasquan Board of Educa tion meeting on Tuesday, October 17th, where the presented their ideas to prepare for their actua presentation about a week later.

On Sunday, October 15 Manasquan High School surfers spent a long day at Spring Lake beach, competing in the National Scholastic Surfing Association championship for over ten hours against 18 other school from New York and New Jersey, only to leave disappointed.

They finished second, only two points behind Ocean City High School.

Two days later, however, the scores were recalculated, the result was reversed, and disappointment was replaced with joy. The revised scoring earned MHS the victory in the National Scholastic Surf Assosication State Championship competition, Squan's 4th consecutive crown.

Mr. Coppola announced the turnaround to the school during 2nd block on Wednesday, October 18, congratulating the surfers on their fine achievement.

Coach Buss, however, deserves credit also for bringing the error to the attention of the state.



Buss reviewed the scoring, knowing that two points in a surf competition is like a fraction of an inch in football. He scrutinized all of the results from the ten-hour competition, and discovered six points earned by Squan in one of the competitions were not added into the final tally. When coaches, and administrators, along with the NSSA director, discussed the error and credited the six points to Squan the Warriors were the winners.

Continuing the tradition of not only tean success but outstanding individual success a well, two surfers earned their own state champi onships. Sophomore Morgan Iglay earned individ ual girls state champion, repeating the feat from last year. And Keaton Fortney, a junior, won th longboard competition.
