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

On Thursday, December 9, Molly and Eddie received more good news: their project made the cut in the "Samsung Solve for Tomorrow" competition, placeing in the top 100 in the nation.

er and STEAM Tank coordinator, had entered the project with Samsung's competition.



to the finals with their designs. For the past six years, Mrs. Edwards has helped students participate in the STEAM Tank challenge. She explained that it is not easy to come up with exciting and new ideas. She said a lot of ideas have been done in order to prevent issues, but to be able to create a more effective method for solving a pressing issue, that is what gets you points in the books of engineers and scientists around the world.

Mollie and Eddie's design is a bamboo mat that reflects the sunlight back into the atmosphere as opposed to being absorbed in the ocean. By creating large mounds of these and placing them throughout the ocean, much of the sunlight's effects on the ocean can be reflected back into the atmosphere.

Mollie and Eddie wanted to use this opportunity to address some ongoing problems with our planet today, "We wanted to address the large increase of climate change as well as the

melting ice caps, which is resulting in a decrease in the earths albedo." Mollie explained. Although disappointed that they didn't place higher in the STEAM TANK competition, they were still satisfied with the Sustainability Award.

The build wasn't completely perfect because of a few small errors we made when planning," Eddie said. "But besides that we were confident walking in."

"The only problem," said Mrs. Edwards, "is that Mollie and Ed had a design that will take a while to fully develop, and on the rubric, you are graded on how fast the idea could be created."

Mollie and Eddie decided to address climate change, and they did so by using a very fast and easy growing resource, which is what earned them recognition for their idea. To see that such an easy idea can be seen as a great improvement over other methods of solving these problems is inspiring, to say the least.

So Mollie and Eddie remain alive in the Samsung Solve for Tomorrow Challenge, and we can't wait to here how they do. Keep inspiring!

Hazing scandal shuts down Wall football; Squan reschedules with Shore Regional

On December 15th, NJ.com reported that 7 kids attending Wall High School were suspended for 10 days regarding hazing allegations.

"The dates of the suspensions ranged from November 10 - November 24," according to the news outlet, which was just after the scandal first came to light.

allegations Hazing were officially confirmed on November 17th as Wall Township Board of Education President Ralph Addonizio, when he stated. "Upon becoming aware of the allegation, we immediately contacted the appropriate authorities. There's a pending investigation, and the school district is cooperating fully. We cannot comment further on a pending investigation of a student matter."

Although the Board President failed to explain the actual incidents, he did confirm that the rumors were true.



What we do know is that the hazing involved older players on the football team, swarming and attempting to pin down a younger player in the locker room. A video of the incident circulated, and viewers could hear pleas to stop in the background.

As a result of the video, the Wall football team was shut down in early November. They forfeited a state playoff game, and cancelled the annual Thanksgiving game with Squan.

Unrelated to the hazing allegations, multiple female students accused other football players of sexual assault, further dragging down the team. Supposedly this unidentified juvenile player assaulted two girls at

one party and more have also come out with their stories of assault. However, these rumors have not been confirmed.

"District and high school decision makers take the safety of our students and staff very seriously," Superintendent Tracy Handerhan announced. "There is no greater priority." With this statement, it was not long before the Thanksgiving game was cancelled.

Though the cancellation was a disappointment to many players and community members, the Warriors ended up winning an exciting game against Shore Regional, Wall's replacement, to end the season.

When Katie was asked about the success of the blood drive compared to what was expected, she was very happy with the outcome.

"Yes, I would definitely say it was more of a success than I thought it would be. We were able to raise over 50 pints! We also had a full roster going into the drive, which is pretty hard to do," Katie had said.

Last year's organizer of the annual blood drive, Senior Juliet Nuccio gives us some statistics: "You save 3 lives every time you donate blood." She also enlightened us with information regarding the negative effects Covid-19 has made on blood banks nation-wide. Almost every blood bank I the country is severely depleted and in desperate need of donations.

Even though more students wanted to donate blood, medics are very selective over whose blood they decide to take; there is reason behind that. It is necessary that the blood that is donated is in tip-top shape. This rule is put in place not only for the people receiving blood but those donating it. According to Mrs. Kozic, anyone with anemia is not eligible to give blood because of the aftereffects. It's possible

that this person could pass out or be drowsy for the rest of the day. Similarly, you must be 17 and weigh at least 120 pounds to safely donate blood. These requirements limited the number people donating.

Katie encourages everyone to donate blood if applicable, and the world needs in now more than ever.

According to Katie, "Over 90% of people who are eligible to donate do not, there's always a need for donors, especially since Red Cross is experiencing the worst blood shortage in over a decade due to the pandemic."

The people who chose to donate blood this November made more of an impact than they could even imagine. So many lives were saved solely because of the blood obtained from the MHS 2021 blood drive. Everyone should be urging one another to get up, get out, and make a difference.




ever end." From the opening kickoff, the Squan defense came out hot holding Shore
