experiences this week.





Wrestlers Wrap Up Successful Season!

MHS wrestling ended the season on Tuesday, April 20th with an exciting victory over Manchester High School.

"I lost my voice from screaming so much," MHS teacher Mrs. Edward said.

The season-ending match was not for a championship, but it meant a lot to the team. With a 4-4 record in Shore Conference competition, they were determined to complete the season with a record above .500 for the first time in 15 years.

The match was hard fought. Junior Jake Edwards pinned his opponent in the 145lb weight class, and seniors Jay Hilla and Peter Berlin also pinned in their final appearances for Squan Wrestling.

Another senior, Shayne Leddy, who joined the team for the first time this year, lost a heartbreaker as his opponent earned two points for the victory in the closing seconds, perhaps after the final tick of the clock according to the Manasquan side.

So the match, and the winning record for the season, came down to the final bout, featuring senior Orlando Osorio. The Warriors, and the home crowd in the MHS gym, were screaming. Squan trailed Manchester by a score of 34-33, so Orlando had to win.

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Warrior Baseball Start off Season 0-2, Looks to Bounce Back Against RBC

After a perfect preseason for Manasquan High School's baseball team with wins over Holmdel, Manchester, Barnegat, and Middletown North, the Warriors hit a bump in the road to start off the season 0-2.

Per Shore Sports Network, the Warriors were projected to finish last in in the Class B North Division, with St. John Vianney, Wall, Colts Neck, Red Bank Regional, Matawan, Freehold Boro, and Neptune all picked to finish ahead of them. A young roster, the Warriors have 0 returning starters from 2 years ago, as last season was cancelled due to the pandemic. The only three players with varsity innings are juniors Mike Antonucci and Patrick Woodford, and senior Dave Frost, who transferred from St. Rose. As a result, expectations from outsiders looking in were low, as the division was set to be extremely competitive.

However, the preseason indicated that the Warriors were ready to compete now instead of having a "transition year." As opening day approached, the Warriors starting lineup consisted of three sophomores, five juniors, and one senior. Junior Luca Marshall took the mound against the Ocean Spartans, picked to finish third in the Class A North Division. The Spartans returned 4 starters, all of whom being seniors.

In his first varsity start, Marshall struggled to find the zone. A lefty typically known for his command and break, first day jitters seemed to get to Marshall, as Ocean "welcomed him to big boy baseball' as they started the game with a hit, walk, and three run jack by senior shortstop Kevin Novobilisky, who tallied a game high three hits and four RBI's. The Stockton commit showed no signs of slowing down, hitting the ball hard in each at bat in the 11-1 route of the Warriors.

Nick Callano took the mound for the Spartans, ranked as one of the top preseason pitchers in the entire Shore Conference. The Salve Regina commit was nothing short of spectacular, tallying eleven strikeouts, one earned run, and just one walk in 5 innings pitched before the Spartans mercy-ruled the Warriors.

It was a game to forget for the Warriors, as nobody played well- nobody hit, multiple errors were made, and the pitchers allowed too many walks and hits. However, baseball is unique, as one day you can be horrible, and the next you can be spectacular. The Warriors were hoping for such a scenario in their next contest against the Monmouth Regional Falcons.

Senior righty David Smith took the hill against the Falcons, also making his first career varsity start. Similar to Marshall, Smith is known for his command and break, being able to throw his off-speed at any spot in any count.

Unlike the Ocean game, the Warriors started off hot, recording two runs in the first inning off on a double from Mike Antonucci, a few errors, and some walks from the Falcons senior starting pitcher Aiden Denton. The Falcons answered right back, however, posting two runs of their own. After Smith struck out the leadoff hitter on an outside fastball, he fell behind Denton and center fielder Christian Zito, allowing them to record hits. However, the second was a pitching duel, as Smith and Denton fanned multiple and escaped both innings with no runs allowed. The Falcons jumped on Smith in the third, as he fell behind once again. In the fourth inning, Smith fought back strong again, giving up zero, and was taken out after throwing 82 pitches.

Smith finished his day with 4 innings pitched, 6 hits, 5 runs, 4 earned runs, 3 walks, and 6 strikeouts, while Monmouth Regional starter Aiden Denton went 4.2 innings while giving up 4 hits, 4 runs, 2 earned runs, and 4 walks while striking out 7.

Junior left hander Zac Lavigna relieved Smith in the fifth in his first varsity pitching performance as well. After a smooth fifth in which he only surrendered one run, the Falcons broke the game wide open with a $5 \text{ run } 6^{\text{th}}$ inning off of a grand slam from sophomore catcher Joe Esposito. After the home run in which Esposito capped off a 4-4.7 RBI game, the Falcons drained any potential shot at a Warriors comeback, as they won by a score of 11-4.

Desperately in need of their first win in order to boost their confidence, the Warriors take on the Red Bank Catholic Caseys tomorrow, where junior Nicholas Galvan will make his varsity debut at pitching as well. Galvan, the younger brother of former Warriors star and University of Louisville pitcher Alex Galvan, Nicholas is known for his lively fastball and disgusting curveball. When able to locate, Galvan is a very dangerous pitcher, and if he is on, the Warriors will have a real shot of beating one of the best teams in the conference tomorrow.
