Society is a feat of its own. Students had to maintain an A average in all math classes taken at MHS, get a letter of recommendation, and write an essay on a given topic.






Squan Seniors Kiki Noe, Holden Becker and Rylie Eldridge Run the Phildelphia Marathon

For many people, running a marathon is a bucket list item, a goal that might take a lifetime to accomplish. Recently, three of Manasquan High School's very own seniors took on the challenge, and did it!

On Sunday, November 19, Holden Becker, Kiki Noe, and Rylie Eldridge ran the Philadelphia Marathon, completing it in five hours and thirty minutes! They can check that one off their bucket list.

The Philadelphia Marathon is an annual sporting event that has been held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on the third Sunday of November each year since 1954. It ranks among the top ten in the nation's largest marathons, with a course that is profession-

ally certified and over 30,000 runners, 60,000 spectators and 3,000 volunteers. The runners come from all 50 states, the District of Columbia and over 42

countries. In short, it's a big deal!

Their inspiration to run the race stared with Kiki. Her mom has run three marathons, so that motivated them to do it.

Kiki and Rylie had previously convinced a lot of other friends to run with them, but "Holden was the only one to follow through," Rylie explains.

To prepare for the race, the runners did some "minimal training," according to Rylie. Rylie says that she ran six miles per day on a consistent basis. Kiki

trained with a bunch of ten mile runs, and Holden had a bit of an advantage because he is a cross country runner for the school's team.

The morning of the race, the runners had to wake up bright and early to start their day. Rylie woke up at 3:45 AM and left her house at 4:30. Talk about early!On the shuttle bus on the way to the race, they agreed that they would stick together and run the race as a team.

"We were a little nervous for something bad to happen, but it was good and overall smooth sailing," Holden and Rylie said.

The first heat consisting of elite professional runners took off at 7am, followed by waves of runners every ten minutes. Kiki, Riley and Holden left at 7:30.

Along the way, the runners had plenty of support from fellow competitors and big crowds cheering them on.

Impressively, they ran most of the way, and only walked two and a half miles. "Miles 1-21 we were chilling, but after that it got a little intense," they said. To marathoners, that 20 mile mark is where you often "hit the wall".

The duration of the race is obviously very long, so

the runners had to push themselves and stay energized. Prior to the race, "we had to learn a lot about the fueling process," Holden remarks. "You are supposed to eat something every forty minutes." Since they didn't want to waste any time on eating. The runners tried something called "Gu's." Gu's are little capsules of pudding that you snap open and consume on the run. They are quick and easy to eat while on the move. "It was a pleasant surprise that we didn't want to throw those up because they actually tasted pretty good," Holden adds.

The aftermath of the race wasn't as fun as the actual thing. Rylie shares that "Each of our toes had their own blister, and stairs were very difficult the next day." The girls strongly showed up to school the following day, but Holden took the day off.

Overall, their experience was great! "We are all really happy that we did it now and proud to say that we ran a marathon at seventeen," Rylie revealed. She wants to continue running and hopes to someday complete the New York Marathon during or after college. Everyone felt very accomplished by the end of their race, and now they can say that they ran a marathon!



Hanukkah Foods: A Flavorful Journey

Surprisingly, most people don't know the meaning behind the fan favorite holiday—Hanukkah. The origin story of Hanukkah is based on events that took place in the Middle East more than 2000 years ago. Hanukkah, also known as the Festival of Lights, is a Jewish holiday that celebrates the ancient Jews' reclamation of their temple in Jerusalem after occupation by the Syrian-Greek empire.

As the story goes, the Jewish Maccabees reentered the temple and found only a tiny bit of oil—barely enough to burn their lamps for one day. Instead, the oil burned for eight days—a Hanukkah miracle.

Since Hanukkah typically falls in December, it's often considered the Jewish version of Christmas. But Hanukkah is a minor Jewish festival—far less significant than the Jewish High Holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Still, Hanukkah is a fun winter celebration—and it doesn't hurt that it's associated with lots of good food.

People that celebrate the holiday commemorate the holiday by playing games and eating delicious foods. Since oil is a

big part of the Hanukkah story, special foods prepared in oil are on the holiday table of many Jewish families.

Classic dishes like latkes (crisp potato pansufganiycakes) sweet ot (doughnuts), crunchy mandelbrot (almond bread), and flavorful *rugelach* (filled pastry) are favorites across the country. Some foods even coordinate traditional games with the played during this holiday, such as Gelt. Gelt refers to wrapped chocolate coins that are used to play dreidel, an established Hanukkah game. A dreidel is a top with four sides, each with a different Hebrew letter. Each letter represents a word in a Hebrew saying that means "a great miracle happened there" (referring to Israel, where the Hanukkah story took place).

Personally, my favorite Hanukkah food is Latkes. Dipping them in apple sauce contrasts the savory and crisp taste of the pancakes with a soft and sweet sauce. It's quite difficult to pick a favorite food to eat at this time, but some students around Manasquan made the tough decision of narrowing their top meals down to one.

Ozzy Canarick, a junior, said that his favorite food is the jelly donuts, "because the jelly is so good." It's a difference from many of the savory foods made during this time. Richard Kyan, a junior at Biotech but Manasquan football and lacrosse player, agrees with him. "My favorite part of the donuts is the powder," he said.

Not everyone likes the sweets, though. Junior Summer Even-Esh said that she likes the "potato pancakes best," because her "Grandma makes them so good."

The traditional foods of Hanukkah, such as the students' favorites, latkes and sufganiyot, are more than mere culinary customs. They represent the oil's significance in the Hanukkah story. These foods are a delicious way to engage with history, offering a sensory experience that connects us to the festival's themes and helps to pass traditions to future generations. Eating all of these delicious delicacies helps the community to celebrate and remember the positivity and light that this holiday brings with it. Hanukkah Sameach!

Happy holidays and Merry Christmas to everyone at MHS. I hope everyone at MHS has a nice winter break!


