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Support from Alumni and Community Helps Fund New Fields

This year, Manasquan High School was lucky enough to be granted with a brand new football field. The project includes new sod on the football field, goal posts, a press box, a snack stand, and a totally new look for the all-purpose field behind the school. It was joint funded by the Manasquan BOE and the Manasquan Endowment Association. The new press box, called the Manasquan Savings Press Box, was funded almost completely by the Manasquan Savings Bank.

Mr. Cahill, MHS's Athletic Director, is excited about the new renovations: "It's great to have a facility where all athletes can enjoy home games. It gives our campus a better feel."

So far, we've successfully hosted three football games on the new sod. Manasquan's players, fans and members of the community already love it. Boys' and girls' soccer have both also played on the new turf extensively, and will hopefully continue to be used for other sports. The renovations are set to be completed November 24th, in time for this year's Thanksgiving football game versus Wall. The work has been on schedule thus far, and everything is going well.

Attempts to renovate the fields and athletic complex have been proposed for the past three years, but each were shot down by taxpayer referendums. Before the work, the field was in a poor state and the shack was falling into a state of disrepair. Now, it's brand-new



and looking great.

Renovations were finally pushed through with the help of the Manasquan Endowment Association and the Manasquan BOE. In a Faculty Meeting held on September 28th, Mr. Coppola said that the work was "largely due" to the help of the Manasquan Endowment Association, and that he's appreciative of their help.

The Manasquan Endowment Association is an organization headed by Manasquan alumni, and it's dedicated to giving back to the school. They're almost completely to thank for the new developments of our athletic complex.



Besides the athletic complex, the Endowment Association also organized the first Alumni Day, held on Saturday, October 15th, when the boys soccer team and football team helped to celebrate with MHS victories.

MHS Drama Club will perform *Museum*, which will be presented in the Jack Nicholson Theatre on November 3rd, 4th, and 5th. Tickets will be \$8 for students and \$10 for adults.

Museum, written by Tina Howe, has had a lengthy history. It premiered on April 19th, 1976, at the Los Angeles Actor's Theatre, and was performed Off-Broadway in 1978. The play fell from notoriety, but picked up traction in the early 2000s, as it was performed through workshops and table reads. It came back to audiences when it was performed at Villanova in 2012, and was directed by Joanne Rotté.

MHS Drama Club director Mr. Weisert is optimistic about the show: "It's been on my radar for years. It's an interesting comedy that has some dramatic moments."

The play is meant to poke fun at art, and how it is perceived by many different groups, and thus takes the viewer through roughly an hour and a half of conversations that go on in the museum, as the audience "people-watches" the actors. In particular, the show is likely to attract artistic students. Mr. Weisert added, "Being an artist in music it also interests me because I spend a lot of time in the MOMA" (Museum of Modern Art).

MaryGrace Iorio, a senior, who plays Mrs. Salt and Lillian, said "The fact that I get to play more than one character is very exciting, and I also get to do a lot

Museum features a large cast of characters, quite literally. When Howe created the play, it had forty roles that needed to be filled, and instead of twenty people taking on two roles, forty people were cast to play the roles of the rotating cast. The Drama Club, however, will be using the method of doubling up the roles for their production, as they have 25 people in their play.

Some people who will be performing double roles will be MaryGrace Iorio, Sarah Curtis, and Dylan Scott. Others who have a singular role are Adam Dayton, Brendan Gillespie, and Erin Mc-Bride.

Sarah Curtis, a sophomore, plays Carol and Gilda Norris. She is very passionate about the preparation for her performance, as she is running through her line and is working on memorizing the cues for her lines. She said, "It's less about knowing what you say, and more about knowing who you are as the character," as she improves on her methods for doubling, learning about each of her character's personalities.

Adam Dayton, a senior, plays The Guard, said, "I'm looking forward to being on stage in full costume" and that the play is "going to be fun, so totally come out and see it!" This will be his seventh school production.

Drama Club president Chris Heilos, who is also the stage manager for the production, said that he's looking forward to working with the cast, to be spending time with them, and is excited to see how the play turns out.

of the Zaporozhian Cossacks to Sultan Mehmed IV of the Ottoman Empire", which was filled with insults and other slights against the upperclassmen.

Some had emerged from dirt path behind the softball field, in the back of a black pickup truck, blasting music. It was a sight to behold, with the sophomores decked out in red, white, and blue, and in one case, a banana costume.

Brian Heine, the sophomore in the banana costume, who said that "the sophomores had made an alliance with the juniors, but we backstabbed them."

For the 5th year in a row, the Health Career Academy is hosting a blood drive at Manasquan High School! Each year the event takes place in the gym and the Dynamics of Health Careers class, taught by Mrs. Kozic, is in charge of creating a theme and organizing the whole day.

The students are responsible for reaching out to their peers and getting them to participate, but according to senior Declan Reichey, who was in the class last year, "It's not that hard getting people to donate blood when it gets them out of class."

Last year the blood drive was the most successful in Manasquan High School history and was also given the recognition of the #1 Blood Drive in Monmouth County. The Health Careers Academy and Manasquan High School was honored at a Lakewood Blue Claws game during the summer. They even got to throw the first pitch! MHS senior George McCormack is part of the Health Ca-

reers Academy and belonged to the Dynamics of Health Careers class last fall. George explains the process of giving blood does not hurt, it just takes a long time and he intends of giving blood again this year. However, the best part of the day for George was getting to work with phlebotomists, the people who take your blood. He expressed how this is something he enjoys and how the blood drive gives him opportunities to explore his future, "I like taking care of people, it's something I'm interested in and want to do with my life".

Some students are veterans at donating blood, like senior Colleen Hessinger, who has participated since sophomore year when she was first eligible. Colleen is a member of the Health Careers Academy and like George is very interested in pursuing a future in medicine and health. Once



The more prepared you are, the better you will feel after". She also recommended to sports players not to donate on days when you have games or competition.



In her spare time, Ms. Saliski enjoys shopping and watching sports; her favorite sport to watch is base-





For seniors the start of the school year can be a stressful one. For seniors many must begin their college application process just as the school year is about to start. A process that can put stress upon seniors just as they are getting used to a new school year. This process is what most seniors go through and Guidance wants to help you through it with some key pieces of advice.

Before you can even start the application process it is important that not only you research the schools you are interested in, but also that if you can go and visit the schools. When visiting schools, you should try to keep an open mind. You never know what you might like. You should give it a fair chance. One thing you should do while visiting the schools is talk to the students on campus. You can find out information and get a good sense of the school you may not have gotten from going on their website at home.

Head of the guidance department and Dean of Students Sean Mc-Carthy explained, "One of the best things students could do for them-

selves during this process is to relax, don't panic, and stay sane."

Mr. McCarthy adds that there are some things you are going to want to find out the school that normally wouldn't vou think of, like finding out about the social life at the school, housing and food, and whether or not you can graduate in four years or not. Explaining why students should find out those kind of information Mr. Mc-Carthy says, "Students go to school and after the first week of school the student finds out most people go home on the weekends. That would have been something you would want

to know ahead of time, which might have affected your decision," adding that there you really should research the social life on campus before making a decision of any school.

When getting started on finalizing your list of schools there are a few key points Guidance thinks you should keep in mind. 

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Taking A Stand By Sitting Down

Before each and every sporting event in the United States, we hear the home stadium's speakers ring out, "Please rise and remove your hats for the singing of our national anthem." Up until now, this command was never questioned. The fans in the audience and the players on the field obeyed this message promptly and once the anthem concluded, the game began. While the anthem was originally a brief sign of nationalism, it has now become the center of controversy.

Colin Kaepernick, quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers listed second on the team's depth chart, recently made headlines as he sat alone on the bench during the playing of our country's national anthem before a preseason game in Levi's Stadium. He was not injured. He was not ill. He was making a protest.


Kaepernick, now in his sixth NFL season, is speaking out against what he describes as the poor treatment of African Americans and minorities who live in the United States. When NFL Media caught up with the QB after the preseason game versus the Green Bay Packers, Kaepernick explained, "I am not going to stand up to show pride in a flag for a country that oppresses black people and

people of color," and went on to say, "There are bodies in the street and people getting paid leave and getting away with murder."

Several other high profile athletes have joined Kaepernick in protest during the national anthem. Eric Reid, teammate of the controversial guarterback, knelt beside Colin Kaepernick during the playing of the anthem before the final preseason game on the 49ers schedule. Shortly after, more and more players around the league followed suit. Some of the players who protested the national anthem on September 11[™], the opening week of professional football and also the 15th anniversary of one of the biggest tragedies in United States history, include the Chiefs All-Pro cor-




49ers safety Eric Reid knelt along side Colin Kaepernick during the playing of the national anthem before a home game.

nerback Marcus Peters, Dolphins running back Arian Foster, and Los Angeles Rams players Kenny Britt and Robert Quinn.

With the increase in support for Kaepernick on the field, the story has become one of the focal points of the 2016 NFL season. The protests have been covered daily by news and radio networks, and nearly everyone has weighed in on the situation. Dallas Cowboys billionaire owner Jerry Jones said in an interview with local radio station KRLD-FM that he and his team "strongly, strongly support the flag." Even presidential candidate Donald Trump weighed in with his view on Kaepernick's protests, stating, "I have followed it, and I think it's personally not a good thing. I think it's a terrible thing," and continued with, "maybe he should find a country that works better for him."

Though Kaepernick has received a great amount of criticism, he has achieved his goal of publicizing his issue with the treatment of minorities in the United States. His jersey has become the number one selling jersey on www.nflshop.com, the NFL's official merchandise retailer. Per NFL rules, a player gets about two thirds of the profit from each of his jersey sales, which means Colin Kaepernick is in for a big payday. In order to continue his support for his cause, he announced on his Instagram account that he will be donating all of the proceeds from the sales back into the communities in need.

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Over the previous month, news coverage has been divided over a letter sent to incoming freshmen by the University of Chicago. The letter states that the school "does not support so-called 'trigger warnings'" and that students should get comfortable getting uncomfortable. What the letter highlights, though, is a growing divide between safe-space proponents and those who staunchly oppose it. As much as the news media loves to portray this issue as democrat vs. republican, in truth the issue has become moderate democrats vs. staunch liberal democrats, with most of these battles taking place on northeast, rich, democrat-leaning campuses.

"Trigger warnings" are warnings issued before potentially traumatizing content is shown to students. Psychology Today's Editor in Chief Hara Estroff Marano disagrees with the use of trigger warnings, writing that "Step by well-meaning step, colleges are being transformed into something more akin to mental health wards than citadels of learning". She argues that kids these days are too fragile: "Angst has long afflicted those of college age; but once it




Students at the University of Chicago protest sexual assault.

had been an intellectual, existential cast. Now it is primarily emotional. By some psychic sleight, common life dilemmas have become mental disorders". She blames this issue on a multitude of issues, including the 21st century academic pressure and prevalence of binge-drinking on campuses.

The University of Chicago sought to solve this issue by getting rid of the trigger warnings and safe spaces that made students so coddled in the first place. This is the right solution. According to the American College Counseling Association, nearly all member schools reported higher

instances of students with severe psychological problems. In 2014, a survey by the American College Health Association reported that 54% of college students had reported they felt overwhelming anxiety in the past 12 perfect. Students seem to be reporting more emotional crises, seem more fragile, and this has certainly changed the way the universities thev attend have interacted with them, by introducing safe spaces and trigger warnings.

However, instead of simply just taking away safe spaces and trigger warnings, colleges should introduce more mental health centers for students. If the internet age is not suited for the 21st century, stressed student, why not have help available away for them?

It is one of the only plausible solutions put forward by colleges and mental health experts today. But, it probably won't be put into action- both sides are staunchly opposed to compromise, all at the expense of the student. In the 60 years since the American College Counseling Asso-

ciation has started collecting data, the rate of student suicides has increased 5-fold. It will probably take another 60 before both sides of this debate will come to agreement.

with his fresh new haircut that isn't half as tall as the old one. Personally, I'm glad to see it gone. It feels less threatening around the pyrotechnics he tends to use.



Gary Johnson, Electoral College, and The Problem With Third Parties in America



Most polls have Gary Johnson, the Libertarian Party nominee, between five and ten percent. Jill Stein, the Green Party nomiee, remains at about two percent. The only time third parties have done this well in polls was when Ross Perot ran in 1992 and at one point was polling 39%, compared to Clinton's 25% and Bush's 31%.

Even with such success, it did not make a real difference, as he spiral until earning 19% of the popular vote in the election. With nearly one in five Americans supporting Perot, he should have gotten 102 of the 538 electoral college votes.

Yet, he did not get a single one.

This is the inherent problem with American third parties. The American electoral system has a winner take all system: if you win a state, you gain all of its electoral votes.

As John F. Biddy said "There

is no reward for second place".

For this reason, third parties will always have difficulty gaining electoral votes over the two signifigantly larger major parties. Even when many are disappointed by their choices, like Trump and Clinton, choosing to vote for a third party is only slightly better than not voting at all. Gamblers who bet on the winner of the election sight Johnson's chances of winning at less than 0.01 percent.

Even with feverish dreams of starting a revolution and getting everyone to vote for a third party, it would be almost impossible to orchestrate. The electoral college, in its current form, punishes politicans with specific messages and support ers spread out among the country.

The electoral college does not favor support that is spread about, but rather highly concentrated groups of people backing a single candidate. By winning only a few key states, someone could be President with just 22% of the popular vote. That would be 270 electoral votes. Flashback to Perot: only three points off, 270 votes shy.

As you are starting to see, the electoral college is a broken system, which is only now being realized as more people consider third parties.

This sytem of electing politicans has always been somewhat questionable. The college was origianally created when America just gained independence from Britian. It was used as a way to let the people speak, but prevent uneducated citizens from making a poor choice. 250 years later, we still have the electoral college voting for us.



Vermin Supreme, a man that wears a boot on his head, has had as many electroal votes as Ross Perot.

The Exclusive (Electoral) College Parties

One of the most frequently suggested solutions to the electoral college is to depend solely on popular vote. While this would eliminate some issues, such as winning with less than a quarter of the country's support, it's still not perfect. Third parties would have a slighly better chance of winning, but it would still require a miracle.

Proportional representation, in many ways, is a better system. Put simply, if a party gets 30% of the votes, that party gets 30% of the seats available. This system is used by over 80 countries, spread across every continent, and is the gold standard of democracy in Europe.

It's main benefit would be that everyone's vote really is making a difference. Voting for Johnson or Stein is no longer wasting a vote. It no longer leaves you with two unappealing candidates. Support for lesser-known parties will also grow as they would then have *some* level of representation.

With our current system, every state must have a minmum of three electoral votes, so states like Wyoming, which technically should only have one, now have three. And states like California, that should have 65, are moved down to 55. Rhode Island has twice as much representation than it should have, while California has 4/5 of its proper representation. By winning these radically over-represented states, canditates can become president with 22% of the nations support.

Making every percent matter would mean that candidates would have to care about every state




Electoral representation is not proportional to the amount of eleigible voters in each state. If it was, representation would equal 100%. Here are

and every vote. When we vote, the point is to make a difference and hav e our voices heard, so why not have a system that actually supports that? Some people will stop this system dead in its tracks, citing that it's not in the Constitution, but consider this: the Constitution was written over two centuries ago. In 1776, the electoral college was a mediocre system when we only had a handful of states. Now we have 50 states to account for. It may be time for an update.

With the election being right around the corner, many will likley forget about this issue after November. That's a huge obstacle. With something this important, bringing it up once every four years really hampers the credibility of any argument. If instuting proportional representation is something that is really wanted, this needs to be psuhed all year long.

Another school year calls for new technology to be introduced into the school system. For the past year, students and teachers alike have been using OneNote, but this year, there's a new application that's being used – Canvas. It's a sudden change from OneNote, in terms of style and ease of use, but it has the same, if not better, kind of accessibility that OneNote has, or lacks.

Created by Instructure, and launched in 2011, Canvas has been implemented into Manasquan's learning system this fall, which has drawn both positive and negative feedback from both students and teachers alike.

Ms. Kukoda, who is the Technology Integration coach, had a large part in implementing Canvas into Manasquan High School. "Mr. Place, who is the Director of Technology, wanted to find an LMS (Learning Management System) that would be beneficial to various classrooms," she said.

Since many colleges, especially Ivy Leagues, use Canvas, exposing students who are still in high school to the application is the next logical step in working to prepare college-bound students for their next level of education.

On the subject of OneNote, Ms. Kukoda admitted that: "The goal in the long run is for classrooms to use OneNote and Canvas together." Each program has something the other doesn't, which makes it a good idea to use them in tandem, because they have the ability to complement each other.

Visually, "OneNote is a binder," Ms. Kukoda explained, "whereas Canvas is more of a planner." She went on to elaborate, saying that OneNote is more experimental, and it allows the students to house their notes, while in contrast, Canvas is where students are more rigid in what they do, as it allows them to submit homework and other assignments.

There are certainly people who have ranges of opinions – from despising Canvas with a burning passion, thinking it's useful but has some downsides, remaining decidedly neutral about the whole affair, or believing that it's much easier to use.

Colleen Hessinger, a senior, is very passionate about OneNote. "You don't have to save," she said, which makes it much more convenient than Canvas, because the work typed into the submission boxes isn't saved. OneNote is "so much easier to use, and there's so much going on in Canvas, with more steps than needed."

Seniors Kelli Finn and Tilly Marks are of the second group of



opinions – believing it's useful but in need of improvements.

"It's helpful for certain classes, but for others, it seems like the teachers struggle to use it, and it's more of a nuisance than a helpful educational tool," Kelli remarked.

Tilly said that, "It's useful, but I hate when the whole class is using Canvas, and then the internet goes down, and you can't proceed with class."

Some classes find themselves heavily reliant upon Canvas, which can cause things to go awry when there is something to be shown online but there is no internet that can be used to proceed with the lesson. Such is Mr. Fagen's AP Human Geography class, which runs solely on content based in Canvas.

"I like it, but there's still work to be done. It's a learning process," Mr. Fagen said. In the beginning of the school year, Mr. Fagen's tablet had been unable to connect to the internet. This impeded the class's ability to learn because all the content had been unreachable and textbooks hadn't been delivered yet. Mr. Fagen appreciates having the advantage of being able to access content online – if students happen to leave a document at home they can easily pull it up online.

But a pen and paper has always done the job, and done it well. "People like writing on paper, and



I prefer it," Mr. Fagen added, "but moving forward is just a matter of getting used to Canvas and sticking with it."


Others, such as Mr. Harvey's AP English Literature class, doesn't use it at all. "It's not user friendly – I like OneNote better for English," Mr. Harvey said. He thinks Canvas is better suited for online classes, because it is a one-stop shop for all the needs of online students – from ways to access Powerpoints and notes, to ways to take tests and quizzes.

"It should be easier to use, and it should make documents look how they really are, in regards to sizing and space, they're all wackedout," Mr. Harvey added. He also thinks that technology is "improved enough, but we should really be working on perfecting and using what we already have, before changing to something else."

Canvas most certainly wins points for ease of access – simply login when connected to internet, and everything is there - and in all the resources it's able to provide for its students, but OneNote has the leg up when it comes to usability and design – much more simplified and streamlined than Canvas.

When asked how Manasquan can further improve the applications and programs it uses to have better learning experiences, Ms. Kukoda responded optimistically: "To be able to use these resources to take the student beyond the classroom – to research and find information directly related to class content is incredible." Ms. Kukoda believes that the use of OneNote and Canvas together can be extremely helpful to students.

So whether or not students like Canvas, it is Manasquan's way to further prepare them for college and future jobs. It's here to stay for the foreseeable future, and that means students and teachers alike will have to make their peace with Canvas, and either work with it, or work their way around it.

You most likely remember the head-bopping, catchy, breakup tune of the early 2000s "Leave (Get Out)" by JoJo. You may also remember the song "Too Little Too Late", and remember JoJo when she starred in such films as 2006's *Aquamarine* and *RV*. But beyond that you may not remember her. Simply because she dropped off the map.

A little known fact is that Joanna "JoJo" Levesque was engaged in a legal battle with her record label, Blackground Records, first in 2009, and then again during the second half of 2013, as JoJo claimed that Blackground Records had done irreparable damage to her career by constantly putting off the release of her albums.

Amid the legal action, JoJo was still able to release music – a handful of EPs and mixtapes from 2006 through 2012. But none of it was at the level she had wanted it to be – it wasn't an album release. She left Blackground Records in 2013, after they finally reached a settlement outside of court, and since 2014, has been signed with Atlantic Records.

However, JoJo has been releasing music, albeit under the radar, throughout the past ten years. Since 2006, she has released EPs such as *#LoveJo*, *III*.,

and *#LoveJo2*, and mixtapes such as *Can't Take That Away From Me* and $Agáp\bar{e}$, previous to the culmination of the ten-year wait of her *Mad Love*. album release on October 14th, 2016.

III., otherwise known as JoJo's "Tringle" – a trio of three singles – was released on August 20th, 2015, and pushed her back into mainstream media. With the songs, "When Love Hurts", "Save My Soul", and "Say Love", JoJo introduced her listeners into a new era of hers – one that would precede the wait for an album ten years overdue.

JoJo's comeback, through the trials and tribulations of the past, showcase just how determined and diligent she is. She has maintained her fan-base through periods of difficulty and inaction, and commands their respect with how open and honest she is about her life, and the struggles that have come along with it. Because of these challenges, her sound is more mature than it had been in previous years, but that comes with the territory of growing up.

Mad Love. is an album that is rooted in many different genres. Although she had always been categorized as a pop and R&B singer, JoJo's album reflects the kinds of music she grew up listening to and still loves – hip-hop and soul. But among the tracks lay dance anthems, acoustics, and songs about freedom and self-worth.

These roots are found in not only the promotional singles, but the rest of the album as well. The title track, "Mad Love.", delves into JoJo's soul background, with soaring riffs and a swelling orchestra backing her vocals.

"Music.", another of Jo-Jo's songs, is acoustic, with only her vocals and a piano in the background. It is a brutally honest opening track, and though it doesn't set the tone for the whole album, it instead reveals JoJo's passion for music and it is dedicated to her parents. It tells her audience of her upbringing, and how even through hardship, she was able to overcome challenges because of music.

The release was met with largely positive feedback, with a majority of five-star reviews on iTunes, and at numbers one and two on the iTunes chart in the first day of its release.

JoJo's dedication to her craft has certainly paid off, as each track is able to pull from different genres and explores her versatility with both sound and vocals. JoJo has returned to the mainstream with more maturity, expertise and experience, and with an album title worthy of the meaning behind it. 

What's the Verdict? Suicide Squad Popular and Fun, but Lackluster Overall

Suicide Squad was one of the most anticipated

movies of the summer. It was expected to be a hit action movie that included a star-studded cast with Will Smith as Deadshot, Margot Robbie as Harley Quinn, and Jared Leto as the revamped Joker. While it broke box office records upon release, the film itself was a major disappointment.

Suicide Squad is unlike the normal superhero movies that we see being released year after year. The film is centered around the villains of the DC Universe, who are brought together by Amanda Waller, played by Viola Davis, and the United States Government as a weapon to use against terror. The team of anti-heroes consists of Deadshot (Will Smith), Harley Quinn (Margot Robbie), former Los Angeles gang member El Diablo (Jay Hernandez), edgy thief Captain Boomerang (Jai Courtney), Killer Croc (Adewale Akinnuoye-Agbaje), and special assassin Slipknot (Adam Beach). These criminals have all been caught and captured, and now they are being forced to serve

the needs of the US Government in order to gain an inkling of freedom.

The team of super villains is kept under control by Rick Flag, a colonel in the US Army, and trained Japanese warrior Katana. Each member of the Suicide Squad also has been equipped with a microscopic bomb capable of killing any one of them who decides not to follow the orders of Colonel Flag.

While the set of characters and concept appears to be solid, the execution was unsatisfactory. Right off the bat, we are introduced to all of the members of the team and given a small amount of background thanks to a freeze frame and a written description, but the writers assume that this is an adequate amount of character development, which is clearly untrue. I often found myself wondering why Captain Boomerang was even there, and I was extremely surprised to find out that The Joker would only appear on screen for about 15 total minutes.

The poor development of each character did not hold back Will Smith or Margot Robbie however, both of whom delivered fantastic performances. Will Smith as Deadshot became the most likeable character in the entire film. He quickly took the role as the leader of the bad guys and kept everyone together in order to save the plan-

et just so he could have the chance to be reunited with his daughter.

Margot Robbie also played Harley Quinn fantastically. Quinn, a former doctor blinded by her love for The Joker, is another key member of the Suicide Squad. She provides the wild side that distracts the others from their ultimate goal, while Deadshot remains focused. Smith and Robbie put on a great show despite bad writing, and it is one of the best parts of the entire film.

I would've loved to review the newest rendition of The Joker, but like I said, his lack of presence in the movie makes it impossible to do so. Fans around the world expected to see a lot of the new Joker on the screen, yet there were only bits and pieces of weird cutscenes featuring Jared Leto's creepy method acting.

Yet another weak point of the film was the antagonist that the Suicide Squad is up against. Enchantress, played by Cara Delevingne, is an archae-

iPhone 7: Not Worth Camping Overnight For

Apple's new iPhone was released September 7th, 2016, and thus far it's gotten mostly positive responses. Plus, Apple stock has risen. So, it must be a huge success, right? Not necessarily. Some, including myself, would say the phone is a desperate attempt to mix things up and has only gone downhill.

The main issue I take up with the new phone is the removal of the headphone jack. That makes music almost exclusively available through Bluetooth, though a new adapter allows you to plug in headphones and auxiliary cords. The adapter is large and not as easy to carry as the headphones themselves would've been. If you don't want to deal with the adapter, you have to purchase the Bluetooth headphones, called AirPods, that have a \$160 price tag. And if you want to keep using your wired headphones while you charge, the adapter will cost you about \$40. Not satisfied with AirPods or an adapter, and want to buy higher class wireless headphones? Well, the prices are going to skyrocket, so jump on them while you can.

ologist who stumbled upon an interesting artifact in a cave. When the ancient rock was broken, it releases a spirit which possesses Dr. June Moone, who then turns into an extremely powerful witch. The US Government believes they can control this spirit, yet Enchantress prevails as the enemy as she attempts to take over the world. If that's not the corniest, lamest villain, then I don't know what is.

However, there were some other positives to be taken out of this movie. The soundtrack, for example, contains songs by popular artists such as Action Bronson, Eminem, G-Eazy, Twenty-One pilots, and Skrillex, which headphone jack leaves is that the iPhone 7 is now "water resistant". Note that they said "water resistant" and not "water proof". This is likely an effort to cover themselves legally, but it could also imply that you're not going to want to go swimming with your phone anytime soon. Stick to the LifeProofs, if you want to be truly waterproof. Of course, they're not free, and a LifeProof iPhone 7 case will likely wrack up an \$80 bill.

The iPhone 7's only non-questionable advantage is its lack of competition. What else can you buy? The Samsung Galaxy Note 7 had battery issues where some phones' batteries overheat and explode. That's right, this phone had a chance of killing you. So, the phone was taken off of the market and production permanently halted. That puts Apple's main competitor, Samsung, on the sidelines this year. Microsoft hasn't released a new Nokia this year, so they likely won't be a player in Apple's sales. In fact, they recently announced they're only releasing one more phone before officially shut-

ting down Nokia itself. The only edge any other smartphones have on the iPhone is security, and that's only really a factor for Blackberries.

As for specifications, the iPhone 7 is the same size as the iPhone 6 and only has a slightly brighter screen. Its battery life is reportedly unimpressive; though the camera quality has gotten even better than last year, a major selling point for iPhones. It seems likely that major specification/operating changes will some in iPhone 8 or 7s.

My conclusion? Wait until next year. You can suffer with an iPhone 6s for another year or so, I know I am. The slight changes ar-

en't worth the \$700 price. Or, if you're really desperate, you can wait for Samsung to release a new Note, or buy the Galaxy S7.

are not exactly my cup of tea, but the songs blend well with the action in the film, which brings me to another point.

If you're simply a fan of pure action, you might be interested in picking up this movie when it's available for rental. The final battle of the film is very well put together from a cinematic standpoint, and all of the fight scenes contain great camera angles and special effects.

Overall, I'd recommend passing on this film. The producers had all the pieces in order to make this movie great, yet they could not put the puzzle together correctly. The poor writing and lack of character development overshadowed the positives of the movie, making *Suicide Squad* not worth your time or money.




that her name was not up on the screen during the "In Memoriam" segment.


