

## NO MASK MARCH!

This upcoming week the NJ mask mandate will be lifted... and excitement is in the air for students and teachers at Manasquan High school!

Gov. Murphy announced that masks will not be required for schools starting on Monday, March 7, 2022. He also said that although they aren't required, people should still take proper requirement, and wear a mask if desired.

According to NJ.com. officials mentioned that it is important to prevent possible bullying if a student wishes to wear a mask. The goal is to not let any child feel put down or different for wearing a face mask.

Following the governor's announcement, an email sent out by MHS superintendant Dr. Kaysan explained the new policies our school will be tak-

ing. Facemasks will be optional for students. If a student tests positive for COVID-19, they will continue to quarantine for 5 days (as presently).

However, when the school contact traces, any close contacts will no longer be required to quarantine. Instead, parents may quarantine their child if they choose, but it's not required. with other students.

School nurses will follow original protocols and continue to evaluate students who show symptoms of illness. The MHS cafeterias will also be returning to normal seating.






